HEAVY TERMS FOR THROWING SWITCH

Interior Indians Get Long Sentences in Pen For Near Train Wreck

Arthur Sutherland to Do Sixteen Years at Penitentiary And Joe Isaac, Seventeen Years, Following Trial at Smithers

SMITHERS, Oct. 29: (CP)—Two Indians, Arthur Sutherland, aged 19, and Joe Isaac, 28, both from Fraser Lake, were sentenced to penitentiary terms of sixteen and seventeen years respectively with hard labor by Judge H. E. A. Robertson in County Court here for attempting to derail a Canadian National mixed train near Bulkley Canyon on September 27 last.

SOLE HOPE OF NATION

Dr. F. E. Townsend Of His Plan In Addressing Convention At Chicago

CHICAGO, October 29:—Dr. F. E. Townsend, father of the Townsend Plan, at a convention of supporters of the plan here, declared that some such scheme as his, which includes among other things the payment of a \$200 pension to all persons over sixty years of age, was the sole hope of a confused and distracted nation.

KILLED IN COLLIERY

Miners Lose Their Lives In Holocaust in Japanese Coal Mine

TOKYO, Oct. 29: (CP)—More than eighty miners lost their lives in an explosion and fire in Akaike coal mine, Fukuoka Prefecture, there today about 170 men in the mine at the time. Forty-two bodies have been recovered and forty-one men missing are believed dead.

REVOLUTION IN NORTHERN CHINA CAUSING TROUBLE

LONDON, Oct. 29:—Word received here from China indicates a widespread argarian revolution in Northern China against the Nanking government. Farmers who have been very heavily taxed to pay for the putting down of Communist revolts in the west have at last risen up and are marching on the cities. Several clashes have already taken place and it is feared the revolt may spread and prove troublesome. It is suggested that behind the move is a scheme to form a separate government for North China.

REVOLT IS PUT DOWN

Outbreak in Crete in Favor of Republicanism Short-Lived

ATHENS, Greece, Oct. 29:—A revolutionary movement in the Island of Crete, home of former Premier Eliptherios Venizelos and stronghold of Greek Republicanism, broke out but was quickly put down by government troops, reinforcements being sent from the mainland to assist in preserving order.

The outbreak was not unexpected following the recent coup d'etat in favor of the re-establishment of the monarchy in this country.

The station is owned by Felix Batt at present at Lake Athabaska and Norman Kinslor of the P. Burns Co. staff but it has been erected and is being operated by S. J. Anderson, Clarence Insulander, A. G. Bartlett and S. P. Woodside. Many local people heard the broadcast and it is announced that it will be on the air again tonight from 10:30 to 12.

The only new federal election return available during the past week is that from Surf Point mine which gave Olof Hanson, Liberal, seven votes; C. H. Orme, Conservative, 15, and J. E. Panter, C. C. F., seven. This makes the total to date as follows: Hanson, 3624; Orme, 1641; Panter, 2344. Twenty-six polls remain to be heard from and these will probably not be available until the official count on November 4.

