WITTENBERG, Germany, June 14: (CP)—Complete censorship was clamped down yesterday on the stricken area of the village of Rheindorf following two terrific explosions in the Westfalian-Anhalt munitions factory. The entire district is reported to be in shambles with the death list placed at anywhere from 100 to 1000 persons. So far fifty-two are known to be dead. Only a very few of the 13,000 employees in the plant, one of the most up-todate of its kind in the world, escaped injury.




