

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 14: (CP)-Notice that "Washington will not be an obstacle" to international currency stabilization was coupled by Secretary of the Treasury Henry Morgenthau in an address last night with the warning that the United States will not act singly to peg the dollar. "Before we make any new commitments, we must be sure we will not lose what we have just gained," he said.






