ITALO-ETHIOPIAN CRISIS STILL ON

DEAN AND MRS. BROCK AND PILOT McCLUSKY KILLED

Triple Tragedy When Flying Boat Which Visited Here at Week-End Crashes Down Coast

Pioneer Airways Machine Nose Dives on Mining Flight—University Head, His Wife and Popular Aviator Lose Lives—David Sloan Injured

VANCOUVER, July 31: (CP)—Dean R. W. Brock of the University of British Columbia, chairman of the Vancouver Board of Harbor Commissioners, and Pilot W. R. McClusky were killed and David Sloan, managing director of the Pioneer Gold Mine, and Mrs. Brock sustained extensive external and internal injuries yesterday afternoon when a Boeing flying boat of the Pioneer Airways of Ocean Falls hit a down draft, failed to clear, nose-dived and crashed near Alta Lake while taking off on a mining flight to Pioneer mine. Mrs. Brock died early this morning at Horseshoe Bay while being brought to Vancouver. The airplane, which had been operating on schedule along the coast of British Columbia between Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls, had just returned on Monday from Prince Rupert where it spent the week-end. The ill-fated flight was on a special charter, departure having been made from the Wells Air Transport hangar here, the call being made at Alta Lake to pick up Mrs. Brock from her summer home there. Pilot McClusky and Dean Brock were seated together in the cockpit.

Further details of the tragedy received today revealed that Pilot McClusky, in attempting to take off from Gun Lake, failed to gain sufficient altitude, probably owing to down-draft over the small lake with its towering cliffs, and, seeing that he could not clear the trees with his heavy flying boat, attempted to bank and return to the lake. The machine sideslipped, striking a stump and fell on to the rocks. The engine was driven back into the cabin.

Mrs. Brock suffered a broken left thigh, a broken left arm, a punctured lung, several broken ribs and internal injuries. She was not told of her husband's death before she died. She spoke a few words at Horseshoe Bay to her sons, Tom, 18, and Dave, 24, who went there from Vancouver last night to meet her. Another older son, B. B. Brock, was an engineer with the Britannia Co. and at one time was located at Alice Arm in connection with the Toric mine.

Mr. Sloan, brought to the Vancouver General Hospital, is given a fair chance for recovery with fractures to both ankles, a fractured jaw, hip and possible internal injuries. It was not long ago that Mr. Sloan figured in another airplane accident at Vancouver when a machine fooled the towline of a car ferry in Coal Harbor and upset. He was not injured at that time.

Col. Victor Spencer's yacht was sent from Vancouver last night to Squamish to pick up the bodies and the injured and take them to Vancouver. They had been taken from Alta Lake to Squamish by freight train.

Across North Pole to America

Council of League of Nations Has Adjourned Session Till Tomorrow

Italy Gives Blunt Notification it Will Discuss Nothing But Limited Arbitration—Addis Ababa Foreign Office Will Not Entertain International Mandate

GENEVA, July 31: (CP)—A private session of the League of Nations council, called to discuss the Italo-Ethiopian crisis, adjourned today after meeting for less than an hour and the session will be resumed tomorrow. The Italian representative flatly told the council that Italy would not discuss anything at this time except the limited arbitration question of the dispute with Ethiopia.

From Addis Ababa, the capital, the Ethiopian Foreign Office announced that the nation would reject any proposal for an international League of Nations mandate over Ethiopia. This announcement came as a surprise following a report yesterday that Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia had opened what it was hoped might be a new basis for settlement of the Italo-Ethiopian crisis by a purported statement declaring that Ethiopia would rather be made a protectorate of European nations than "submit to the tyranny of Italy." The statement, it was thought possible, might have had some influence on the deliberations of the council of the League.

Meantime, the Ethiopian Emperor is seeking British officers to lead his black troops in the event of actual outbreak of war with Italy. Some British officers are to leave India by plane for Ethiopia, it is reported. The British proposal is still that Italy should accept broad economic concessions.

CUT DOWN ON RELIEF

New Policy in Interests of Economy Planned by Ontario Premier—Toronto Mayor Feared of Riots

TORONTO, July 31:—Premier Mitchell Hepburn announced yesterday that drastic reorganization of the system of relief administration in Ontario, with a view to effecting economies, was being planned. In future lump sums on a per capita basis will be appropriated to the municipalities. It is anticipated that \$240,000 per year in administration alone will be saved.

Checking Up On Possibility of Seaplane Base

A. D. McLean of Ottawa, superintendent of airways for the Department of National Defence, who has been here for the past few days prior to leaving on a mapping expedition to the Yukon and Northwest Territories, has been going into the question while here of the establishment at Prince Rupert of an official seaplane base such as has been advocated by the local Chamber of Commerce. It is expected he will make a recommendation to Ottawa on the subject.

Russian Airmen Still Are Held By Bad Weather

MOSCOW, July 31:—Soviet airmen, poised for a non-stop flight from Moscow to San Francisco via the Arctic Circle, are still being held up here by unfavorable weather conditions.

Two and Half Million Left By Gooderham

TORONTO, July 31: (CP)—An estate of \$2,500,000 was disposed of in the will of the late Albert E. Gooderham which has been probated here.

