

Highlights in Career of British Prime Minister Who Has Just Retired



The resignation of J. Ramsad MacDonald, prime minister of Great Britain, has just been announced. The head of the National government and former Labor leader is suffering from a serious eye ailment which made it impossible for him to carry on. His retirement from active political life is the result. He has been a dominant figure in British and world politics for many years. Former Labor premier in 1924, he was called by the King to form a National government late in 1929 and has been prime minister ever since.




