EIGHT HOUR DAY BILL

Editor, Daily News:-

In your issue of February 23 you speculate in an editorial as to the purpose of the Dominion government's introduction of the Eight Hour Day bill in view of the fact that the province of British Columbia has had this tegislation (with exceptions) for some years.

British Columbia is the most progressive among the provinces in legislation of this nature but, as some of the eastern provinces, particularly Quebec and Ontario, have not been as progressive, this has worked to the disadvantage of British Columbia which has to compete with the industrial conditions obtaining in Quebec and Ontario. The evidence of the Stevens price spread commission has shown how abominable these conditions are and how tabor has been exploited

With the enactment of the Eight Hour Day, the Six Day Week, etc., the federal government will have placed each province in Canada on equal footing, removing this disability, and British Columbia will be the gainer with the correction of these abominable conditions.

The federal government having assumed jurisdiction in these matters and, having undisputed jurisdiction in trade, is competent to BOWLING correct, by tariff or duty, the competition of those backward countries who, by labor exploitation, compete with Canada to its disad-



Not satisfied with an already long ilst of outstanding achievements, this aeroplane, the only all-metal tri-motor in use in Canada, is writing more history under the expert guidance of Pilot Grant McConachie, of United Air Transport. In 1928 this big machine rescued Baron Gunther von Huenfeld, Capt. James Fit maurice and Capt. Hermann Koehl, after they were first down in the first east to west transatlantic flight on lonely Greenly island off the coast of Labrador. Then it flew the mother of Col.