STEVENS IS NOMINATED

Leader of New Reconstruction Party is Suspicious of Government's Housing Plan

CRANBROOK, July 31: (CP)—Hon. H. H. Stevens, leader of the new Reconstruction Party, will open his western campaign with a meeting next Monday night in the Arena at Vancouver. Yesterday Mr. Stevens was tendered a unanimous nomination to run in Kootenay East, his present seat, in the forthcoming federal election. He has already intimated that he will accept.

In an address here last night Mr. Stevens said that certain large Canadian mortgage companies which have had land turned back on them are planning to unload it on a long suffering public by virtue of the government's new housing bill.

MINISTER ON VISIT

Hon. A. Wells Gray Here Today and Addresses Joint Luncheon of Gyro and Rotary Clubs

In the course of a tour of Central British Columbia, Hon. A. Wells Gray, minister of lands and municipalities, arrived in the city on the Prince Rupert this morning from Victoria and will leave on this evening's train for the interior, returning south by way of Prince George and the Cariboo. He is the third provincial cabinet minister to visit here within the past six weeks, the others having been Hon. Dr. G. M. Weir, minister of education and provincial secretary, and Premier T. D. Pattullo. Today Mr. Gray was the speaker at a luncheon in the Commodore Cafe under joint auspices of the Gyro and Rotary Clubs, there being a good attendance of members of both organizations as well as a number of guests. S. J. Jabour and W. M. Blackstock, Gyro and Rotary presidents respectively, shared duty as chairmen.

Mr. Gray, who was in conference this morning on municipal matters with City Commissioner W. J. Alder, is accompanied by Robert Wilkinson, M. L. A. for Vancouver-Point Grey.

INCIDENT PROTESTED

Attack On Liner Bremen At New York Brings Vigorous Complaint From German Government

WASHINGTON, D.C., July 31:—In a note to the State Department yesterday, Germany protested vigorously at the incident of last Friday night when a mob attacked the liner Bremen at New York and "desecrated" the German flag. Charging that inadequate police protection had been provided, the German note demanded punishment of the perpetrators of the incident. No national apology was, however, asked. Acting Secretary of State Phillips has sent a note to the German embassy expressing regret at the incident.

CHICAGO IN LIMELIGHT

CHICAGO, July 31: (CP)—Chicago clubs moved prominently into the pennant race picture in both American and National Leagues as a result of yesterday's Big League play.

In the American League, the White Sox defeated the Cleveland Indians here and are now but three and a half games behind the Detroit Tigers, who were losing to the Browns at St. Louis, and only one game behind the second place New York Yankees, who dropped a close decision to the Athletics at Shibe Park.

Chicago Cubs continued their long winning streak in the National League by vanquishing the Pirates at Pittsburgh and crept up to within one game of the leading New York Giants who were splitting a double-header with the Phillies at the Polo Grounds. TRIPLE TRAGEDY WHEN FLYING BOAT CRASHES

River, left Prince Rupert early Monday morning after having spent the week-end here with an Ocean Falls party. Having arrived at Prince Rupert Saturday afternoon, the ill-fated plane made a flight that evening to Stewart with Dr. J. H. Carson, V. S. Moore and J. T. Harvey as passengers, returning Sunday morning. Capt. W. P. Armour was a passenger on the flight from here to Vancouver.

The plane, a large Boeing flying boat equipped with a 425 h.p. Wasp engine, had been in the service of the Pioneer Airways, an Ocean Falls syndicate for the past few months. At first based at Ocean Falls, its headquarters were moved later to Vancouver. It had been operating on scheduled service between Vancouver, Ocean Falls and Powell River and the company had been doing so well that a second plane of similar type was only recently purchased and placed in service. The loss of the plane will be a serious blow to the company.

Pilot McClusky was a well known northern commercial flier for many years. He had a long and enviable record in the aviation game and was regarded as one of British Columbia's most competent and skilled pilots. Large in stature and genial in nature, he had many friends and acquaintances throughout the district and the tragedy which has befallen him

will be felt with a keen personal sense of regret by many. He served with the Air Force overseas during the war, having gone over with the Md. C. M. R.'s with which he became a captain. Since the war he had been engaged in civil aviation. A few years ago he flew a Junkers seaplane for Col. Victor Spencer of Vancouver, this machine coming to grief a couple of years ago when it crashed at McConnell Creek after running into a down draft. Only Pilot McClusky's skill in setting the plane down under most difficult circumstances averted a major disaster entailing loss of life. Later Pilot McClusky joined the service of the Canadian Airways and last summer was engaged in fisheries patrol service out of Swanson Bay. On the Pioneer Airways setting up in the commercial aviation business, he was selected as pilot and manager. He was born in Vernon and is survived by a widow and five children. Mrs. McClusky and her mother arrived in Vancouver only a few days ago from Vernon.

Dean Brock was regarded as one of the most competent authorities in Canada in the field of science, particularly geology and mining generally. He was a former deputy minister of mines and had been head of the Department of Science at the University of British Columbia for nearly twenty years. In military affairs he was also prominent and was officer commanding the First Battalion Seaforth Highlanders.
