TASCHEREAU GOV'T HAS CLOSE CALL

Huge Majority Cut To Margin of Six; Fight Has Only Begun--Gouin

Victory of New Liberal Movement, Which Captured Twenty-Six Seats, Was Feature of Contest—Two Cabinet Ministers Are Defeated

MONTREAL, Nov. 26: (CP)—The Quebec Liberal government headed by Premier L. A. Taschereau emerged victorious from Monday's provincial general election but with a narrow margin over the combined opposition of Conservatives and the new Action Libérale Nationale party. The government won forty-eight seats and the opposition alliance forty-two after the keenest and closest election in the history of the province. In the last provincial election the government won seventy-nine out of the ninety seats. The success of the vigorous attack of the opposition was surprising even to its own most enthusiastic supporters. The feature of the contest was the inroads made upon government strength by the new Liberal youth movement which carried twenty-six seats while the Conservatives captured sixteen.

Final figures, subject to revision, when the votes in a number of close constituencies are recounted, are as follows:

- Liberals, 47. Independent Liberal, one. Conservatives, 16. Action Libérale Nationale, 26. The Independent Liberal is a consistent government supporter.

All party leaders were elected—Premier Taschereau in Montmorency, Paul Gouin, leader of Action Libérale Nationale, in L'Assomption and Maurice Duplessis, Conservative leader, in Three Rivers. Duplessis will be official leader of the Opposition, the policies of which, however, will be dictated by the third party.

Two Ministers Defeated Two cabinet ministers were defeated—Hon. C. J. Arcand, minister of labor, and Hon. Irene Vaurin, minister of colonization. The latter went down in Montreal-St. John at the hands of Louis Auger, Action Libérale Nationale.

Before the ridings had all reported, it appeared for a while that there might be a tie but the later constituencies to give their returns all went Liberal to assure the return of the government. Gaspé, North and Two Mountains were the last seats to report, both going Liberal.

Among the seats which Action Libérale Nationale captured from the government were Quebec Centre, Chicoutimi, Champlain, Montreal-St. Mary's, Maurice, Frontenac, Montreal-St. Henri, Frontenac, Quebec East, Montreal-St. Anne and Jacques Cartier.

Fight Has Only Begun Paul Gouin, leader of Action Libérale Nationale, following the announcement of the results, declared that the fight had only begun. He said "inconceivably fraudulent manoeuvres elected some Liberal candidates and there will be contestations in certain constituencies."

Request of Attorney General of Ontario Being Accorded To

OTTAWA, Nov. 26:—The Department of Justice announces that it has acceded to a request of Attorney General Roebuck of Ontario that an investigation be made in connection with the conviction and sentencing to fifteen years' imprisonment of David Meisner for the kidnapping of Joseph Labatt. Meisner has consistently protested his innocence.

Seventy-Five Die in Storm

ROME, Nov. 26:—The death list as a result of the violent storm at the end of last week in Southern Italy and Sicily is now placed at seventy-five. With the fury of the elements subsiding, rescue workers are now carrying on their work.

STATE OF SEIGE DECLARED IN BRAZIL

CHINESE GOVERNMENT IS MOVING TO CHECK SPREAD OF NEW STATE

Meantime There is Every Indication That Autonomy Move, Inspired by Japan, May Cover Much Greater Area

SHANGHAI, Nov. 26: (CP)—The Chinese central government moved today to check the North China autonomy movement by adoption of a sweeping five-point program of administrative reforms including an order for the dismissal and arrest of General Yin Ju-Keng, Chinese administrator of the demilitarized zone and self-appointed chairman of the newly formed East Hopei autonomous state.

CLIPPER ON FOURTH LAP

Great Flying Boat Flies From Midway To Wake Island

WAKE ISLAND, Nov. 26:—The giant new flying boat China Clipper of the Pan-American Airways arrived here at 6:40 last night after covering the 1240 miles from Midway Island in 8 1/2 hours. It landed at Midway Islands Sunday night at 6 o'clock after completing the second lap—1320 miles—in 9 hours and six minutes, attaining an average speed of 147 miles per hour in clear, sunny weather.

