# NEW BRITISH GOVERNMENT NAMED

## POSSIBILITY OF GENERAL STRIKE NOW BEING DISCUSSED

### Sir Samuel Hoare Appointed Foreign Secretary in Place Of Simon; Numerous Changes

Cabinet Now Consists of Twenty-Two Instead of Twenty Members—Capt. Anthony Eden Gets Important Post—Five Young Men Given Posts

LONDON, June 7: (CP)—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald presented the resignation of himself and of the cabinet to His Majesty the King at Buckingham Palace this afternoon. Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin was immediately summoned by the King and presented His Majesty with a reconstructed cabinet panel. The new cabinet led by Mr. Baldwin is increased in number from twenty to twenty-two members.

Appointment of Sir Samuel Hoare, former Secretary for India, as Secretary of Foreign Affairs and creation of a new post for Capt. Anthony Eden, minister without portfolio for the League of Nations, features the reorganization.

There are five new cabinet members, most of them young men, including Malcolm MacDonald, son of the retiring Premier, as minister for the colonies and Ernest William Brown as minister of labor.

#### His Last Meeting

LONDON, June 7.—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald presided over what it was believed will be the last weekly meeting of the cabinet before it is reorganized with former Premier Stanley Baldwin as Prime Minister. Announcement of Premier MacDonald's resignation on account of ill-health was made as expected today with Mr. Baldwin's announcement of the new cabinet panel following soon thereafter.

### To Survey Alaska For Military Air Bases Under Bill

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 7.—The House of Representatives has passed a bill calling for a complete survey in Alaska and other territories for possible military air bases.

### Accord of Germany And Great Britain On Naval Strength

LONDON, June 7.—It is announced here that Germany and Great Britain have come to a tentative agreement on the subject of naval armaments. Germany had placed its naval requirements at a total of 425,000 tons whereas Great Britain would concede 225,000 tons. They had been deadlocked but Germany yesterday conceded to agree to a basis of 35% of the total British tonnage. The length of the period of agreement has not been settled upon.

#### FORMS NEW CABINET

PARIS, June 7.—Former Premier Pierre Laval, who was foreign minister in the recently overthrown ministry of Premier Flandin, was successful late last night in forming a new cabinet for France.

### South Having Record Warmth

Thermometer Reached 90 Above Yesterday in Cities Down The Coast

SEATTLE, June 7.—The thermometer reached 83 above zero yesterday for a new record for this time of year. The day previous it had been 80 above.

VANCOUVER, June 7.—The thermometer ascended to 82 above here yesterday as the first heat wave of the summer continued. On account of the low level of city reservoirs, sprinkling regulations have been imposed. From 6 o'clock this evening until 6 o'clock Sunday morning, a ban has been placed on the use of water for sprinkling in Vancouver and Burnaby.

PORTLAND, June 7.—The annual Portland Rose Festival opened here yesterday with temperature recording 90 above.

### Giant Sikorsky Plane is Being Tested Out Now

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., June 7.—The giant new Sikorsky flying boat F43, built for use of Inter-Island Airways in California-Hawaii service, was given its first test flight Wednesday and, with only one of its two engines being used, was reported by the pilot to have functioned perfectly. Shortly it will be put through more arduous tests. This plane, first of two being built, is capable of a speed of 200 miles per hour and will carry 25 passengers.

### One Out of Every Five Americans Is on Relief Now

WASHINGTON, D.C., June 7.—One out of every five persons in the United States is at present on relief, government statistics show. Out of the nation's total population of 127,000,000, some 25,000,000 are receiving some form of relief.

#### PULP MILL DISCUSSED

A special meeting of the council of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce was held yesterday afternoon to take up matters in regard to the progress of negotiations for the establishment of a pulp and paper mill at Prince Rupert.

### SUICIDE VERDICT

Further Disclosures Made at Inquest Into Mrs. Rattenbury's Death

CHRISTCHURCH, June 7: (CP)—Further disclosures were made today at the inquest into the death of Mrs. Alma Rattenbury, whose body was taken at the first of the week from the River Stour into which she had thrown herself. Verdict of suicide while of unsound mind was returned by the jury. Several notes were found in the woman's handbag in which reference was made to the recent murder trial with frequent mention of George Percy Stoner, her lover, who has been sentenced to death for the killing of Francis M. Rattenbury.

In the letters, Mrs. Rattenbury, who stabbed herself as she jumped in the river, indicated that she was determined to kill herself, probably from grief over the death sentence imposed on Stoner.

"It must be easier to be hanged than to do the job yourself," said an extract from one note.

Another said: "Every night and every minute is only prolonging the appalling agony of my mind." In a final letter to her lawyer, Mrs. Rattenbury instructed that no money or effort be spared in the effort to obtain a reprieve for Stoner.

### STEAMER CORDOVA IN DISTRESS IN SOUTH

SEATTLE, June 7.—Radio messages last night announced that the Alaska Steamship Co.'s combination passenger and freight steamer Cordova was in distress south of Seymour Narrows with a broken tailshaft. Rescue vessels were going to the assistance. The Cordova is anchored in Duncan Bay and is leaking slightly. In addition to the crew, ninety passengers are on board, mostly cannery workers. The vessel was bound from Seattle to Alaskan ports. The Salvage King was due alongside at noon today from Victoria.

