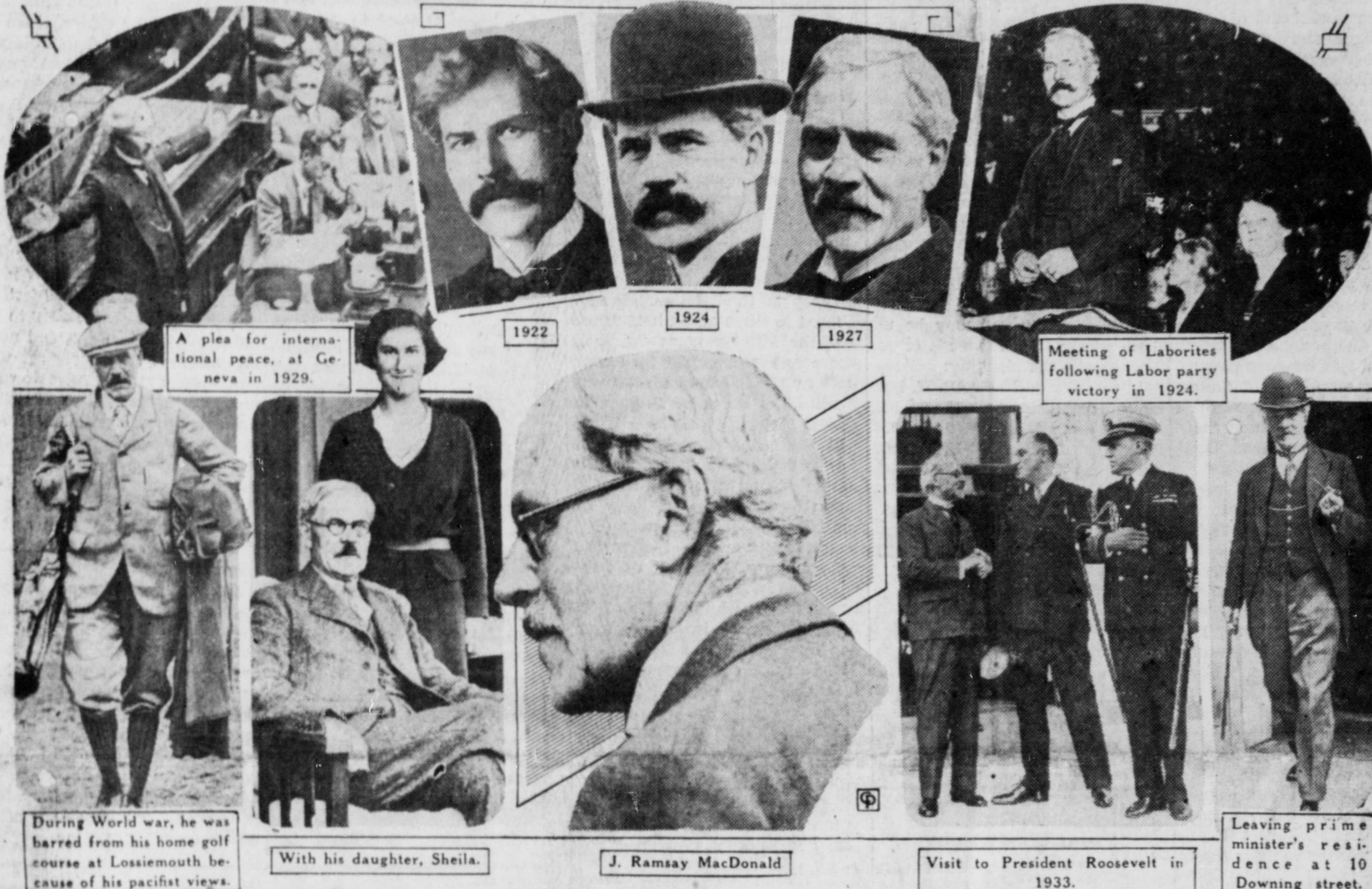

Financial Conspiracy Against Government is Suggested By Hepburn

Premier of Eastern Province Sees reprisal Against Action Of His Administration in Cancelling Quebec Power Contracts

TORONTO, June 12: (CP)—No bids had been made up to noon today for a \$15,000,000 bond issue by the Ontario government, Premier Mitchell Hepburn announced, charging at the same time that there was a conspiracy against the government when investment dealers agreed among themselves to make no offer as a result of the government's action in cancelling the Quebec power contracts.

CARGO IS HANDLED

More Men Than Ever Since Strike Started at Work on Vancouver Waterfront Yesterday

VANCOUVER, June 12:—More strikebreakers were at work on the local waterfront in loading and unloading of ships yesterday than at any time since the longshoremen's strike began. They carried on their work under heavy police guard. The vessels for which cargo was handled included the Empress of Japan, Prince George, Cardena, Princess Adelaide, Pacific Pioneer and Hikawa Maru. The Prince George and Cardena sailed last night for Prince Rupert and the Princess Adelaide leaves tonight for the north.