The China Clipper left Alameda at 3:45 Friday afternoon and landed at Honolulu Saturday noon from California, a distance of 2400 miles, and left Honolulu at 6:30 Sunday morning for Midway Island whence she came on here.

She left this morning for Guam Islands, the last stop before her destination, the Philippine Islands, where she is due at 4 o'clock on the afternoon of November 29.

Capt. Edwin Musiek and R. O. D. Sullivan, his second in command, describe it as a "routine trip." There was a crew of six and fourteen passengers and 1700 pounds of mail.

Another Ship Arrives SAN DIEGO, Nov. 26:—The Philippine Clipper, sister of the China Clipper, arrived here from her builders enroute to Alameda and will be commissioned in the Trans-Pacific service of Pan American Airways, leaving December 6 for the Philippine Islands. Another ship, Honolulu Clipper, will be arriving later.

DROP OIL SANCTIONS

League of Nations Committee Defers Action—U. S. May Stop Sending Cotton

Parleys Held

Conflicting Reports Continue To Come From Seat of War In Africa

GENEVA, Nov. 26: (CP)—The sanctions committee of the League of Nations has postponed until Friday the session at Geneva scheduled for yesterday to consider the extension of the sanctions list against Italy as being the aggressor in the East African campaign. It is understood officially that no action will be taken at this time on the matter of an oil embargo against Italy. Premier Laval of France has requested postponement of such action and Great Britain is willing. Russia and Roumania have offered to back up an oil embargo if other nations would join in.

Other articles to which it is now proposed the sanctions should apply include steel, iron and coal. Great Britain, it is authoritatively stated, will favor the extension of the sanctions to these commodities.

In a conference at Paris, Premier Pierre Laval of France advised Sir George Clarke, British ambassador, that extreme caution should be exercised in imposing an oil embargo against Italy.

The government of the United States, having already expressed itself against supplying oil to the belligerents, may now endeavor to prevent the export of cotton to either country, it was intimated on Saturday by Secretary of State Cordell Hull.

From Rome it was reported that Italian officials declared, with emergency measures, they could get along for a year, at home and in Africa, without feeling a shortage of oil. Gasoline now sells at \$1.20 a gallon there. Oil companies have been ordered by the government to keep all gasoline and oil tanks filled to capacity. Italy continues its program to boycott goods of sanctions-approving nations.

Conflicting reports continue as to the tide of battle in Ethiopia.

All Available Forces Mustered to Put Down Revolt of Communists

Plot to Enlist Troops in Centre of Rio de Janeiro Into Movement Thwarted Today—Pernambuco and Natal Centres of Unrest

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 26: (CP)—The Brazilian government today imposed a state of siege over the entire nation and has mustered all available forces to combat a revolt in the northeastern portion of the country. An alleged plot to enlist troops quartered in the heart of Rio de Janeiro was thwarted today. The revolt, which is strongly communistic, is centred in the states of Pernambuco and Rio Grande de Norte, forty to sixty deaths being reported from fighting in Pernambuco and Natal, the latter city being in control of the revolutionists.

The authorities announced last night that the revolt had been quashed but it broke out again with renewed force together with showing signs of extending.

C. C. F. HAS FULL SLATE FOR CIVIC ELECTION CONTEST

VANCOUVER, Nov. 26: (CP)—Backed by a platform of Socialist planks covering almost every phase of civic affairs, a full slate of candidates will be entered by the Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation in the December elections for aldermen and school and parks board members.

Degree Is Given Lord Tweedsmuir

New Governor General of Canada Honored by McGill University With LL.D.—Visits Toronto

TORONTO, Nov. 26: (CP)—Lord Tweedsmuir, the new Governor General of Canada, and Lady Tweedsmuir paid their first official visit to Toronto yesterday. There was a reception at the Parliament Buildings at which Acting Premier Nixon and Mayor James Simpson played a leading part.

At Montreal MONTREAL, Nov. 26:—During his first official visit to Montreal at the end of the week, the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws was conferred upon Lord Tweedsmuir, the new Governor General of Canada, by McGill University. His Excellency addressed a gathering of the Canadian Club.

