PASSING OF DR. BELAND

Well Known French - Canadian Parliamentarian Succumbs to Heart Attack

Was War Prisoner

Served in Laurier and King Cabinets and Had Been Member Of Upper House 10 Years

KINGSTON, Ont., April 23: (CP) Senator Henri Severin Beland M. D. aged 65, died here yesterday. having been stricken with a heart attack while on his way to Ottawa;

from his home in Quebec. Senator Beland was born at ouiseville, Que., October 11, 1869. He was educated at Three Rivers College, where he graduated in Arts, and at Laval Universitry, Dr. Beland was a member of the Legislative Assembly of Quebec for two terms, being successful at the general elections of 1897 and 1900 in Beauce Country. In 1892 he was returned by the same county to the House of Commons and sat for that seat until his appointment to the Senate some ten years ago. He was postmaster general in August 1911. and held the portfolio until the defeat of the Laurier government. In 1921 he was minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment in the Mackenzie King cabinet.

Dr. Beland had a very trying war experience. In the summer of 1914 he was in Belgium with his wife, who was a native of that country.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 23: (CP)-Federal Judge James Alger Fee ruled yesterday that fishermen hired by canning companies in the United States are entitled to share in proceeds of fish caught in Alaskan waters and delivered to Alaskan canneries by Alaskan fishermen.

The case was brought by Martin T. Olson and a group of other fishermen against Libby, McNeill and Libby, canners.

The suit hinged on construction to be placed on phrases in the contract signed by Olson and a large group of seamen and fishermen he represents when they left for Alaska prior to the 1933 fishing season.

North Pacific Salmon Trollers Strike Threatened Because Of Deductions Imposed by Buyers

SEATTLE, April 23: (CP)—North Pacific salmon trollers threatened to strike when notified yesterday that the buyers would deduct eight percent in weight for heads and two percent for ice from all salmon bought in future.

Two arriving trollers immediately refused to sell their fish.

At present one hundred trollers are tied up at Neah Bay and an equal number at Westport. Owners of twelve Seattle boats and eighty-nine Neah Bay boats were announced last night by Wood Freeman, manager of the Trolling Vessel Owners' Association, to have voted formally to quit fishing until they can obtain a satisfactory agreement with the salmon buyers.

Fleets of about six thousand vessels and nine thousand men are involved.

Great Flying Boat Is Due At Alameda Today From Hawaii

It hopped off from Pearl Harbor at 6 o'clock last evening for San Francisco and an hour later was reported 100%



find that many plants I thought dead are still alive. The frost did not damage the garden as much as I thought. I have a clematis that has been frozen to the ground three consecutive winters. This year it escaped and shoots are coming from the brown stem six or eight feet from the ground. It should bloom this year and the stem should harden sufficiently for it to stand all frosts in the future.

Last week I was at Ocean Falls and when I left there the daffodils were in full bloom and other spring plants were a week or two further advanced than in Prince Rupert. Most of the roses there seemed to have survived and I noticed some beautiful scillas blooming freely.
