Paris Ready To Support Move Against Aggressor In The Italo-Ethiopian Dispute In Africa

Geneva Hears That Italy Intends to Give Sharp Retort To Sir Samuel Hoare's Statement—May Mean War If Sanctions Exercised—Aggression Will Not be Tolerated

LONDON, Sept. 12: (CP)—It was stated in authoritative circles tonight that France is ready to support any financial or economic sanctions that may be imposed against the aggressor nation in the Italo-Ethiopian dispute. Meantime, the British government is sending an additional three battalions of troops to Malta while Italy sent six thousand more troops to Africa today.

Italy to Reply GENEVA, Sept. 12:—It was understood here last night that Italy was preparing to deliver a sharp retort to the declaration of Sir Samuel Hoare, British foreign secretary, in regard to his country's policy with respect to League of Nations and the Italo-Ethiopian crisis. If sanctions are carried out against Italy, it would in all probability result in world war, Italian spokesmen predicted.

Hauptmann Appeal Decision Reached

Nature of Same, However, Is Not Revealed as Yet—Defence Ready To Go Further

TRENTON, New Jersey, Sept. 12.—Decision has been reached in the appeal of Bruno Richard Hauptmann against conviction and sentence of death for the kidnap-murder of baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr., it was intimated yesterday, but the nature of the decision was not revealed.

VENGEANCE IS SWORN

Huey Long's Friends Say Assassination Had Long Been Plotted; Funeral Held Today

BATON ROUGE, La., Sept. 12:—Friends of the late Senator Huey Long declared yesterday that his assassination had been planned weeks ago and, indeed, that lots had been drawn among political enemies as to who would carry it out. Long's henchmen swear vengeance on any and all who it is found might have been involved in the conspiracy.

Stock Market Is Bullish; Trading Volume is Heavy

NEW YORK, Sept. 12:—Continuation of a bullish movement on the New York Stock Exchange yesterday forced issues up all along the line, many reaching new high marks for the year. Trading volume was the heaviest for any day since July 1934 totalling some two and a half million shares. Closing averages were as follows: industrials, 134.01, up .59; rails, 37.25, up .23; utilities, 26.71, up .15, and bonds, 96.72, up .11. Lead, copper and silver prices remained unchanged.

Take Fog Risks From Air Trips

British Experts Try Out New System of Warning Fliers

LONDON, Sept. 12 (CP)—Experiments in "blind" landing of aircraft in fog and the effective warning by radio of the proximity of obstructions are to be conducted in the all-metal monoplane recently the property of the Prince of Wales. Special equipment will be installed.

Regularity of commercial flying services suffers till means are devised to make safe landings easy in thickest fog. Warning of dangerous obstructions is essential in the interests of safety. Within a few year aircraft should be equipped to move through fog and in other conditions of poor visibility with a sureness at Present denied to any kind of vehicle.

NIPPON TO BACK DOWN

Will Remove Discriminatory Imposts if Canada Rescinds Its Arbitrary Measures

OTTAWA, Sept. 12: (CP)—If Canada rescinds arbitrary measures against Japan, the Nipponese Empire will remove discriminatory imposts against Canadian goods, the Japanese foreign office announces in a communication to the government here.

The communication pointed out that the United States had not imposed any currency exchange compensation duty on Japanese goods.

Head of Government Might Countenance Public Owned Bank

Would Agree to Change if it Were Shown to be Beneficial To People, Government Head Says in Another Broadcast Wednesday Night

OTTAWA, Sept. 12: (CP)—Declaring that he believed in "a measure of controlled inflation" and would be the first to advocate changing the Bank of Canada from private to public ownership if it were shown that such a change would be beneficial to the people, Prime Minister R. B. Bennett last night delivered the third of a series of federal election campaign broadcasts. A measure of controlled inflation had been introduced in the past two years, the Premier said.

MUNICIPALITIES UNION, VOTES CONFIDENCE IN PROVINCIAL MINISTER

HARRISON HOT SPRINGS, Sept. 12: (CP)—The Union of British Columbia Municipalities yesterday passed a vote of confidence in Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of municipalities. In an address to the convention, Mr. Gray pledged himself anew to seek relief for the municipalities from paying social service costs but added "I don't know when that will be."

