COMMUNISM SEETHING IN PROVINCE

LONDON IS PREPARING FOR SILVER JUBILEE CELEBRATION

Entire Relief System Must Be Changed Says Premier of Province

Unemployed Delegation Becomes Abusive and is Escorted From Prime Minister's Office—Vancouver Strike Is Quiet With 800 Participating

VICTORIA, April 30: (CP)—Premier T. D. Pattullo, in a statement today, declared that everyone is aware that British Columbia is seething with Communist propaganda and added that there would have to be a change in the entire relief system. "Money to do work will have to be provided and Mr. Hart and Mr. Sloan are now at Ottawa to discuss the situation with the Dominion, the Premier said.

VANCOUVER, April 30: (CP)—The one-hour strike between 3 and 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon in sympathy with relief camp strikers went off quietly with some eight hundred members of the longshoremen's and seafarers' unions participating. Fourteen deepsea and several coastwise vessels were affected.

Roosevelt Was On Air Sunday Night

Chief Executive of United States Discusses Plans For Spending \$4,800,000,000

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 30:—President Franklin D. Roosevelt gave another of his fireside radio talks to the nation Sunday evening. He discussed plans for the disbursement of the \$4,800,000,000 public works relief fund. The administration's recovery efforts he characterized as a "great crusade." Unemployment relief rolls for the past winter had been the lowest since 1929, the chief executive declared.

SILVER PRICE DROPS

LONDON, April 30: (CP)—Speculative profit-taking caused a decline of one-sixteenth pence per ounce in silver on the local metal market yesterday, the price dropping to 34 1-16 pence per fine ounce. The New York price dropped 1c to 75½c. There was no change in the New York price today, the London quotation rising ½ pence to 34 11-16 pence.


Amount Pledged Now \$20,132.00

Pittsburgh Pirates pounded seven Cub hurlers but suffered a 12 to 11 loss to Chicago and dropped to fifth place, the Cubs moving to third spot. The St. Louis Cardinals with the assistance of Paul Dean's good pitching, downed the Cincinnati Reds who fell back into sixth place.

In the American League, Detroit Tigers converted fifteen hits into eighteen runs to score a slugging shut-out over the St. Louis Browns. New York Yankees shut-out Washington to oust the Senators from third place and present a real threat for the league supremacy.

TWELVE UNITED STATES PLANES FLY TO ALASKA

SEATTLE, April 30: (CP)—The vanguard of many naval surface and aircraft which will visit Alaska this summer for manoeuvres, twelve United States Navy planes, left here at 8:40 yesterday morning and passed over Nanaimo at 10 a.m. One hundred and seventy-five surface craft, submarines, destroyers, battleships and cruisers, 600 planes and 60,000 men will take part this summer in Pacific manoeuvres between California and Hawaii, many in Alaska waters.

GOVERNOR ADAMANT

Looks Like Walter McGee Will Have To Pay With Life For Kidnap Of May McElroy

JACKSON CITY, Mo., April 30:—It appeared unlikely last night that the Governor of Missouri intended any action in the way of commuting the death sentence upon Walter McGee, who is condemned to die on May 10 for the kidnapping of Mary McElroy, daughter of the city manager of Kansas City. Miss McElroy and others have pleaded direct with the Governor for commutation of the sentence to life imprisonment.

SUMMER TRAINS

Time-Table This Year Will Be Largely the Same as That Of Last Year

Effective about the middle of June, summer train service will go into effect on the local line of the Canadian National Railways. The service will be practically the same as last year, providing for two full passenger and two mixed trains weekly in each direction.

Trains will leave for the east at 6 o'clock Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday evenings, the Wednesday and Friday trains having full passenger equipment while Monday and Tuesday will be mixed trains.

Full passenger trains will arrive from the east at 2:15 Monday and Saturday afternoons while mixed trains will arrive Tuesday and Thursday nights at 10:20.

The summer steamship service, details of which have already been announced, will be largely similar to that of last year except for the special Alaska cruises by the steamer Prince Robert which are additional.

While they prefer the nuns, Mr. and Mrs. Oliva Dionne, parents of the quintuplets, assert that they will not be satisfied until they are given complete control of their five little girls.

KILLED IN CAR CRASH

Harry C. Borbridge, Ontario Politician, and His Nephew Lose Lives Near Simcoe

SIMCOE, Ont., April 30: (CP)—Harry C. Borbridge, defeated Conservative candidate for West Elgin in the federal by-election last September, and his nephew, Charles M. Borbridge, were killed yesterday when their automobile crashed into a tree near here.

