MANY DIE IN STORM

Deaths Attributed To Tempest On Atlantic Seaboard—Damage Is Estimated At \$2,000,000

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Thirty known dead and damage of \$2,000,000 was estimated last night as a result of a fierce winter storm with cyclonic wind, torrential rain and blinding snow which swept the Atlantic seaboard Sunday and Monday from Canada to the Carolinas. Shipping and air traffic was paralyzed at a standstill and highways and railways in some cases were tied up on account of the heavy snow. Some small boats were swept to sea while some were cast on the shores and wrecked. Near Jamesport, New York, a ship was wrecked when it failed to stop at a point where the track had been washed out. Food was being dropped by airplanes to 400 motorists who were stranded by deep snow near Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. A well known radio personality lost his life here as a result of the storm.

HOOVER IS CRITICAL

Speaks Out at New Deal—Condemns Reckless Expenditure And Urges Sensible Plan

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Speaking at a dinner at the Waldorf-Astoria, former President Herbert Hoover struck out at the New Deal, attacking the Roosevelt administration on many phases of its program. He demanded a halt in present "reckless expenditures," the substitution of a sensible program of public works instead of the present public works plan and the restoration of the gold standard. Mr. Hoover made no reference to his own political plans.

Hans Luther Being Guarded

Former Chancellor of Germany Threatened by Reds At St. Paul

ST. PAUL, Minn., Nov. 19.—Special precautions were being taken by police here yesterday to guard Hans Luther, former Chancellor of Germany, while on a visit to this city. He had been threatened by Communists.

Claudette Colbert Very Much Alive

Was Enjoying Week-End Party At Palm Springs When Reported Killed in Car Crash

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 19.—Reports were in circulation here at the week-end that Claudette Colbert, popular screen star, had been killed in an automobile accident but they proved false when the actress was found enjoying a party at Palm Springs.

SEAMEN QUIT WORK ON SHIP LOADING CARGO OF FUEL FOR AFRICA

SAN PEDRO, Nov. 19.—The freighter Oregon, loading a cargo of gasoline here, was deserted by her seamen when it became known that the cargo was destined for Italian Somaliland in the East African war zone. The seamen demand guarantee of protection before they will sail.

ITALIANS ARE ANGRY

Widespread Resentment Expressed At Imposition of Sanctions—Mussolini Heard

Stand Approved

Relentless Stand Against Compromise Approved—Troops To Stay in Libya

ROME, Nov. 19.—Declaring "implacable resistance" to the imposition of sanctions, angry crowds of millions of Italians paraded the streets of this ancient city and other centres yesterday carrying banners with such legends as "Down With Sanctions, Long Live Italy." Widespread resentment was expressed in all quarters as the League of Nations penalties became effective.

Embassies of the various sanction-approving nations were under unusually heavy guard to protect them against demonstrations of Italian patriots. In Rome and Milan large crowds staged friendly demonstrations before the legations of United States, Germany, Austria, Hungary, Argentina and other nations which have not joined in the sanctions. All British newspapers and magazines were ordered removed from newsstands.

Mussolini Speaks

In a fighting speech, Premier Benito Mussolini said: "Sanctions will never make the Italian people submit. They will only make the people rally around me the more. I am unable to see any justice in the sanctions." Today Fascism's highest authority, the Grand Council, approved Premier Mussolini's program of Ethiopian conquest and resistance to the League of Nations sanctions, taking a relentless stand against compromise.

No public statement was issued except that the Grand Council had listened to Il Duce's statement. Mussolini discussed the Mediterranean situation and said there would be no further troop reductions or withdrawals from Libya for the present.

BURD IS RETIRED

Switch-Around Made Among Heads Of Vancouver Province—Winnipeg Man to Coast

MONTREAL, Nov. 19. (CP)—F. J. Burd, vice-president and managing director of the Vancouver Daily Province, has retired and becomes president of the Province and director of the Southam Publishing Co. Ltd.

