VANCOUVER, Jan. 9: (CP)—The mining industry is gradually leading British Columbia out of the depression, stated Frank Woodside, manager, in his annual address to the British Columbia Chamber of Mines last night.

FRANCE IS GIVEN LAND

Pierre Laval Leaves Italy For Paris After Signing Important Treaty

ROME, Jan. 9:—Following the signing of the important treaty between France and Italy ensuring peace between the two countries in regard to all points of difference in European and African matters.

It was learned yesterday that, under the new treaty, Italy was ceding France some 50,000 square miles of territory in the vicinity of French Somaliland.

France and Italy have also agreed upon a basic plan to permit re-arming of Germany.

British Planes On Long Flight

Four Bombers Ready to Leave Aden For 4,000 Mile Trip to Gambia

ADEN, Jan. 9:—Four huge British bombing planes are poised here ready to take off momentarily on the first stage of a hazardous 4,000-mile flight across Northern Africa to Bathurst in British Gambia.

New Governor Of California Has Been Sworn In

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 9:—Frank S. Merriam took his oath of office as governor of California yesterday after which he gave his inaugural address before the state legislature.

Fog All Over East Tuesday

Eight Liners Tied up in New York Yesterday on Account of Thick Weather

NEW YORK, Jan. 9:—Heavy fog was hanging over all parts of the Eastern States yesterday from north to south and from the Atlantic seaboard to beyond the Mississippi.

Scores of steamers were tied up here yesterday unable to move on account of the fog.

On account of the fog, all air line services were cancelled as far west as Omaha.

CONGRESS NOT FAST

President's Relief Bill Not Approved As Speedily as Expected—Little Progress Made

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 9:—Congress had faltered up to yesterday to give the quick action that President Roosevelt had hoped for in passing his \$4,480,000,000 relief bill although ultimate acceptance of the chief executive's plan is anticipated.

The Senate yesterday recessed until Thursday, committee to be active in the meantime. The House was in turmoil yesterday over organization, political debate taking up almost the entire time.

DR. TELFORD LOSES LIFE

Prominent Pioneer Vancouver Dentist is Drowned at Keats Island

VANCOUVER, Jan. 9: (CP)—The body of Dr. George Telford, aged 60, prominent pioneer Vancouver dentist, was found today near the wharf at Keats Island.

Deceased was a brother of Dr. Robert Telford and Dr. Lyle Telford, both well known Vancouver physicians and surgeons.

NORMAN DAVIS HOPES FOR NEW AGREEMENT ON NAVAL QUESTION

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 9:—Norman H. Davis, United States ambassador at large and chairman of the American delegation at recent preliminary disarmament discussions in London, yesterday expressed the hope that a new naval agreement between United States, Great Britain and Japan would be reached this year.

Separation From Former King Of Spain is Denied

LONDON, Jan. 9:—Official denials were made here yesterday of persistent reports of an impending separation of Former King Alfonso of Spain and Queen Victoria. Differences over financial matters were said to be at the bottom of the rumored marital rift.

Snow and Cold In Gt. Britain

Old Country Isles Blanketed For First Time This Winter

LONDON, Jan. 9:—First snow of the winter came to the British Isles yesterday, blizzards in some sections being accompanied by extreme cold.

VOTING IN PLEBISCITE

Result of Saar Polling Will Not Be Made Officially Known Until Tuesday of Next Week

SAARBRUCKEN, Jan. 9:—Preliminary voting in the Saar plebiscite is now in progress. The main vote will be taken on Saturday but it is announced that the result will not be made officially known until next Tuesday when announcement will be made simultaneously here and in a report to the League of Nations.

The plebiscite is being taken to permit people of the Saar Valley to determine whether they shall be governed by France or Germany or remain under League of Nations authority as at present.

Three hundred and eighty German-Americans arrived yesterday from the United States to vote in the plebiscite.

DELEGATION OF BELGIUM

Lower Tariffs Being Sought By Delegation Which Left Brussels For United States

BRUSSELS, Jan. 9:—A Belgian mission yesterday left Brussels for the United States to open negotiations looking to lower tariffs between the two countries.

Commission Says Uncle Sam Should Apologize and Pay Compensation

Long-Standing Controversy Brought to Close With Decision of International Board Which Arbitrated Dispute Over Responsibility For Incident

WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 9: (CP)—The United States-Canadian commission to arbitrate the long-standing controversy resulting from the sinking of the rum runner "I'm Alone" off the coast of Louisiana in 1929 held today that the United States should apologize for sinking the vessel and pay Canada \$25,000 compensation.

"LIAR" SAYS HAUPTMANN

Alleged Lindbergh Baby Killer Denies Paying Taxi Driver To Deliver Note to Condon

Court in Hub-bub

Jury May Visit Hopewell Home—Dr. Condon Identifies Accused

FLEMINGTON, N.J., Jan. 9:—"You're a liar," exclaimed Bruno Richard Hauptmann after Joe Foroni, a taxi driver, identified him as the man who had paid him \$1 to deliver a note to Dr. J. F. (Jafsie) Condon during the time ransom negotiations were in progress for the return to the parents, Col. and Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, of baby Charles Augustus Lindbergh jr. with whose kidnap-murder Hauptmann is charged.

Yesterday saw the conclusion of the prosecution case as far as the events upon the day of the kidnaping were concerned, taking of evidence in regard to the ransom negotiations phase then commencing.

Mandus Hockmuth, aged 87, in the witness stand, identified Hauptmann as the man he had seen driving a dirty green car at Hopewell near the Lindbergh home on the day of the kidnaping.

Dr. J. F. Condon, intermediary for Col. Lindbergh in the ransom negotiations, called as a witness today, identified Hauptmann as the "John" to whom he paid \$50,000 futile ransom for return of the slain baby.

The jury, it is possible, may visit the Hopewell home where the kidnaping occurred.

Indications are that the trial may last for three or four weeks.

New Jersey Bank Raided Yesterday By Armed Bandits

GARFIELD, N.J., Jan. 9:—Five bandits, armed with machine guns, raided the Garfield National Bank here yesterday while five employees of the bank were at work and escaped with \$4,000, making their getaway in a high-powered car.

It had been claimed that the vessel had been fired at and sunk outside the limit of territorial waters. The commission found this to be the case.

Drought-Stricken Cattle in States Will be Processed

WASHINGTON D. C., January 9:—The Federal Emergency Relief Administration yesterday announced that arrangements had been made for the processing of 350,000 cattle and 200,000 calves in the drought-stricken areas of the United States where feed is scarce.

State Banquet At White House For Garner and Wife

WASHINGTON D. C., January 9:—Although both President and Mrs. Roosevelt were suffering from colds, this did not prevent the chief executive and his wife both attending the annual state banquet at the White House in honor of Vice-President and Mrs. John N. Garner.

Held Up By Lone Bandit Yesterday

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9:—A branch of the Bank of America on Santa Monica Boulevard was held up by a lone bandit yesterday and \$700 in cash was taken.

HUNGARY TO ADMIT HARBORING TERRORISTS

BUDAPEST, Jan. 9:—It was reported in authoritative quarters here yesterday that, following an investigation, the Hungarian government would send a report to the League of Nations on Friday admitting that Hungarian citizens had harbored terrorists such as those who had been responsible for the assassinations in Marseilles of King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia and Foreign Minister Louis Barthou of France.
