

# Several Men, Including Two Police, Injured in Interior Strike Clash

Unemployed Barricaded Road and Threw Rocks at Approaching Truck Laden With Workers-Officers Fired Shots Over Heads of Demonstrators

## A CONSERVATIVE VIEWPOINT

Evidently the Conservative party is not very sanguine Club. Bert Phillips, secretary of the of the possibility of winning the federal election. The Vancouver Province, which usually favors the Conservative side discusses in an editorial article the possibility of Premier Bennett dropping out of the fight on the advice of his Harley Street specialists. It points out the tremendous strain of completing the session and campaigning through a general election and says:

"There are a lot of possibilities to consider in connection with Mr. Bennett's decision. If the decision is to fight the campaign through, it is not at all certain the end will be victory. If there had been an appeal to the country immediately following the series of radio addresses in January, victory might have come on the tide of a new hope. But the tide has swelled and ebbed. The opportunity has passed and any victory that comes now must be hardly won. If Mr. Bennett should start the campaign and be forced out in mid-course, that would probably mean the defeat of his party. No new leader could hope to present the Bennett policies with the vigor of the man who formulated them.

"Rut if Mr. Bennett should decide, following the Harley Street advice, that he is through, what then? The Conservative party must have a new leader, and it has been quite apparent of late that the Conservative party is not a unit. It would not all follow Mr. Stevens or Mr. Rhodes. It is hardly likely it would all follow Mr. Meighen or Dr. Manion. There is a possibility, however, that one or other of these leaders could, in an election, command erough support outside the Conservative party to carry him through. There is the possibility of those party realignments that Mr. Bennett predicted so confidently some months ago. There is also a movement on foot for the creation of a national government." If Conservative newspapermen are doubtful about the outcome of the election, it would be perfectly permissible for a newspaper with Liberal sympathies to feel that there is every probability that Mr. Mackenzie King will be the next Prime Minister, supported by a majority of Liberals in the next House of Commons.