France Will Demand This at London Naval Conference, It Is Announced

PARIS, Nov. 26:—At the naval conference to be held in London on December 9 abandonment of the ratio limitations as set out in the Washington Treaty, which is about to expire, will be demanded by France, it is officially announced.

Pilot Barr Takes Off After Being Held by Weather

VANDERHOOF, Nov. 26:—Pilot L. F. Barr, well known northern flier, after having been grounded here for a week owing to unfavorable weather, hopped off yesterday for Atlin via Hazelton and Telegraph Creek. He was to have joined the search for Mr. and Mrs. Walter Simpson, who were missing for a month on the Stikine River but who were found yesterday.

France is Still Trying to Keep Its Gold Home

PARIS, Nov. 26: (CP)—The Bank of France raised its discount rate yesterday from five to six percent, the third raise in ten days, due to the continued flow of gold from its vaults.

The liner Alaunia, sailing from Le Havre for New York on Sunday, took \$20,000,000 of the yellow metal.

Former President Of Toronto Fair And Wife Killed

TORONTO, Nov. 26:—Robert Miller, prominent Ontario livestock grower and former president of the Canadian National Exposition, and his wife were instantly killed when their car was struck by a train at a level crossing north of Toronto. Mr. Miller was seventy-eight years of age.

Earl Jellicoe Is Interred Close To Hero of Trafalgar

LONDON, Nov. 26: (CP)—With every mark of honor the Royal Navy and sister services could offer and amidst the stately but simple ritual of the Anglican Church, the body of Admiral Jellicoe was laid yesterday within St. Paul's Cathedral close by the crypts of Admiral Lord Nelson and other heroes of Trafalgar.

Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner, and Commodore Percy Nelles R. C. N., represented Canada at the funeral.

The closing hymn was "Eternal Father, Strong to Save," a favorite of Earl Jellicoe.

EXCURSION TO RUPERT

Canadian National Giving Cent A Mile Trip Again, Arriving Here December 10

Peter Lachie, district freight and passenger agent for the Canadian National Railways, announces that a special excursion will be run again into Prince Rupert next month for the benefit of interior people as far east as Prince Rupert. The rate will be approximately one cent a mile for the round trip. People taking advantage of the special fares will arrive here on the night of December 10 and may leave on their return home either December 11 or December 13.

Such excursions as this have now been run for two years and have proven quite popular.

GREAT BRITAIN, FRANCE AND GERMANY AGREE ON QUESTION OF DEFENCE

The party felt itself well entrenched but the old Whig complacency was considerably disturbed by the rise of the young Liberals under Paul Gouin, son of the well known statesman, Sir Lomer Gouin. This group showed radical tendencies and assaulted the Taschereau stronghold with such effect that it retains power only by a narrow majority.

While the Taschereau Government won, the contest was really a great victory for the Young Liberals or "L'Action Liberale Nationale." The name signifies that the members are Liberal and that they are the section of the party that believe in action. The Conservative strength was due largely to a loose alliance it had with these young Liberals.

