to People Believed Only Way Out of Present Political Impasse

PARIS, June 6: (CP) - The possibility of an early general election being held in France in the hope of a mandate being given for the formation of a stable ministry with increased authority on fiscal, matters is being discussed. In view of the present complexion of the Chamber of Deputies, with its many political factions, it appears unlikely that any permanent cabinet can be formed. Former Premier Edouard Herriot yesterday declined President Albert Lebrun's invitation to form a government. Former Premier Pierre Laval was then called upon but gave up the
