FINE SHOW PRESENTED

Large Audiences Delighted With Staging of "All Dressed Up" By Elks' Lodge

A delightfully refreshing note in local entertainment was struck by the local Elks' Lodge in its presentation of George M. invited to celebrate the marriage of Miss Luella Llewellyn and Fred Thomas, a popular young couple who have grown up at Terrace.


Leith Murray, of the Columbia Power Company, has spent some days looking over Terrace and district with a view to installing a light and power plant provided his report pleases his co-directors.