With Inspector John A. Fraser, provincial police, in personal charge, two search parties are now scouring the country south of Burns Lake in the central interior for trace of John Lake, Colleymount farmer, who has not been seen since he fatally shot Emil Perle, another rancher, over two weeks ago.

Massett Conviction Quashed in County Court Appeal Here

Judge W. E. Fisher, in County Court yesterday afternoon, on appeal, quashed a conviction against Arthur Watson of Massett of supplying liquor to Indians. Watson had been convicted by Stipendiary Magistrate W. S. Singer of Massett and fined \$100. The conviction was quashed on the ground that the person supplied was an Indian woman married to a white man and was, therefore, white under the Act. L. W. Patmore acted as counsel for the appellant and T. W. Brown for the crown.

EAST AND WEST

It is the expressed opinion of Mitchell Hepburn of Ontario that the east would send a majority of Liberals to Parliament but he was not so sure about the west. Evidently his suggestion was that the west might not fall in line with the east and might lose the advantages which could accrue from a Dominion policy supported by members from all the provinces.

Some voters will not consider this a sufficient reason for returning Liberal members but others will feel it is an essential. It is the feeling of many that British Columbia cannot afford to be an outcast province.

PURCHASING ALBERTA

When the Premier of British Columbia went to Ottawa and asked for co-operation from the federal government he was refused. All he got was just enough to prevent injury to the credit of the Dominion. There was no attempt made to co-operate to relieve a very serious situation.

When the new Premier of Alberta telephoned Prime Minister Bennett asking for co-operation in the carrying out of his scheme, he was assured that he would get it. Mr. Bennett, in view of the impending election, was ready to promise anything. The result is that Mr. Bennett seems likely to get the support of the social credit element in the province of Alberta.

There never was a more brazen case of purchasing votes than the one in point. Everyone knows that Mr. Bennett has no sympathy with social credit. He is a "sound money" advocate of the strongest type. Everything he has ever done and said indicated that. Now, under the shadow of an election he expresses strong sympathy with the strong Alberta movement and loans the province enough money to carry it past the election.

Once the election is over Aberhart will get scant sympathy for his plan if by any ill chance the present government should be returned.

CARDS AND CUBS FIGHT

New York Giants Fall Back In National League Race—Tigers And Yankees Lose

PITTSBURG, Sept. 12: (CP)—Losing to the Pirates in a free-hitting game here yesterday, the New York Giants sank deeper into third place in the National League while the St. Louis Cardinals and Chicago Cubs continued a tight battle for the pennant, the former winning easily over the Phillies at Sportsmen's Field while the latter won by a wide margin over the Boston Braves at Wrigley Field. The Cubs are but one game behind the Cardinals still.

In the American League, both the leading Detroit Tigers and the second place New York Yankees lost their games, the former to the Washington Senators at the National Capital and the latter to the Cleveland Indians at Yankee Stadium. Chicago White Sox displaced the Boston Red Sox from fourth place with an easy victory. The Senators moved into exclusive possession of sixth place ahead of the idle St. Louis Browns.

RIVAL OF CAMPBELL

George Eyston Will Also Try Sands Of Utah With New Flash Creation

NEW YORK, Sept. 12: (AP)—Sir Malcolm Campbell's famous record breaking Bluebird has a rival for public interest. Travelling in the same liner with the famous Campbell-Bluebird combination came another noted British speed merchant, Capt. George Eyston, and a new super-racer that in design is almost as startling as was Bluebird on its first public appearance.

In the new 200-mile an hour creation Capt. Eyston intends to smash practically every record that his distinguished countryman doesn't want, from 20 miles to 24 hours. He anticipated little difficulty in bettering all the 21 records recently set on the same Utah course by another Briton, John Cobb.

Eyston's machine, 23 feet in length and tapering down to a wind aperture in front that looks like a shark's mouth, bristles with novel points. It has a 12-cylinder aviation power unit and no sign of a clutch. A four-speed, self-changing gear box takes its place.

It is the first big machine of the type to have front-wheel drive. Further, each wheel is independent of the other. Fuel is carried in two 23-gallon tanks and pumped to the carburetors by a mechanical engine device.

Adoption of front-wheel drive has greatly simplified the layout of the cockpit, since there is no mechanism in it with the driver.

