THE NEXT SENATOR

It is to be presumed that Senator A. E. Planta will be resigning from the Senate thus causing a vacancy for Premier Mackenzie King to fill.

In looking over the field of prospective appointees there seems to be no outstanding person in the Liberal ranks in the south who might have claims on the government. Then we come to Prince Rupert and in this city we find a possibility or may we say a probability in the sitting member for Skeena.

Prince Rupert today has one member at Ottawa. If Olof Hanson were appointed to the Senate and another member elected in his place to represent Skeena, the district would have two members at Ottawa who would use their influence in time of need. L. W. Patmore is also mentioned as a possibility for the vacant position and so is M. P. McCaffery. In any case there seems no good reason why the north should not be recognized on this occasion. So far there has never been a northern senator. Any of the mentioned would represent the district well and would do honor to the August Upper Chamber. Doubtless, there are others in the Liberal ranks who should be mentioned but there are certain qualifications that have to be met and only a few people here can meet them and presumably one qualification is that a man be a Liberal who has stood by the party in good times and bad and who may be expected to take Liberal views of national affairs even when he passes from the realm of stirring activity to that of comparative quiescence.

THE MUSEUM

The Prince Rupert Museum Board has come to life again after a period during which owing to financial stress it was impossible to make any headway. It is now proposed to assemble everything available in a central building with a custodian in charge working under the two curators and the chairman of the board. An application is being forwarded to the Carnegie Corporation for a grant toward fitting up the room and making it ready for the specimens.

When tourists come to Prince Rupert on a wet day there is no place for them to go and nothing for them to see. A museum would be interesting and educative to them as well as having educative value for Prince Rupert people, especially the younger people. If, as suggested, the museum collection were housed in a building amid totem poles patterned after the ancient native houses, all visitors would want to see it and it is possible that a charge for admission might be made to defray the expenses of upkeep.

COMEDY IS WELL DONE

"Bunty Pulls Strings" Makes Excellent Entertainment at Presbyterian Church

A large audience was delightfully entertained last night at the First Presbyterian Church when an excellent cast under the direction of Rev. W. D. Grant Hollingworth presented Graham Moffat's three-act comedy "Bunty Pulls the Strings." Well directed and staged this presentation will rank with the best amateur plays presented in this city. It will be repeated tonight.

Harold Iverson, as Rab Biggar, teen-aged son of a provision merchant and elder, gives a very good representation of a much-repressed youth rebelling at stern parental control. His sister, Bunty Biggar, played by Miss Maisie Macdonald, is the centre figure around whom the plot is built. Bunty represents the type of woman who has a flare and desire for managing things and people and her part is very well acted by Miss Macdonald. At the start of the play Bunty is quite amorously inclined towards her fiance, "Weelum" Sprout, a joiner and newly appointed elder, but this attitude abruptly changes and Bunty becomes cold and impersonal. The change is too rapid for the short space of time elapsing. E. J. Smith, as the slow-witted joiner, is very good but one would like to see more made of the final embrace. The impression received was that to get it over, surely not a natural desire on the part of a fiance, even though he be slow-witted.

Susie Simpson, a sharp-tongued virago trying to make the most of her financial hold on Tammias Biggar, the widowed father of Bunty and Rab, is excellently portrayed by Mrs. R. Cameron. The part of Tammias Biggar, the pompous, stern parent and elder of the kirk, is well played by W. M. Blackstock. Tammias, however, did not react to the public denouement of his character and one got the impression that, while he was not speaking, Tammias reverted to Mr. Blackstock. Apart from this the part was well done.

Elen Dunlop, an old fiance of Tammias Biggar was well played by Miss Sheila Stuart as was also the part of her niece, played by Miss Helen Lachie. Robert Cameron, playing the part of Jeems Gibb, the parish beadle, gave a very good interpretation of his role and imparted a humorous note in the second act that was much enjoyed. Mrs. James Simpson and W. M. Brown, in their respective roles as village gossip and village policeman, gave very good performances.

Elders, villagers and other kirkgoers in the play were enacted by Jean Cameron, Grace Lee, Annie McLeod, Olive Munro, Jean Mitchell, George Mitchell, Marjorie Smith, Bet O'Neill, Ruthana Wood, Elsie Finley, Molly Frew, Helen Walker, Arthur Davey and J. A. Teng. The acting of these people was very well done and lent an atmosphere of realism so often lacking in group scenes.

The staging of the play was well done although it is unfortunate that a larger stage is not available.

Stage management was under the direction of C. G. Ham with James Simpson acting as electrician. M. J. Dougherty was in charge of make-up with Mrs. W. D. Grant Hollingworth, W. L. Sandison and James Hadden as assistants. Mrs. J. S. Black and her orchestra played during the intermissions.

