# City Commissioner Is Taking Steps to Help People Save Property

Year's Taxes May be Paid in Full With Arrears Spread Over Period of Years Under New Plan-Tax Sale This Year Being Suspended

Under the new tax arrear consolidation scheme as probosed by City Commissioner W. J. Alder those delinquent in tax payments may keep their property in good standing by paying this year's taxes in full and five percent of the arrears. Next year the taxes for 1936 would be paid in full together with ten percent of consolidated arrears,

the year after twenty percent of arrears in addition to the full Tom Mooney year's taxes and the two years afer than twenty-five percent of arrears in addition to the year's taxes. The scheme would provide

> interest at five percent. Pending the bringing of the new tax consolidation scheme into effect, there would be no tax sale this year.

The city commissioner is sitting this afternoon in his capacity as a city council to put through the necessary bylaws to make the new scheme effective subject to approval by the provincial govern-

Will Be no Amalgamation Unless People Give Definite Mandate, Says Premier Bennett

TORONTO, Sept. 16: (CP)-Amalgamation of Canada's railway systems, whether under private or public ownership, will never come during a Conservative regime unless the people give a clear and definite mandate, Premier R. B. Bennett declared Saturday night. His government's program provided for a complete investigation into the whole transportation problem of Canada to be carried out by an economic council. If the report of that investigation recommended amalgamation, the question would be submitted to the people.
