



ADVANTAGES OF INTERNATION-AL CO-OPERATION IN CON-TROL OF FISHERIES STRES-SED BY FOUND.

(Continued from Page 1)

at St. Pierre and Miquelon. The fishery problems that had be settled between the United States and Canada had been a constant source of friction since the Declaration of Independence. The treaty of 1783 dealt largely with the fisheries. Following the war of 1812 it was found impossible to agree and hostilities threatened to break out again but in 1818 United States gave up her original claims. However, in 1845 open conflict again! threatened and the Treaty of Washington in 1871 again dealt with this problem. In 1888 a new treaty was made but was turned down by the Senate of the United States and it went to arbitration, differences being evenually settled at The Hague where the rights and privileges of each country were exactly specified.

Since that time efforts toward co-operation have taken the place of disputes. About sixty years ago a new era in the fishing industry commenced. The application of steam to fishing vessels accompanied the extension of the railway systems and artificial refrigeration all of which tended to make a wider distribution of fish so that fresh fish was supplied to almost every part of Europe.

City Unable To Comply With Request Of Teachers, Commissioner Decides

City Commissioner W. J. Alder has replied to an application of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association for an increase of ten percent in salary to the effect that the city is not in a position at this time to grant an increase to teachers or any other department of civic service.