M. E. Nichols of the Winnipeg Tribune succeeds Mr. Burd as vice-president and managing director of the Province with Roy W. Brown, managing editor of the Province, promoted to vice-president and assistant general manager of the Province.

Conscription In China Decided On

Nationalist Party Congress Instructs Nanking Government To Put It Into Effect

NANKING, Nov. 19.—Delegates to the Nationalist Party Congress here decided to instruct the government to enforce a program of nation-wide conscription for military service.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19. (CP)—Bar silver was unchanged at 65 3/4 per ounce on the local metal market today.

Two Thousand Ethiopians Are Reported Killed By Italians From Air in Northern Battle

Abysinnian Troops Were Caught in Narrow Valley South Of Makale and Rained Upon With Bombs And Machine Gun Fire From Planes

ASMARA, Eritrea, Nov. 19. (CP)—About two thousand Ethiopians, it was officially reported today, were killed by twenty Italian bombing planes including two flown by sons of Premier Benito Mussolini. There was a two-hour battle with a strong Ethiopian land force in the course of which every Fascist machine is stated to have scored an average of a dozen hits.

Col. Julian Quits Ethiopian Army

Colorful Negro From Harlem Leaving After Break With Emperor Haile Selassie

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 19.—Col. Robert Julian, a colorful Harlem negro, who has been taking a prominent part in the training of Ethiopian soldiers in modern fighting methods, is leaving Ethiopia following a break with Emperor Haile Selassie, it became known yesterday. He will make a trip around the world, he says, and the expectation is that he will end up in Harlem again.

Stewart Man Dies Suddenly

Late Archie Patterson Was Known In Prince Rupert and Member Of Local Lodge

Information was received through the provincial police here today of the death at Stewart on the night of November 12 of Archie N. Patterson, who was quite well known in Prince Rupert and was a member of Tsimpean Lodge, No. 58, A. F. & A. M., here. He expired in his cabin after having been ill for some time. The coroner, Dr. J. W. Vosburgh, found that death was due to heart failure.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The British government urges that every man, woman and child in Great Britain be provided with gas masks which can now be purchased at 40¢ each. Gas proof chambers, as a precaution against possible future gas attack, in all homes are also urged.

Today's Stocks

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Further notable advances were recorded during the short day of trading on the New York Stock Exchange Saturday. Industrials rose to the highest average since 1931 and the day's turnover of 1,640,000 shares, was the heaviest for a short session since February 1934. Yesterday, however, rather heavy profit-taking set in with 3,230,000 shares turning over and the list was down generally, closing averages being as follows: industrials, 147.05, off .26; rails, 37.18, off .41; utilities, 29.40, up .05; bonds, 96.70, up .07.

Five Provinces Of North China Form New Nation

TOKYO, Nov. 19. (CP)—Five North China provinces are involved in the breakaway from the Nanking government which is expected to result in the formation of the new Japanese controlled nation of Itu this week. The area is about one-third of that of the United States. It is said here that the setting up of this state was the only alternative to a Communist nation there.

Dispatches from Peiping today said that it was reliably reported that Japan had presented an ultimatum to the local military authorities there giving North China until noon Wednesday to reply favorably on the projected independence under Japanese control along similar lines to Manchoukuo.

Still No Sign Of Kingsford-Smith

Plane Sighted Inland Over Siam Was Not That of Famous Australian

SINGAPORE, Nov. 19. (CP)—The report that Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith's plane Lady Southern Cross I had been sighted ten miles inland over Siam a week ago Friday was discredited when another Australian flier, H. F. Broadbent, reported that he had been there about that time and it was probably his plane which had been seen. Royal Air Force fliers, after continuing the search for the celebrated Australian flier and his companion, Tom Pethybridge, who have been missing for twelve days on a hop from Allahabad to Singapore, have given up all hope of the pair being found alive.

