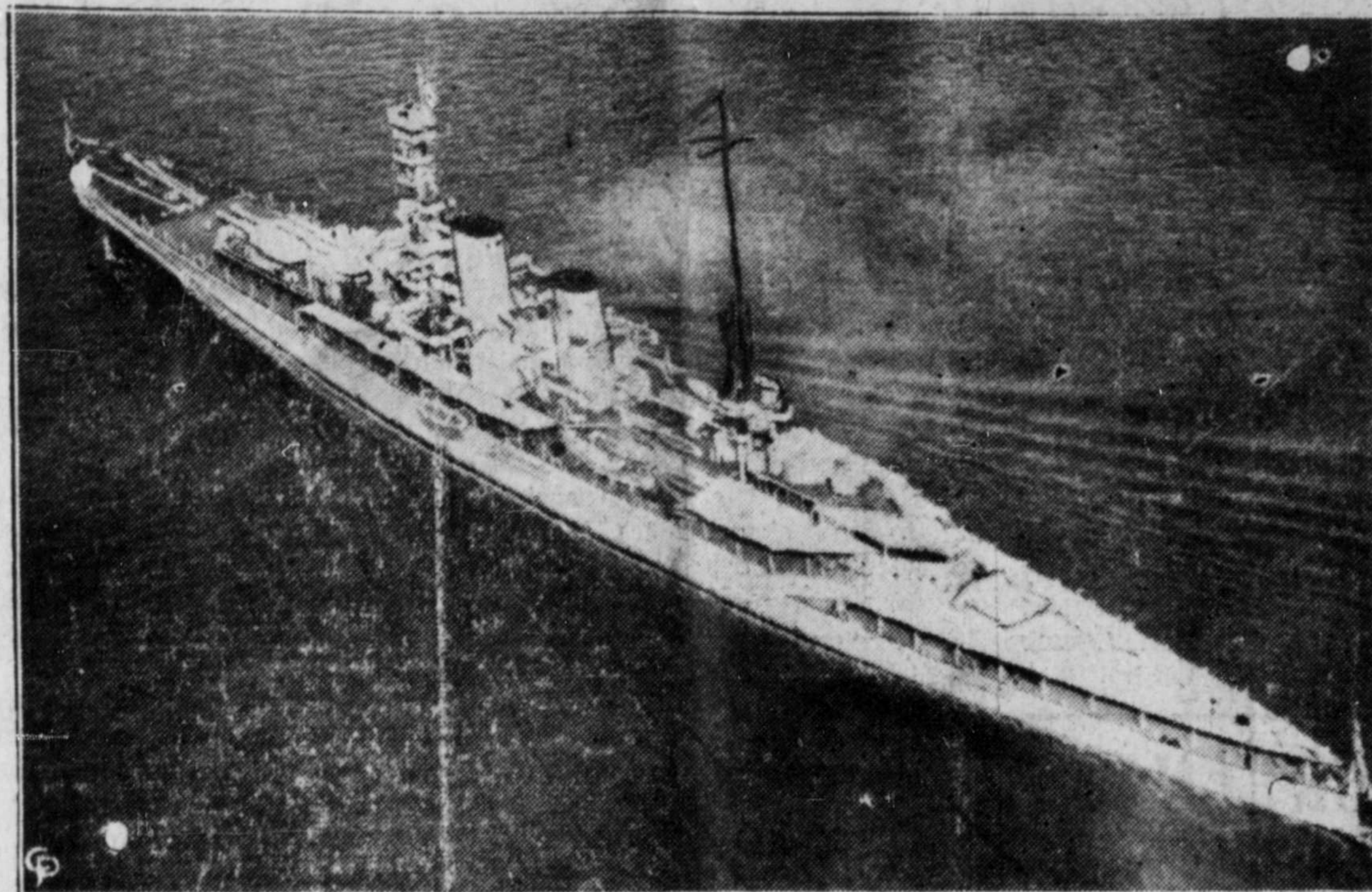

THE POLITICAL CORNER

THE C. C. F. AND THE ORIENTAL

The following questions and replies taken from Hansard of June 22nd, 1934, Page 4206, show the position of the C. C. F. party on the Oriental vote question.

Mr. Mackenzie (Vancouver), "Is the Hon. member in favor of enfranchising Orientals in British Columbia?"