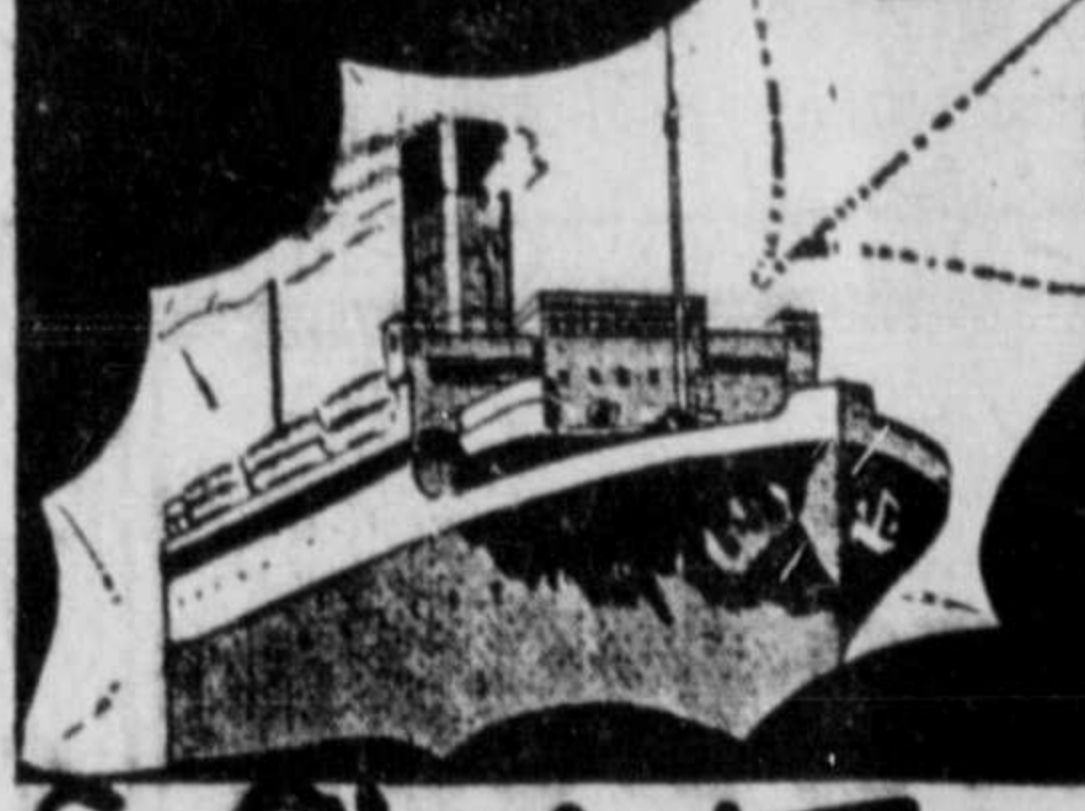

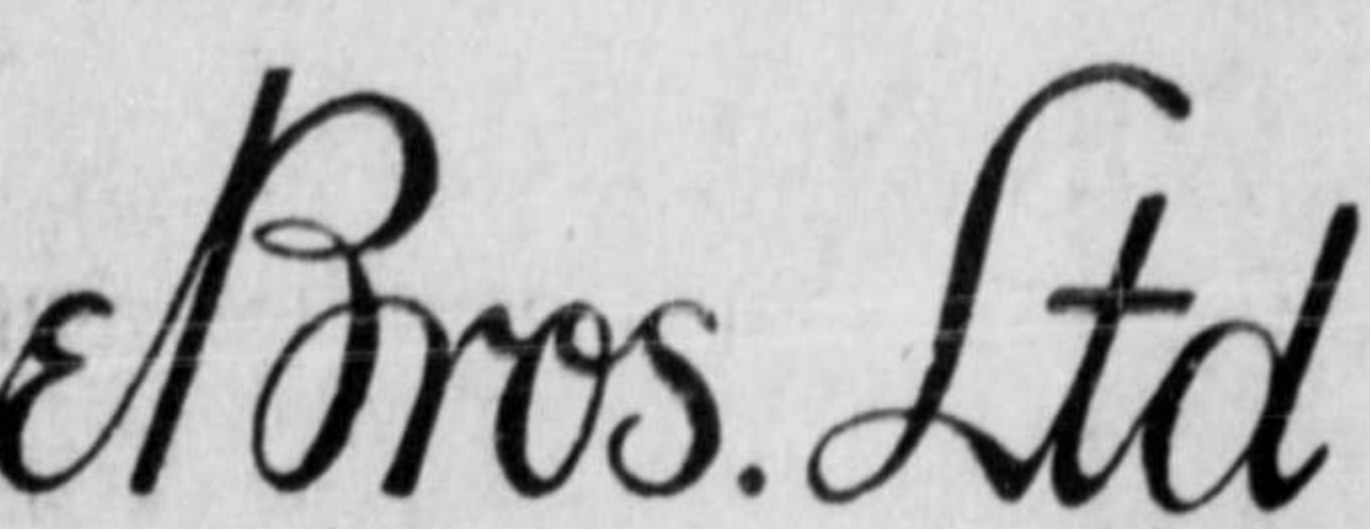
