TOLL FROM INFLUENZA ATBARROW

Sudden Epidemic, Brought From South by Plane, Has Claimed Eight Lives

POINT BARROW, Alaska, May 4: A sudden influenza epidemic has claimed eight lives here. Dr. Henry Greist, Presbyterian medical missionary, says he hopes the crest of the epidemic has now been reached. He believes the disease was brought here by a plane from the south.

Thirty cases of the malady developed on April 20 and, since then, three hundred more have occurred All the dead have been over forty with the average age six'y-five.

> One arresting indication that the old order of things had been swept away for ever was forthcoming in 1917. The King announced that the House of Hanover had ceased to be so far as Britain was concerned. In future the Royal House of England would be known as the House of Windsor. Truth to tell, this alteration was long overdue, for the Kingdom of Hanover, over which a woman was not permitted to rule, had ceased to be an appanage of the British Crown when Victoria came to the throne. In commanding the name to be changed, the King also commanded that those princes of his family who were his subjects and who bore German names and titles should straightaway relinquish them and assume British

Old Order Changed On Armistice Day in 1918, when the guns had ceased, an indefinable impulse took London nyriads to the Palace.

"We want King George." That stentorian shout from thousands of throats was repeated again and again. It remains unforgettable. In the four years intervening many thrones had been swept away but the throne of Britain, "broad-based upon a people's will," stood more stabilized than ever in its thousand years' history.

Not First In Line

When he was 26 years old George, younger son of the Prince of Wales who was afterwards Edward VII, had little thought that he would eyer be called to the sovereignity of this realm. Still less did he apprehend that he would hold the Crown of Great Britain aloft through the years in which crowns throughout the world were being thrown in the dust and their wearers banished or butchered by their sub-

Prince George in 1892 had just been created Duke of York, a title which for some years had been reserved for a younger son of the British monarch. LIFE EVENTS KING GEORGE

1865-Born in Marlborough House, London, second son of Edward, Prince of Wales, later King Edward VII.

1880-With his older brother, Prince Albert, made cruise to South America, South Africa, Fiji Islands, Australia, Japan, Ceylon, Egypt, Palestine and Greece, as midshipman.

891-Appointed commander in Royal Navy and placed in command of H. M. S. Melampus. 1892-Became heir apparent to the throne on the death of

Prince Albert. 893-Married Princess Victoria Mary, daughter of the Duke and Duchess of Teck.

1894-His first son, Albert Edward, present Prince of Wales, was born.

1901-Made tour of the dominions, opening first parliament of Commonwealth of Australia. visiting New Zealand, South Africa and Canada.

While other throne have tottered and some have fallen, the British throne seems today more secure than it did twenty-five years ago. There is today less talk in the country of possible Canadian independence or of joining the United States than was evident when Goldwin Smith and others openly espoused a change. As Canadians survey the world they see nothing they prefer to our present British connection. A few irresponsible admirers of Russia point with pride to that country but that is because they are ignorant of the conditions that obtain there. There is more liberty in a square yard of British soil than in a thousand miles of Russian. Changes may be necessary and will be made but we can honestly feel that in no country of the world is it possible to make those changes as easily as in Canada.

The world today, in spite of certain tendencies toward nationalism, is becoming more international. Possibly our sons may see a world in which there will be as close a bond among all nations as between the nations of the British Empire. But that will not make us less Canadian and, let us hope, not less British. May the King live long to carry on his work at the head of a wonderful Empire in which Canada will be among the leaders.