### DIVING TO LUSITANIA

Success Hoped For This Summer In Daring Marine Venture Off Coast of Ireland

LONDON, June 7.—Promoters of a venture to descend to the bottom of the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Ireland where the great liner Lusitania sank in 300 odd feet of water in 1917, the victim of a German torpedo during the Great War, are hoping to be successful with the attempt by the middle of July. Using special diving equipment designed by J. L. Pearson to overcome the effects of water pressure at a depth as great as 1400 feet, it is planned, if possible, to recover some \$2,000,000 to \$5,000,000 of jewelry and valuables from the Lusitania as well as obtain pictures by means of which it may be determined more exactly how the giant liner met her doom. The operation will be carried out from the salvage ship Arcus.

### PLANS NOT REVEALED

Premier Pattullo Does Not Disclose How He Intends to Finance Public Works Projects

VICTORIA, June 7: (CP)—Although stating that he hoped to be able to finance a substantial road program and also construction of the new New Westminster bridge in spite of Ottawa's refusal to finance his public works projects, Premier T. D. Pattullo has declined to indicate so far how this may be done.

### GANGSTERS FOR NORTH

Undesirable Element From Puget Sound and Elsewhere in South Coming to Alaska

KETCHIKAN, June 7.—A "reign of terror and lawlessness" is feared in Southeastern Alaska this summer as a result of the encouraging by authorities in Seattle and elsewhere in the south of undesirables to leave there for the north. It is estimated that just recently at least 150 paroled convicts have arrived in Ketchikan.

To the presence of these undesirables is attributed much thievery which has been going on along the waterfront of late.

### Forest Fires Are Under Control

Menace to Kirkland Lake Mining Community Now Believed Ended

KIRKLAND LAKE, Ont., June 7.—Heavy rains for the past couple of days have brought devastating forest fires which had been threatening this mining community under control.

### Vancouver Longshore Union Asks Affiliate Bodies to Take Vote

Two Ocean-Going Vessels Being Loaded Without Any Trouble—Shipping Federation Signs Contract With Victoria Stevedore Association

VANCOUVER, June 7: (CP)—The Longshore Water Transport Workers' Union has asked all affiliated bodies in the province to take a ballot on a general strike to be called at the discretion of the parent organizations as a result of the present waterfront tie-up here and the use of non-union labor. Work of handling cargo on the steamer Empress of Japan and the motorship California Express continued overnight without trouble.

The Shipping Federation announced that a contract had been signed with the Canadian Waterfront Workers' Association recently incorporated as a trade union at Victoria.

### TELLS OF POTTERIES

City of Million and Quarter South In North Staffordshire Centre Of Huge Industry

A city with a million and a quarter inhabitants known as Stoke-on-Trent, tenth city in population in the United Kingdom, is the home of people engaged in or connected with the potteries of North Staffordshire. The pottery area is only nine miles long and three miles wide but the industry has an output valued at about four hundred million dollars a year. It was in regard to this industry that Arthur Sutton of the local high school staff addressed the Prince Rupert Rotary Club at its luncheon in the Commodore Cafe yesterday afternoon.

According to Mr. Sutton the industry was started by Josiah Wedgwood in the seventeenth century. The clay deposit was not a large one and, of late, a great deal of the clay used was imported from Cornwall, from which place it was conveyed in deep sea vessels to Liverpool and thence in canal boats to Staffordshire. The coal used in the process of burning the ware was mined close to the potteries.

The speaker told of the various processes such as importing the "ball clay," purifying it by screening and taking out any metals that might be in it by means of magnets, and then fashioning it on a potter's wheel or moulding it into other than round ware or moulding it in plaster of Paris casts. The articles were baked in kilns, forming what is known as "biscuit." The glazing was then put on by the use of silicate of lead and it was baked again.

Owing to limit of time the speaker was unable to go into detail in regard to decorating except to explain in general terms how some of the decorations were baked into the articles in different ways by skilled workers.

The members of the club showed deep appreciation of the address which was extremely educative. Col. J. W. Nicholls was in the chair in the absence of J. J. Little, the president.

### Third Trial Of Lamson Delayed

Will Not Take Place Until Late August or Early September, It Is Expected

SAN JOSE, Cal., June 7.—The third trial of David A. Lamson, former Stanford University executive, on the charge of murdering his wife two years ago, is expected to take place late in August or early in September. Defence attorneys have asked that the trial be deferred for a couple of months and the prosecution, it is understood, has no objection.

At his first trial Lamson was convicted and sentenced to death. The second trial ended in a disagreement by the jury.

### Premier Blocking Reid Silver Bill

Point of Order Raised by Prime Minister Yesterday Against B.C. Member's Measure

OTTAWA, June 7.—Premier R. B. Bennett raised a point of order yesterday against the bill of Thomas Reid, Liberal member for New Westminster, which would compel the Bank of Canada to purchase silver for the redemption of notes.