Nominations For Quebec Election

Liberals in Field For Every Seat Two Being Elected By Acclamation

QUEBEC, Nov. 19. (CP)—Yesterday was nomination day for the provincial election to be held next Monday. Liberals were nominated in every riding, two being elected without opposition—Peter Bercovitch in Montreal-St. Louis and J. C. A. Turcotte in Richelieu.

Ethiopians Defer Their Big Stand

Emperor Haile Selassie Expected To Visit Front in About Ten Days

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 19. (CP)—It is believed here that Ethiopian forces will not make a determined stand against the Italian invasion until Emperor Haile Selassie leaves in about ten days for the front to set up field headquarters.

Plot to Poison Havana's Water

Spanish Agitator is Placed Under Arrest in Capital of Cuba

HAVANA, Nov. 19.—A plot to poison the water supply of Havana was reported uncovered. An alleged Spanish agitator has been arrested on a wholesale murder charge.

Anniversary Of Legion Will Be Observed Soon

While the executive meeting of the Canadian Legion last evening was mainly in preparation for the regular monthly meeting to be held on Wednesday, plans were also laid for the observance of the tenth anniversary of the Canadian Legion.

After the war several organizations were formed to perpetuate the friendships formed in the army and to see that the case of the returned man was properly dealt with by those in power. Later there grew up different factions. The late Field Marshal Haig saw that the only hope for obtaining a proper recognition of the veteran's problems and arrive at a suitable solution was to sink sectional differences and concentrate on the major problems. This he felt the greatest contribution he could pay to the men who had fought under him and to the dependents of those who were killed. With the same breadth of vision as he had shown in command of the British forces and the same adherence to the principles of co-operation he had observed with the Allied Commanders, he labored to the end that an Empire-wide organization should be established. He succeeded and the tenth anniversary of this, as far as Canada is concerned, will be properly observed next Monday evening at the clubrooms.

The Legion has a membership of 160,000 and is doing unequalled work in serving the country in peace as the members did in war. It has the confidence of the government, no matter what party is in power, for its disinterested assistance is of the greatest value and its knowledge and research into problems of unemployment have been readily recognized by government officials.

Kingdom of God On Earth is Near

Robert Bartlett is Speaker Before British-Israel Society Last Night

At a well-attended meeting last evening of the British-Israel Society in the T&C H Rooms, R. H. W. Bartlett gave an absorbing address on "Israel" and the purpose for which it was formed, "in thee and in thy seed shall all nations of the earth be blessed." The speaker went on to show that God's plan for mankind was a new race of glorious creatures—Children of God. Adam was endowed with perfect physical form, perfect mentality and spirituality. He could commune with his Maker. Man was also given freewill but, in choosing to rebel against God, he forfeited his right to eternal life. Adam kept not his first estate. Then God saw if his cause was to be maintained man must be redeemed. A medium for the Saviour to enter this life must be prepared. Thus the greatest wonder of the ages took place—"For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son." The Pyramid very clearly substantiated this. Mr. Bartlett graphically explained the ascending and descending passages, the scored lines, the step, the well, the chambers, the openings through which the stars in their courses look down, all in that great witness of stone in Egypt which showed the history of mankind and God's plan for his salvation.

Israel today was the leading nation in the world—foremost in mercy, justice and freedom. The time of restitution of all things was near when the blessings promised would come and the way to Life eternal open up to all people. An interesting discussion followed, many taking part. Vice-President Sam Massey was in the chair.

Plant Operating Men of Consolidated Spent Week at Anyox Plant

A. H. Hopkins, R. Gosse, Herbert Clarke, Herbert F. Tiedge and A. J. McDonell, operating department officials of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. from the southern interior, who have been spending the past week at Anyox on company business in connection with future plans of Smelters for the use of the former Granby plant there, were passengers aboard the Catala today returning south. Among other things they are reported to have gone further into the project of power transmission from Anyox to the Big Missouri mine in the Portland Canal district.