Gran Chaco War Ended

Buenos Aires, June 12:—The three-year Gran Chaco war, bloodiest conflict since the Great War, came to an end early this morning following the signing yesterday of a peace treaty between the two contending nations, Bolivia and Paraguay.

Prince of Wales Approves Vets' Germany Tour

LONDON, June 12:—The Prince of Wales yesterday gave his approval to the proposal of an early "goodwill tour" of Germany by a contingent of British war veterans under the auspices of the British Legion.

WILL RUN FOR C. C. F.

Rev. King Gordon Wires Acceptance of Nomination For Federal Election Seat in Victoria

MONTREAL, June 12: (CP)—Rev. J. King Gordon, professor of Christian ethics at the United Theological College here, today wired his acceptance of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation nomination for Victoria in the forthcoming federal election. He will leave shortly for the west to prepare for the campaign. He is the son of Rev. Dr. Charles W. Gordon (Ralph Connor), the noted author.

Ensenada Chief Of Police Dead As Result Duel

ENSENADA, Mexico, June 12:—Raoul Ortegol, chief of police of Ensenada, was killed yesterday in a duel involving a woman. His adversary was wounded.

Check-up to Be Made On Subsidized Boats On Coast of Pacific

Recommendation Contained in Report of Industrial And International Relations Committee Presented To House of Commons Today

OTTAWA, June 12: (CP)—Departments of the Dominion government concerned today were urged to keep a close check upon the operations of ships on the Pacific Coast enjoying subsidies to see that employment is given among the crews to as many white citizens as is reasonably possible. This recommendation was contained in a report tabled in the House of Commons from the industrial and international relations committee.

KING IS UNWELL

Suffering From Stubborn Case Of Catarrh, Necessitating Two Weeks' Rest

SANDRINGHAM, June 12: (CP)—King George was reported in a bulletin issued by his physician today to be suffering from bronchial catarrh which is slow in disappearing because His Majesty is fatigued by his efforts of the last few weeks. The condition of the King will necessitate a complete rest for two weeks.

Tomorrow's great ball will see the Prince of Wales lead Her Majesty into the ballroom. Two thousand invitations have been issued.

Provincial Government Is To Provide Money For Road Work And To Help Municipalities

VICTORIA, June 12: (CP)—The provincial government is providing \$1,500,000 for road work and \$500,000 to loan to centres where unemployment is most severe for needed works, Premier T. D. Pattullo announced yesterday. "The money will be raised through bond issue and we are prepared to take up the issue ourselves from our own sinking funds," Mr. Pattullo said.

RELIEF STRIKERS AT PRINCE GEORGE ARE GIVEN JAIL TERMS

Sentences ranging from six to eighteen months imprisonment were imposed yesterday upon four men following their conviction by Stipendiary Magistrate G. H. Milburn in provincial police court at Prince George on charges of assaulting police officers in connection with riots of relief work strikers there on May 13. A THOUGHTLESS ACT

Complaint is made through these columns of the thoughtless act of a flower thief who stole blooming plants from Walter Longwill's rock garden. The first reaction of a flower lover in hearing of such an act is to set down the culprit as on a par with the kidnapers of the Lindbergh baby, for they carry away and destroy something full of life and beauty. Second thought, however, may set it down as an act of thoughtlessness of one who has no soul for the beautiful and who does not realize what it means to spend a year or more bringing a plant to the point of blooming and then to see it snatched away in the darkness by one who is unable to appreciate its beauty.

When Mr. Longwill started his garden last year, many people spoke of him as another of the public spirited citizens who were trying to do their bit to improve the city. This spring the result of his work became more apparent and there were possibilities of much greater things for the future. Then came the thief who spoiled the effect of a year of work. Happily Mr. Longwill is not one to be daunted by such an act. He has public opinion with him and all will be watching to try to spot the thief.

A few years ago complaints were made of flower thefts but today most people grow their own flowers and do not have to steal. At any rate there is opportunity for all to grow their own which is far better than stealing and destroying. If the thoughtless person who tore out those flowers from Mr. Longwill's garden wall reads this, we hope he or she will realize how foolish and useless it is to destroy a flower and will make amends by starting a garden of his own. It's so much easier to destroy than to create.

A LIBERAL CABINET

Up in Ottawa (not "down" in Ottawa) they are picking a cabinet for Right Hon. William Lyon Mackenzie King and in that cabinet we notice such names as G. G. McGeer and Hon. Ian MacKenzie of Vancouver; Professor Norman McL. Rogers of Queen's University; C. D. Howe, the man who built the Prince Rupert elevator; Premier Mitchell Hepburn, the man who has been cleaning up Ontario; Hon. Angus Macdonald, premier of Nova Scotia; Colonel G. G. Power, one of the Young Liberal group of Quebec. There will be a smattering of the old cabinet but nothing like enough to control the policies of the new one. If the men here mentioned should be chosen it would mean that Mr. Bennett's new deal would look pretty old before very long.