King and Queen Back At Buckingham Palace From Windsor Castle

His Majesty Reported to be in Best of Health—Premier Bennett to Ride With South African Prime Minister In Procession Next Week

LONDON, April 30: (CP)—King George and Queen Mary returned today from Windsor Castle to Buckingham Palace to prepare for the Silver Jubilee celebration opening on May 6. The thanksgiving service at St. Paul's Cathedral on that day will be preceded by six carriage processions. The Prime Ministers of the Empire will form the first, Premier Bennett of Canada, and Premier Hertzog of South Africa riding together. Royalty will ride in the last two processions. Finally climaxing the spectacle, the King and Queen will ride together from Buckingham Palace to St. Paul's. The military aspect of the celebration will be moderated to a minimum.

The King is reported to be in the best of health.

TAKE OVER CANNERIES

Pacific American Acquires Booth Plants in Alaska

BELLINGHAM, April 30: (CP)—Plans of the Pacific American Fisheries to purchase the Alaska canneries of the Booth Salmon Co. were approved by the stockholders of the company on Monday.

No Change In Liver Dispute

Meeting of Halibut Boat Owners Fails to Materialize—Basis Of Settlement

There was no meeting of the halibut boat owners yesterday as had been expected in some quarters. The boat owners appear to be taking a disinterested attitude in regard to the halibut liver dispute, some seeming to believe that there is nothing to meet about.

While no official announcement has been made, it seems to be the opinion of some of the boat owners that, if the fishermen requested, the arrangement by which four trips would be given without the boats taking share of halibut livers might be revived.

BOND CHANGE IS RATIFIED

Provincial Government Puts Order-In-Council Through Validating Local Interest Cut

VICTORIA, April 30: (CP)—An order-in-council was signed by the government yesterday empowering the City of Prince Rupert to exchange all its outstanding debt to new debentures at a lower rate of interest, namely four percent. Seventy-two percent of the bondholders have agreed to the change.

Fines This Year In City Heavier

Total of \$165 Collected During April, Bringing Year's Aggregate To \$817

Police court fines in Prince Rupert for the month of April this year totalled \$190 as compared with \$165 in the same month last year. So far this year fines have totalled \$817 as against \$654 in the first four months of 1934.

NO TAXES FOR WAR

There is a growing feeling throughout the country that no country should be taxed for war. During the last war many young men gave their lives for their country. Other young men were more or less permanently incapacitated for making a living and some even yet are suffering for their patriotism. During that time a few people became rich on war profits. But the whole country today, every individual, no matter how poor, is taxed to pay for the four years of patriotic experience.

The Native Sons of Canada suggest that in future the people of the country shall not be taxed for any war. If it is found necessary to fight, the government of the day shall for the time being take over all the wealth of the country and use it as it sees fit in carrying on the war. At the end of the campaign, it is to be supposed the money or property or securities will be returned to the former owners less the amount needed in the war. Then the country would not be encumbered as it is today in order to pay for something that should have been paid at the time. No more war debts would be incurred unless it was found necessary to borrow from some other country.

It would not be necessary for the government of the day to stop any industry in order to take over the wealth of the country. The people now operating would carry on. The only difference would be that they would then be working for the government instead of for themselves.

There is a very strong feeling, at any rate in the west, against conscription of men without conscripting wealth. It is considered that the people who carry on the government think more of money than they do of men. Their patriotism consists in sending someone else to fight the battles. Should the country be involved in war there will be a strong popular demand for all to share alike in the sacrifices she is called upon to make. This demand will be insisted on by many war veterans who feel that they did more than their share when they offered their lives while others made themselves rich.

WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Lining having been completed, loading of the British freighter Paris City with a full cargo of grain for the United Kingdom or Continent commenced at the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator at 1:20 yesterday afternoon. It is expected that it will be Wednesday night at the earliest before the vessel has completed loading and will be ready to sail. While no official notification has yet been received, it is reported that another grain ship may be here to load in May.

There was no change in the local halibut fishing situation yesterday following the declaration of the strike at the week-end by the Deep Sea Fishermen's Union. Landings of halibut yesterday were the heaviest so far this season with a number of large American vessels in. Unloading of the fish proceeded normally and all was quiet along the waterfront. There were no halibut arrivals this morning.

Among the American halibutters in yesterday was the Chelan, bringing in a catch of 10,000 pounds after her maiden trip to the fishing grounds. Owned by Capt. Adolph Nelson, formerly of the Kanaga, the Chelan is a six-man boat and was built at Seattle during the past winter. She is 54 feet long and is equipped with a 60 h.p. full diesel engine.

Armour Salvage Co.'s power tug Daly, Capt. Oscar Haveroy, left at noon yesterday for Vancouver, having in tow a scowload of salvaged machinery and equipment from the old B. C. Packers cold storage plant at Claxton which has been re-sold in the south. It is expected the Daly will be away about ten days. Capt. W. P. Armour, head of the Armour Salvage Co., sailed on the Catala this afternoon for a brief business trip to Vancouver.

Union steamer Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, returned to port at 1:15 this afternoon from Anyox, Stewart and other northern points and sailed an hour later for Vancouver and waypoints. The vessel was delayed by loading box shooks at Georgetown.
