Province May Try To Get Trade

FORMER CROWN PRINCE WILHELM BERLIN, Feb. 8.—Former Crown Prince Wilhelm, who was a general of the Imperial German Army during the Great War, dined this week with Reich President Adolf Hitler, who was a lance-corporal.

VICTORIA, Feb. 8: (CP)—Co-operation with industry to the extent of bartering with other countries wherever "we may be able to jump the tariff hurdles and do business profitably" was suggested by Premier T. D. Pattullo in a public address last night as a course the British Columbia government may take. The Premier spoke over a provincial radio hook-up.

NO PRINTS OF ACCUSED

Expert Fingerprint Witness Testifies on Behalf of Bruno Richard Hauptmann

FLEMINGTON, N.J., Feb. 8.—A fingerprint expert from New York, testifying for the defence at the trial of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, charged with the kidnap-murder of baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh Jr., has testified that of five hundred fingerprints found on the ladder down which the baby was alleged to have been removed from the Hopewell home not one was proven to have been Hauptmann's. Another defence witness declared that incriminating nail holes were not in the ladder when he first examined it a month after the crime. The defence still claims that a number of its witnesses have been intimidated against testifying. It is expected the jury may get the case about next Wednesday.

"We must have outside markets," declared Mr. Pattullo. "We must use our influence in every way possible to induce Ottawa to leave no stone unturned to bring about reciprocal agreements with all countries with whom we can do business advantageously. The Department of Trade and Commerce has been doing good work but I think that the service should be extended. It is our intention to take the matter up with Ottawa."

If no satisfactory arrangements could be made with Ottawa then his own government might find it necessary to co-operate with industry in a barter project, suggested the Premier.

Mr. Pattullo announced that the government does not intend to introduce state health insurance at the approaching session but full opportunity would be given for discussion on the subject by all interested in the coming year. Action on the financial structure of education will also be postponed for another year.

The dead are W. Holford, Walter Holowenko, John Adams, Thomas McCreery, Steve Pettit, Ruben Killins, John Hermanson, Toivo Neime and Ernie Perrie.

Parents of Quints Visiting Chicago

Mr. and Mrs. Oliva Dionne Have Week's Theatrical—May Go To London

CHICAGO, Feb. 8:—Mr. and Mrs. Oliva Dionne, parents of the famous Ontario quintuplets, have arrived here for a week's theatrical engagement. It is their first visit to Chicago and Mr. Dionne is enjoying himself while Mrs. Dionne does not care much for the city.

Yesterday they received a cable from Charles B. Cochran, British theatrical producer, inviting them to visit London in May for the King's Jubilee as guests of the British government.

Insurance policies on each of the quintuplets were taken out yesterday.

Roger Rose, aged 19, member of the Fort William Maroons junior hockey team, who accepted a ride on the truck enroute to Fort William to play in a league game, is not expected to live.

The rest of the men in the truck were employed as relief workers on highway construction.

General Hornby Heard by Legion

Local Veterans' Organization Hears About Settlement Plan From Distinguished Officer

Brigadier General M. L. Hornby of Lethbridge appeared before the local Canadian Legion at a special meeting last night and outlined details of his projected land settlement scheme. Jack Preece, president of the Legion, was in the chair.

General Hornby's visit to the local Legion was of particular interest since he himself served with distinction in France during the Great War with the Imperial forces. He held the rank of major at the start of the war, winning promotion to the high rank he now holds.

General Hornby, who has been here since Sunday, leaves by tonight's train for Edmonton.

Charge of Giving Away Stamps Laid

Postmaster General Farley Under Fire—Investigation Is Called For

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 8:—A resolution which has been placed on the order paper of the House of Representatives calls for an investigation of reports that Postmaster General James Farley has been giving away large quantities of special stamp issues to his stamp collecting friends.

LABOR IS FOR N. R. A.

American Federation Determined To See That United States Industries Comply

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 8:—American Federation of Labor officials declare it is their intention to continue the fight to force many of the large industries of the country to comply with regulations of the National Recovery Act. Under the N. R. A., American labor, it is claimed, last year had its best twelvemonth since before the depression.

Movie Stars May Quit Paramount

Gary Cooper, May West and Marlene Dietrich Aroused by Firing Of Official

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 8:—A walk-out of stars from the lot of the Paramount Studios is threatened as a result of the alleged forcing out of Emmanuel Cohen, production manager of that company, who was a favorite among the actresses. Gary Cooper, May West and Marlene Dietrich are among those who are threatening to quit. It is said that Dietrich is seriously considering going to Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer.

