Landings of halibut yesterday were the heaviest so far this season with a number of large American vessels in. Unloading of the fish proceeded normally and all was quiet along the waterfront. There were no halibut arrivals this morning.

Among the American halibutters in yesterday was the Chelan, bringing in a catch of 10,000 pounds after her maiden trip to the fishing grounds. Owned by Capt. Adolph Nelson, formerly of the Kanaga, the Chelan is a six-man boat and was built at Seattle during the past winter. She is 54 feet long and is equipped with a 60 h.p. full diesel engine.
