AKSUM FALLS, CASUALTIES HEAVY

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 10: (CP)-Fall of the holy city of Aksum before the Italian advance and wholesale killing of Ethiopians by Italian air bombs in the south were announced officially today by the Italian minister here and the Ethiopian government respectively.

From Italian headquarters in Northern Ethiopia it was announced that the Ethiopians had lost 2500 killed in the last eight days while Italians lost two officers killed with 150 officers and men wounded.

5.—Orientals hold 371/2% of the whole small fruits acreage.

6.—Oriental fish licence holders in 1934 earned over \$3,000,-

7.—There are 6000 Orientals in our lumber industry.

8.—Eighty-two and a half percent of all laundry licence holders are Orientals. 9.—In three years the Japanese children in our public schools

increased by 74% while in the same period the white children increased only 6%.

The Ethiopian embassy was under Italian military guard last night and it was stated that the Ethiopian minister and his staff would be kept in Rome until all Italian representatives from Ethiopia had arrived safely. Meantime passports have been denied.

Italy does not wish to do anything that would antagonize United States against her, it is said. Special precautions will be taken to protect American property in all Italian military operations in Ethiopia both from land and air.

Incidentally, it is understood that Italy is planning early air raids over Addis Ababa, capital of Ethiopia.

Yesterday was a "quiet day" for the Italian army in Eritrea, an ofcommunique stated last night, describing the East African operations. Only "small patrol actions" had occurred along the front, it was stated, the main concern being to strengthen thoroughly all positions along the line between Adigrat and Aduwa against counter attacks. The "holy city" of Aksum had not yet fallen late last night but its capture by the Italians was expected momentarily.