Are Favored For Acting Awards

Claudette Colbert, Norma Shearer, Grace Moore, Wallace Beery, And Tullio Carminatti Mentioned

HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 8:—Claudette Colbert, for her work in "It Happened One Night," rules as one of the favorites for the annual award for the best screen actress' performance in 1934 of the Academy of Motion Arts and Sciences. Norma Shearer, for "The Barretts of Wimpole Street" and Grace Moore, for "One Night of Love," are also among the favorites.

Among the performances of actors, Wallace Beery for "Viva Villa," and Tullio Carminatti, for "One Night of Love," are prominently mentioned.

Fay Webb Seeks \$1,000 Alimony

CHICAGO, Feb. 8:—Fay Webb, suing her divorced husband, Rudy Vallee, the radio and screen crooner, for alimony of \$1000 a month, claims that he earns \$75,000 per year. With the exception of one year, Vallee claims that his earnings are not nearly that much.

KING BEING PROTECTED

French Government Provides Special Guard for Sweden's Monarch

PARIS, Feb. 8:—To insure against any possibility of a repetition of the assassinations last year of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou, the French government has detailed a special group of secret service men to guard King Gustave, 76-year old monarch of Sweden, who is again spending the winter on the Riviera. A player of note, King Gustave spends much of his time at tennis.

POLICE AND PICKETERS CLASH IN BURNABY AND SEVERAL ARE INJURED

VANCOUVER, Feb. 8: (CP) Provincial Constable G. Davis of Victoria received severe head and face lacerations, several other police officers were cut about the hands and face and a number of demonstrators received bruised heads when police clashed with two hundred picketers near the Bloedel Stewart & Welch shingle mill at the foot of Boundary Road in Burnaby yesterday.

MARKET IS UNSETTLED

Uncertainty as to Gold Clause Decision is Having Its Effect Upon Trading

NEW YORK, Feb. 8:—Uncertainty as to the decision of the Supreme Court of United States on the gold clause, which has been postponed indefinitely, is having an unsettling effect on the stock market. Trading on Wednesday, totalling only 160,000, was the lightest in months and several issues touched new low marks for the year.

Dirigible Los Angeles Being Reconditioned

LAKEHURST, N.J., Feb. 8:—The famous United States Navy dirigible Los Angeles, which has been out of commission for the past three years, is being reconditioned with a view to be recommissioned not for flight purposes but for use in ground handling and training of dirigible crews.

Los Angeles Warring Upon Speed Demons

Townsend Plan Is Not Popular

Its very liberality may cause the defeat of it, the general view of national legislators appearing to be that it would be too great a drain on the nation's funds. The plan is not meeting with much support.

Money must have been spent in the campaign for printing and travelling expenses, yet no one person stands to gain financially from the scheme going into force. It has been a labor of love by men who are more interested in the good of Canada than in their own personal aggrandizement.

Enthusiasm is what we all need in order to carry out the most promising enterprises.

## VALUE OF LIBRARY

Although Circulation Decreased During Year, Number of Borrowers Was Up

"Although the circulation of books through the Public Library during the year 1934 was only 54,731 volumes, a decrease of eleven per cent from that in 1933, it is gratifying to note that a steadily increasing number of citizens are recorded as borrowers," said the secretary's report at the annual meeting of the library board last night. "Approximately 3852 residents of this city and immediate vicinity are listed as patrons of the library book shelves. "Perhaps the most important advancement which the library made during the year was the acquisition of a more suitable building with enough available floor space to allow for expansion. With the assistance of the provincial government, authorities and the city commissioner, the library board was enabled to rehabilitate the new building.

"As the library received no civic appropriation for new books in 1934 the public drive, which provided six hundred and seventy-eight dollars towards restocking the library shelves, deserves special mention. "It is very encouraging to observe the interest which has been displayed by the various organizations and the people in general, when the library has required active support, financially, by gift of books or in personal service. "Only through this support has the library been able to remain a real asset to the community."

Librarian's Report  
"For the year 1934 a striking decline is noted in the number of books added to the library," said the librarian's report. "The net gain in books was only 109 in comparison with 257 of the year before. This decrease may be due to the fact that so many books were discarded—588 in 1933, 845 in 1934. Probably the lack of binding has been responsible for the increased number of discards. Mending has done something towards checking this decline.

"A decrease of 14,175 in circulation may also be noted. This may be due, partly to the lack of new books in the library, partly to the fact that the depression appears to be lifting. "Apart from fiction, travel is the subject which shows the highest circulation. History comes next, with biography a close third. Travel books form an important section in any library, and are informative as well as entertaining. It would be gratifying to see an increase in the percentage of non-fiction taken out."

The librarian's report also gave complete statistics of the library for the year.  
Those present at the meeting were Frank Dibb, chairman, Thomas B. Black, secretary, R. L. McLennan, G. A. Woodland and Mrs. G. H. Arnold, directors, and Miss Dorothy Rushbrook, librarian.  
The purchase of some new books for the juvenile section was authorized by the meeting.