True Streamliner

The body, held on a light alloy framework, is shaped as half a true streamline section, the underside, naturally, being flat. Extensions at each side cover the gas tanks and partly enclose the wheels. Inside the tail is a compartment for spare tires and tools, in accordance with the international rules for distance runs.

The lighting system for the long night runs is novel, two headlights being carried close together inside the nose of the car and throwing their beams through portholes in the streamlined cover. Captain Eyston and Albert Denly, who will "spell" him at the wheel, have evolved a scheme which they believe will save much time in refueling the giant. They plan to install a big reservoir on a tower with two hoses, one for each tank.

Since the car weighs nearly two tons, special pads are fitted for two huge compound jacks which will hoist both front and both rear wheels off the ground in one movement for tire changes.

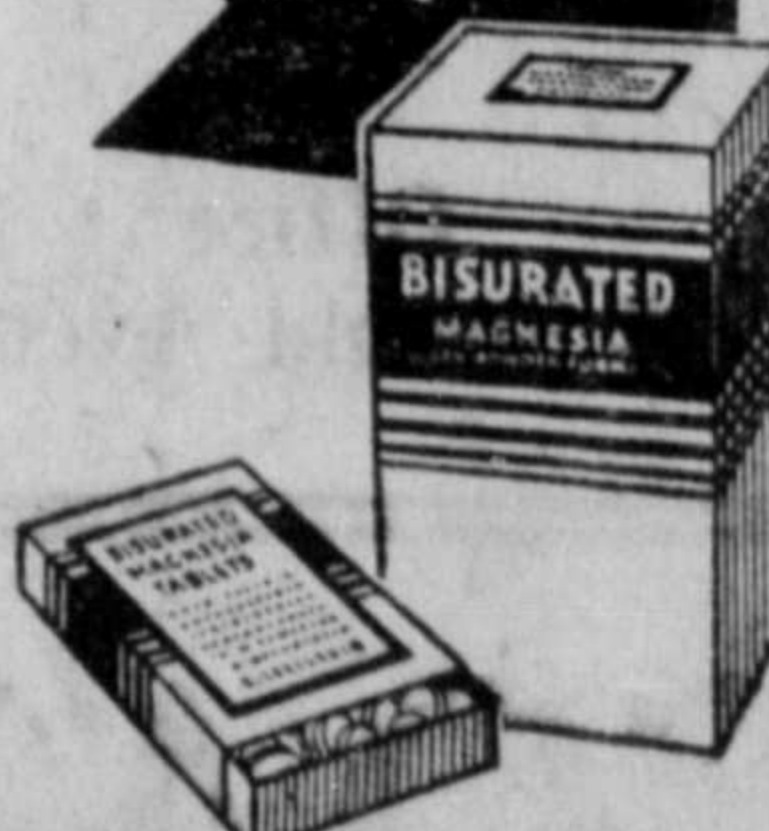

ETHIOPIA'S MANY WARS

Humbled Egypt Centuries Ago And In Early Christian Era Was Object of Nations of Europe

Ruled Egypt

Accepted Christianity Long Ago And Has Always Retained It

With Italy pressing for the control of Ethiopia it is recalled history relates that just 2,800 years ago—about the middle of the eighth century B. C.—the ancient kingdom of Ethiopia conquered and ruled the fertile land of Egypt, thus turning the tables on the country under whose yoke she had suffered prior to the eleventh century B.C. when she gained her independence.

The next most prosperous and important period in Ethiopian history was that between the introduction of Christianity in the fourth century A. D. and the conquest of Egypt by the Mohammedans in the middle of the seventh. Ethiopians possessed a rich territory, carried on a lucrative trade and had intercourse with India, Ceylon and the Greek Empire. After their expulsion from Arabia by the Mohammedans they lay practically forgotten by the outer world until the fifteenth century when Portuguese explorers and missionaries, seeking the fabled Christian kingdom of boundless wealth ruled by "Prester John," which they believed to be Ethiopia, settled there.

The fact that Ethiopia alone, of all the African peoples, accepted and retained a form of Christianity is no less remarkable today than it was to these explorers five centuries ago. Allegiance to the old Coptic faith or so-called "Alexandrian Church" against Catholicism, Protestantism and Mohammedanism has held firm throughout the centuries, the people as late as 1916 deposing the Emperor Lej Yasu, successor to Menelik II, for his leanings toward Mohammedanism.

