THOUSAND ARE SAFE

Sea Smooth and Rescue Vessels Are Ready to Remove 600 Passengers and 500 Crew From Rotterdam

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Sept. 30: (CP)-With six hundred passengers from New York on a Carribean Sea cruise and a crew of five hundred on board, the Holland-American liner Rotterdam piled up on a reef sixty miles southeast of here early this morning. THE POLITICAL CORNER

C. N. R. AMALGAMATION WITH C. P. R.

In a speech made by Mr. Maxine Raymond in the House of Commons at Ottawa as reported in Hansard of May 11th, 1934, this Member of Parliament charged the Bennett administration with making the following payments to the C. P. R. under the "blank cheque" powers given to Bennett by the Tory majority. The government did not attempt to refute these charges, consequently we can accept them as correct: \$863,550 givn in 1930; \$209,796 in 1931. In 1932-33 Bennett loaned the C. P. R. without interest \$2,447,222. In 1933 he guaranteed bank loans to the C. P. R. amounting to \$60,000,000.

In 1932 the C. P. R. bought 30,000 shares of Consolidated Smelters stock for about \$1,300,000 worth today over \$5,000,000. You will note that Bennett in this way permitted the C. P. R. to gamble with your money up to \$1,300,000 in this mining stock.

All this in face of the fact that in 1931 the C. P. R. profits amounted to \$38,381,000 out of which they paid their foreign shareholders \$32,000,000.

The Liberal Party is pledged to oppose amalgamation of the C. P. R. and C. N. R. Bennett says he will appoint a commission to look into the question of amalgamation. This looks like the thin edge of the amalgamation wedge.

When we consider the intimate relations which have always existed between the C. P. R. and our Conservative governments and latterly the close friendship between Bennett and Sir Edward Beatty (Bennett got him his knighthood), we are naturally suspicious of any Conservative move regarding the C. N. R. and Bennett's latest announcement that he favors a commission to report on amalgamation looks as though he were weakening in his stand against it. On the other hand, Mackenzie King is pledged without reservation to oppose amalgamation.

In face of the above record, which party can more safely be entrusted with the integrity of the Canadian National Railways?

A vote for Orme is a vote for Bennett.
