### CAN'T ALLOW KNOCKING

We have a very interesting letter from a reader dealing with a recent editorial and an indirect answer which appeared recently in this paper. Unfortunately the writer expresses his opinion of people personally much too freely for our columns. We do not care to be the medium through which to knock religious denominations or races. They all have their places in the scheme of things. What is good will survive and what is evil will disappear. If we express an editorial opinion it does not mean that we expect others to think as we do. One of the great features of modern Canadian life is the spirit of toleration that is found everywhere. We can agree to differ in many things but especially on questions of religion. If anyone has a message 1. which will help the people, we are for it. We regret baving to refuse publication to an interesting letter but we do not wish to stir up strife in the community, especially at a time when there is a movement afoot which looks like co- micals 1 operation in essentials.

### STRONG FOR ELECTION

There is a proposal afoot to bring on an immediate election next month and get the fight over and the political situation settled before the time for the visit of the Prime Minister to London in May. If Mr. Bennett is then reelected he will represent Canada and, if some other party is in the ascendency, its leader would be the one to take part officially at the Jubilee and to sit in at the round! table conference of British premiers. This would be most desirable. It would be useless for Canada to be represented by a man who may be defeated within a few weeks. Any imperial policy acquiesced in by Canada should have the support of the Parliament of Canada, the members of which are representatives of the people of Canada.

Another reason for desiring an early election is that the country may settle down once more. Until the election is over there will be more or less unrest. It is almost impossible to see things in their proper perspective when under the shadow of an election campaign. Political bias is so strong in the mass of the people that sane discussion is difficult. An election will clear the air and, if there is to be a change of political control, this is the time to have it.

Uncertainty as to When Halibut Fishing Will Start; Herring Seining Still Going Strong; Capt. Jack Morrison Returning to Sea

Yesterday was March 1, legal opening date for the 1935 halibut fishing season, but it saw none of the vessels of the regular Prince Rupert fleet out and, indeed, there is little in the way of preparatory activity as yet for the year's work. With a slow movement of cold storage stocks of fish giving little promise of prices which would make fishing profitable, the fleet is awaiting ank

improvement in this situation as the hallbut fishing game several well as the outcome of minimum price negotiations for the year before making a start. The outlook is that there would be little, if any, fishing before April 1. The situation is much the same at all parts of the coast with all vessels holding back. While there are a few who seem to be impatient to get at work, the general concensus of opinion is that nothing will be lost than usual. There can be no more fish caught in the year as a whole in any case since the earlier the start the earlier the quota limit will be reached. It is recalled that last year fishing was stopped in Area No. 2, where the most of the Prince Rupert fleet operates, owing to the quota having been exhausted. Under the circumstances, it now appears to be but folly to attempt to go out and bring in fish that it would seem almost certain must be sold at a loss. However, it is expected that the first day or so of the season will probably see the arrival of the odd small Indian boat with the first halibut of the season for the fresh fish market.

If the example of one well known unit of the local halibut fleet is to be followed, Prince Rupert fishing boats will be going yacht-like indeed.
