When the mayor granted their request that they be allowed to parade away they did so behind mounted city constables About 250 city. provincial and Royal Canadian Mounted Police constables surrounded the Square Near midnight, after the police

had raided two of the unemployed headquarters, a crowd of about two thousand gathered at Carrall and Hastings Street and were dispersed by the police only after a series of battles. A few windows were broken. Six police officers and a number of strikers were injured, none seriously. Seventeen arrests were made.

Mayor McGeer declared that 'there is a definite organization of communistic activities centering on calling a general strike in Vancouver." He forbade further parades or disturbances.

The camp strikers, cut off relief, have run out of money raised by the recent tag day and other subscriptions with which to eat.

Bristol Bay Salmon Situation is Serions-First Big Halibut Boats at Seattle-Alaska Fishermen Go

Delegate Anthony J. Dimond of Alaska, who has been urging, at Washington, with the backing of a resolution from the Alaska Territorial Legislature, that the fishing regulations of Bristol Bay area this year, calling for a complete closure of that district to all salmon fishing in the interests of conservation. be so relaxed as to permit resident lishermen to take a limited amount of fish commercially, has been advised by Secretary of Commerce Roper that the request could not be complied with and that the complete closing must go into effect with the possibility, however, that if it was found sufficient fish were running, the area might be opened to a limited amount of commercial fishing. The first consideration, was emphasized by the Secretary, just be conservation, this being ssential if complete depletion and consequent permanent loss of livelihood to the fishermen was not to be the result. The Secretary stressed the serious situation which had been already brought about by overfishing.