A LOW DOWN THIEF

editor, Daily News:— As you are the leading spirit working towards the beautification of Prince Rupert, I hope you will grant me a little of your space for the following letter.

In the spring of last year I decided to improve the landscape in front of my residence at Second Avenue and Ninth Street. After several months of hard work in clearing the land and building a dry retaining wall along the rock bluff, my wife and I decided we would try the experiment of a rock garden there to take away the drabness of nature in the raw.

My wife obtained various specimens of rock and other plants and planted them along the rock bluff and between the rocks of the wall. The result this spring has been very pleasing indeed and has been commented on and admired by hundreds of passersby. One gentleman from Victoria topped in passing one evening and commented on the work we had done.

Well, Mr. Editor, we are wondering if it is worth all the trouble to try to make Prince Rupert a city of flowers. Just at the time when the various plants looked pretty with their contrasting shades along comes that detestable pest creeping in the night when folks are asleep (I mean the common or garden thief) to rob us of all our pleasure and one of the best blooms which was admired by everybody passing. The thief was no lover of flowers or he wouldn't have dragged them out by their roots to wit. Perhaps some neighbor will see them hanging their poor heads in disgust.

Two weeks ago Sunday night, two pansy plants saved from the frosts were taken, and on Friday night last or early Saturday morning two clumps of Alyssum Saxatile or Gold Dust and two clumps of Chieranthus or Siberian Wallflower were taken, all that I had managed to save. It is rather discouraging to have one's garden carried off piecemeal don't you think?

Well, I wish the guilty one all sorts of luck but I'm sure he will come to the conclusion that the stolen plants looked much prettier on that rock wall than in their present location.

ESSINGTON IMPORTANT

Large Bulk of Population is Japanese With Some Indians And Fewer Whites

Well Equipped

One of the oldest villages in Northern British Columbia, at one time a centre of great activity and the base for river navigation when boats and canoes were the only means of reaching the interior, Port Essington is still a salmon fishing centre of considerable importance. It is located on the Skeena River, nearly thirty miles from Prince Rupert at the mouth of the Estall River.

Like most settlements in this country, the most interesting thing about Port Essington is its people. It has a population of four or five hundred. Those of European descent number something like eighty adults and children including a number of Finns. There are approximately 120 Indians and the rest are Japanese. This distribution of population might easily be a problem but it really is not for the people seem to get along very happily together. Most of the natives live on the reserve which is part of the village. The Japanese are grouped at the easterly end and on the banks of the Estall is the small Finnish settlement. Many of the older Japanese and Finns do not read English although all speak it. The children, however, go to the public school and speak and read English readily and many of them excel in their studies.

There are two schools in Port Essington, one on the Indian Reserve attended by natives and controlled by the Department of Indian Affairs and United Church of Canada. The other is a two-room public school under the capable management of the principal, W. Jones, assisted by Miss B. B. Fawcett. The number of pupils in the public school is at present 86 of which seventy percent are Japanese.

There are two churches—the United Church of Canada under Rev. Frank Bushfield and the Anglican served from the mission boat Northern Cross. Many of the Japanese are Anglicans but the majority remain Buddhists and

they have their own meeting place or temple and in most homes the carved figure of one of the Buddhist incarnations may be seen.

There are several general stores in the village, chief of which is that of James Brown, justice of the peace and sawmill man, who has lived there for many years. The other stores are Japanese.

The B. A. Cannery is the only one at present operating at Port Essington but Balmoral, just across the Estall, will use its cold storage plant during the present season. Fishing being the only industry, the operation of the canneries is of first importance.

A hospital is operated during the summer months. Dr. A. E. Perry of Port Simpson moves there from his winter quarters and usually has with him an assistant and staff of nurses. These cater to the needs of the whole river. This year a Japanese nurse is a member of the staff. The hospital is under United Church management.

While at present Port Essington seems to have no future other than that of a fishing village, there are those among its inhabitants who see a possibility of development should the Estall mines open in order to supply sulphur for Prince Rupert's pulp mill. Some of the inhabitants work in the woods during the winter getting out logs for Brown's mill and others have their trap lines.

Life is Pleasant
On the whole life is pleasant at the village. They have their music and dances, their religious festivals and sometimes they listen to the radio, talk politics or attend meetings. Most of the people cut their own wood and thus solve the fuel problem. There is an excellent hotel conducted by Mrs. A. H. Perkins.

A short distance from Port Essington are the hot springs owned by George Prizzell, which is being developed into a health resort. It is now being opened for the summer season.

Across the Skeena on the railway is Haysport with its cannery, its hotel and stores, the hotel conducted by Madam Dupuis being well known on the river. A ferry connects Haysport with Port Essington. Not far away are other canneries and the Icelandic village of Osland on Smith Island.

Port Essington is the centre of a large population during the fishing season but the number of residents is not increasing.