Record of Civil Wars

The three centuries from the eighteenth to the twentieth are mainly a record of warring tribes and states, with the rulers of the three divisions—Tigre (northern), Amhara (central) and Shoa (southern), striving against each other for the title of Negus Negusti (King of Kings). The most outstanding figure in this later period is Theodore II, who seized the throne in 1865. Against him the British in 1867 were forced to resort to arms to effect the release of British and European consuls and missionaries whom he imprisoned when he received no acknowledgment of a letter to Queen Victoria requesting aid against invading Egyptians. In 1868, defeated and discouraged, with his subjects in rebellion against his cruel and tyrannical rule, Theodore took his own life. An interesting fact is

that his only legitimate son, Almayahu, was afterwards sent to England according to his father's wishes. He went to school at Rugby, but died at the age of 18 on November 14, 1879, and is buried in St. George's Chapel, Windsor.

There were frequent wars with Egypt from 1872 to 1882, from which Ethiopia emerged victorious, and with Italy from 1885 to 1896. The Ucialli Treaty with Italy in 1889, making Ethiopia virtually an Italian protectorate signed by Menelik II, son of Theodore's immediate predecessor and grandson of Sahale Selassie, formerly ruler of Shoa, was repudiated by him a year later on the grounds that in that sense it differed from the Ethiopian version. The year 1896 saw Ethiopia again victorious and her independence formally recognized by Italy.

This was the last open warfare between European countries and Ethiopia. Settlement of boundary disputes with both Italy and Great Britain was successfully achieved. Relations with the latter have since remained on a friendly basis. Menelik in 1902 agreeing not to obstruct the waters of Lake Tsana and the Blue Nile, and to give the preference to the British government in any undertaking to construct a dam at this spot. Although negotiations have been frequent nothing definite has yet been accomplished.

Agreement of 1906

In 1906 was signed the Anglo-French-Italian agreement which is figuring so prominently in the present Italo-Ethiopian dispute. The three powers bound themselves to maintain "intact the integrity of Ethiopia" and "the political and territorial status quo," and in concert to safeguard their own interests if this were disturbed. Menelik, to whom the text was afterwards communicated, declared that the agreement must in no way limit his own sovereign rights. In 1923 Ethiopia, the only country in Africa neutral during the war, was admitted to the League of Nations, after having passed a decree making slavery punishable by death.

"Perpetual friendship" was vowed in an Italy-Abyssinian treaty signed at Addis Ababa in 1928 which provided for arbitration in all disputes arising between the two countries.

Haile Selassie II, the grandnephew of Menelik II, succeeded the latter's daughter, Empress Waizeru Zauditu, in 1930. He claims direct descent from Solomon and the Queen of Sheba through their son Menelik, the first ruler of Ethiopia. In 1924, as Das Tafari Makonnen, the present Emperor visited England and conferred with Prime Minister MacDonald concerning the Tsana project.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Under a change of plans which became known this morning, C.N.R. steamer Prince Charles, which was to have been withdrawn this week-end from the run between here and Vancouver via the Queen Charlotte Islands and tied up for the winter in the local dry dock, will remain in service for another two weeks. The Prince John, now undergoing annual overhaul in the local dry dock, was to have gone on the run in place of the Prince Charles with the sailing this Saturday night but this plan has been changed and the Charles will go south herself instead.

The Charles arrived in port at 8-15 this morning from Vancouver via the Islands with a good-sized list of passengers. Capt. Dan McKinnon, master of the Prince Charles, will transfer to the Prince John when the change of ships is made, it is expected.

The Ketchikan steam freighter Eveyn Berg was to have come here yesterday with one carload of fresh fish for transshipment to the United States over Canadian National Railways but is understood to have been diverted to Tacoma. According to reports received here, the union crew of the Eveyn Berg refused to work the vessel if she handled cargo at any British Columbia port, all of which are held to be "unfair".

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Pachena left this morning for Digby Island, having in tow the company's sand scow which will be beached there for cleaning and painting.

Northland Transportation Co.'s steamer North Sea, Capt. A. W. Nickerson, arrived in port at 8:45 this morning from Ketchikan and, after discharging four carloads of fish for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways, sailed at noon in continuation of her voyage to Seattle.