Mr. Woodsworth, "I am in favor of enfranchising Orientals in British Columbia."

Mr. Mackenzie, "Is the C. C. F. in favor of it?"

Mr. Woodsworth, "Yes; there is no doubt about that. I will go into your riding and tell them so; there is no doubt about it."

This should silence any denials that the C. C. F. party is in favor of giving the vote to Asiatics.

The question is, "Are the farmers and fishermen of Northern British Columbia going to vote for a party committed to such a policy?"

If a politician dared advocate such a policy in the Fraser River Valley he would be mobbed. The Oriental question is not so acute in Northern B.C. but in the south the Asiatic farmers are rapidly pushing back the white farmer and the Oriental fisherman rapidly displacing the white. It is only a question of time until we have the same conditions in the north.

Giving the vote to the Asiatic would be a very dangerous business. We all know the way the canneries exploit the Orientals in the matter of fishing and fishing licences.

Every white fisherman knows this and will oppose to the last ditch the granting of such franchise.

The Liberal party is absolutely opposed to giving the franchise to any Asiatic. Your vote for Olof Hanson will ensure that they do not get it.

## WATERFRONT WHIFFS

Trolling Season is Now Ended—Only Five Halibut Catches This Week—Another Seining Area Closed to Fishing

Except for the odd scattered boats, the salmon trolling season in Prince Rupert district is now over with practically the entire fleet back in port. The last camp to be brought back to port for the winter was that from Victory Cove in Warke Canal. With fish a good deal scarcer than the year previous, the 1935 trolling season could by no means be described as a great success. One fisherman this week estimated the average earning for the season at about \$400. Salmon trolling on Skidegate Bar is reported to have been very poor to date. The Chief Legaic, Capt. Harold Casperson, is packing from Skidegate to Prince Rupert for the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co.

During the past week only five catches of halibut were handled at the port of Prince Rupert, these catches totalling 112,000 pounds to bring the grand total of landings at the port for the season to date up to 9,923,150 pounds as compared with 13,025,865 pounds at a corresponding date last year. So far this year Canadian landings have aggregated 4,685,350 pounds in comparison with last year's 5,723,765 pounds at a similar date while American landings now stand at 5,237,800 pounds as against last year's 7,302,100 pounds. The lone Canadian boat in during the week was the Johanna which disposed of 11,000 pounds at 11c and 7c while the American boats were: Foremost, 40,000, 13.1c and 8c; Hazel H., 10,000, 13.3c and 8c; Oceanic, 16,000, 12c and 8c; Attu, 40,000, 12.7c and 8c. The prices were the highest which have been paid for the past few years.

The area on the east coast of the Queen Charlotte Islands from Vertical Point, Louise Island, to Capt. St. James has been closed to salmon seining as from yesterday owing to streams being nearly dry making escapement of chum salmon to the spawning grounds difficult. Cumshewa and Skidegate Inlet areas are still open to seining. Lagoon Bay on Queen Charlotte Islands and Namu on the mainland are still the only two salmon canneries in Prince Rupert district still in operation. Seining is reported to have fallen off during the past week in Skidegate Inlet.

Feature of the observance of National Fish Week in Prince Rupert this year was a special fish luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club on Thursday when R. M. Winslow, assistant manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., gave an appropriate address on the industry. At the annual dinner of the junior section of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday night, T. H. Johnson, general manager of the same company, gave a Fish Week address.

The job of resurfacing the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator, which has occupied about two months' time, giving work during that time to about ten men, was completed this week. The work was carried out by Concrete Repairs of Canada Limited, a Montreal concern. Having been delayed by fog down the coast, C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Anderson, did not arrive in port until 8:30 last evening, sailing at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. Shef Thompson, former caretaker of the Prince Rupert Rowing & Yacht Club floats here, returned at the first of the week after having spent the summer down the coast engaged in fish packing and plans on residing in town for the winter. Having been delayed by fog and also by loading salmon at cannery points, Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, arrived in port at 10:45 this morning from the south and sailed at noon on her return to Vancouver and waypoints. The Cardena had finished her calls in the Skeena Slough on arriving here but still had her calls in the main river to make. Having on board a large list of passengers, including many Yukon and Northern British Columbia

## THE REAL REASON