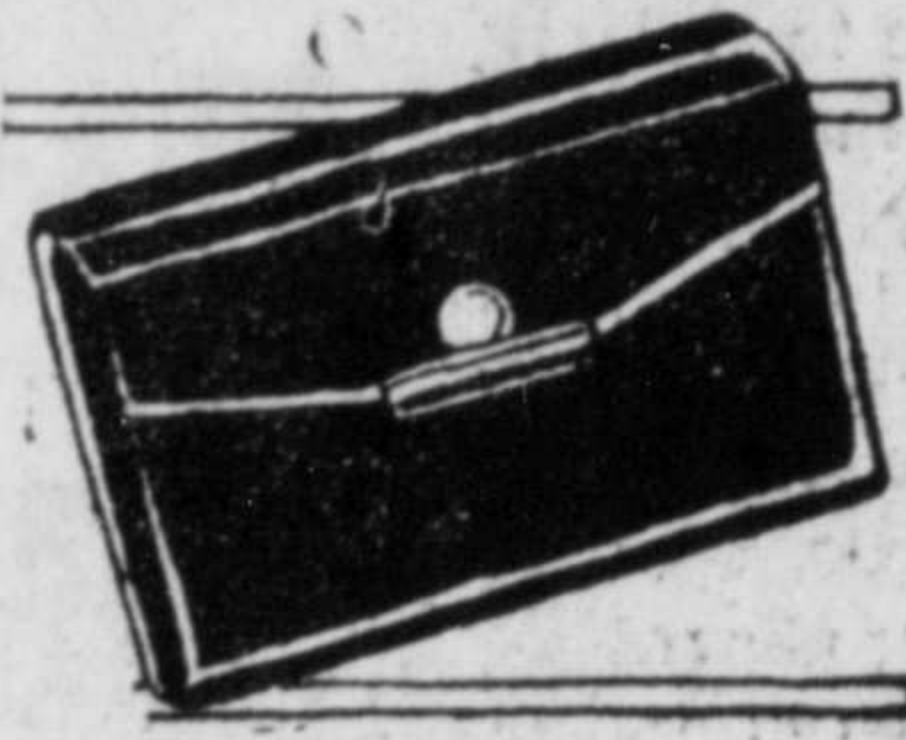

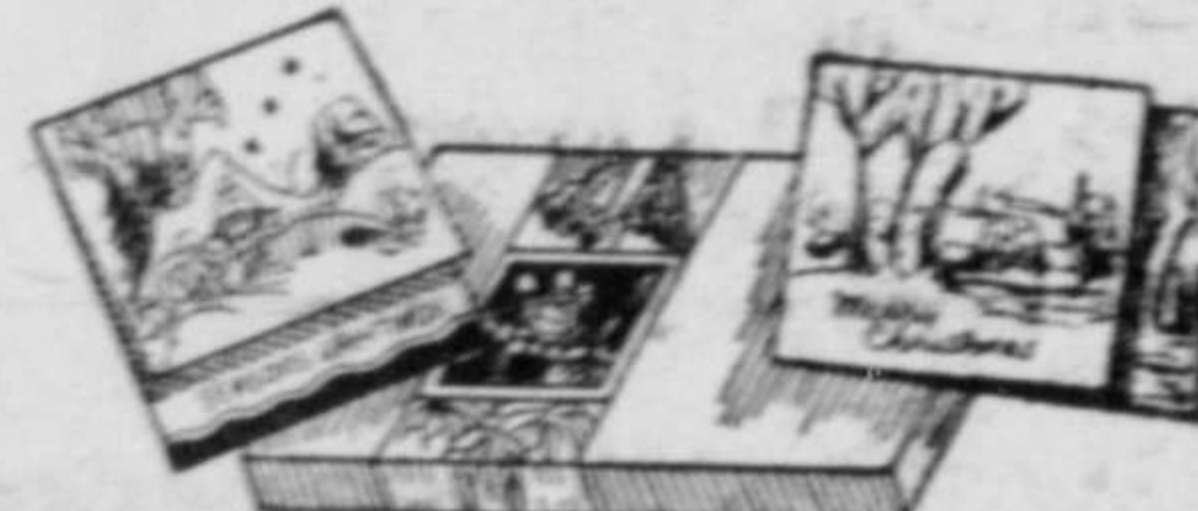

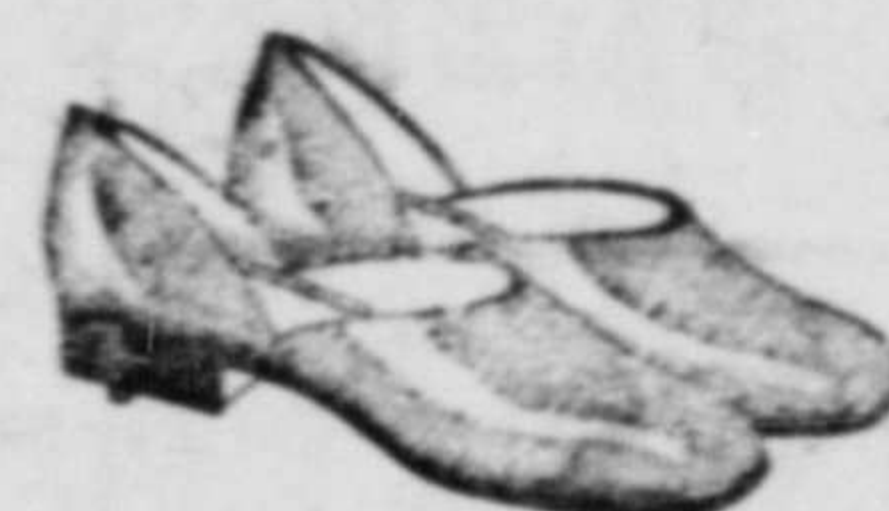