### Governor Troy Is On His Way Home

Chief Executive of Alaska Leaves Seattle For Juneau After Extensive Trip

SEATTLE, June 7.—After having visited Washington on territorial business as well as attending the San Diego Exposition, Governor John W. Troy of Alaska has sailed from here for Juneau. At Washington he urged the establishment of naval and military air bases throughout Alaska.

### KETCHIKAN MOTORSHIP DESTROYED BY BLAST

KETCHIKAN, June 7.—The coastal motorship freighter Hydaburg was destroyed by an explosion yesterday. The vessel and its cargo were blown up completely with loss estimated at \$40,000. There were no serious casualties.

### AIRPLANE TRAGEDY

Jack Beckwith, Mechanic, Burns To Death at Fernie—Pilot R. B. Grant Escapes

FERNIE, June 7: (CP)—Jack Beckwith, Vancouver airplane mechanic, was burned to death and Pilot R. B. Grant injured slightly yesterday afternoon when the undercarriage of their plane struck the top of a field marker at the Fernie airport, the machine crashing to the ground where it burst into flames. It was a DeHavilland moth plane, belonging to a Vancouver oil company, and had been on a flight to Alberta.

Grant was dragged to safety by spectators who were unable to reach the mechanic whose body was almost completely destroyed.

### PLANS OF LIBERALS

To Amend B. N. A. Act, Refund Entire National Debt and Replace Direct Relief

OTTAWA, June 7:—When the Liberal party returns to the federal treasury benches following the general election this fall, it is the intention to amend the British North America Act to bring it up to date, it is stated in authoritative party circles here.

The Liberals also plan a huge conversion loan to refund the entire Dominion public debt at an interest rate not exceeding three percent.

The party is also discussing a "labor dividend" plan to take the place of direct relief.

### MANY HEAR FINE MUSIC

Students and Others Gathered Last Evening to Listen to Viggo Kihl

Modern music was illustrated by selections from Rachmaninoff and a number of others, giving plenty of variety and full enjoyment to the audience who refused to be satisfied when the pianist left the stage and remained seated until he returned.

Mr. Kihl left directly after the performance on the steamer Prince George for Vancouver, leaving behind him pleasant memories of his wonderful interpretations of the

masters of the musical art. The recital was under the auspices of the Ladies' Music Club.

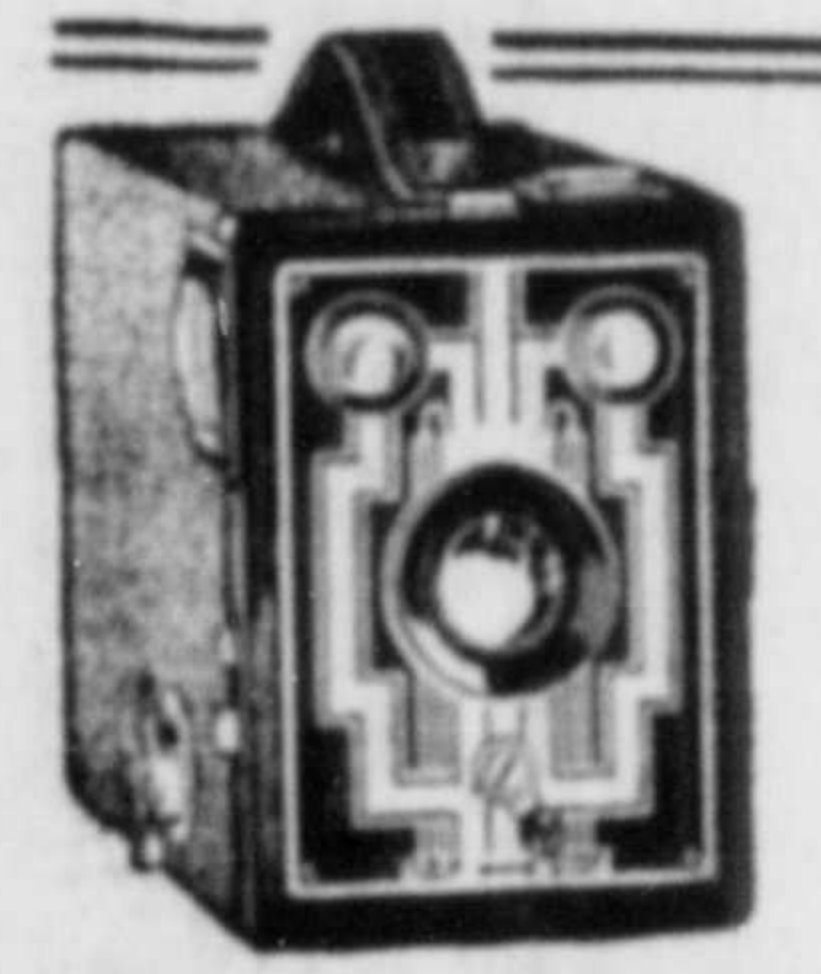