Jap Authorities Ask Relief From Canada's Tariff

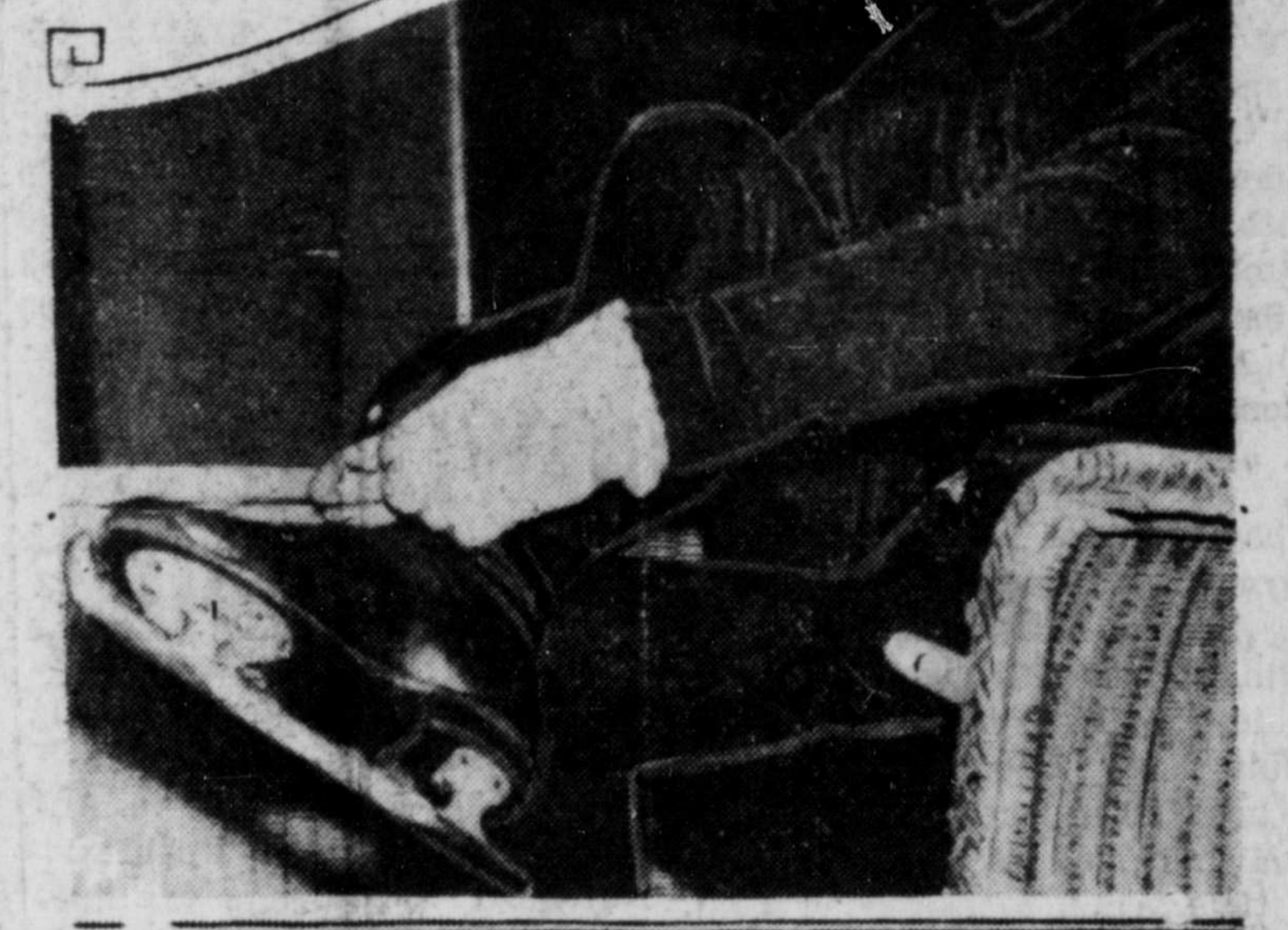

FRAUD IS ALLEGED

Ketchikan Couple Charged With Selling Foreign Made Curios As Being Alaska Product

KETCHIKAN, October 29:—Charged with violation of merchandising laws of the nation through obliterating trade marks on curios and selling them as Alaskan-produced, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Hall, proprietors of Hall's Trading Post, were yesterday bound over by Judge Austin in United States commissioner's court for trial in higher court, bail of \$1500 each being allowed.

In one case the complaint asserts that trade marks on a miniature carved ivory dog were obliterated and that the article was offered as an ivory curio with its origin indicated as Alaskan. The original markings designated Japan as the country of origin and the piece is made of "pressed rice or bone," according to the complaint.

In a second complaint marks designating India as the country of origin of a turquoise bracelet were removed.

In the absence of W. C. Stuhp, local assistant district attorney, the prosecution is being handled by Walter King, local attorney.

LUCK WAS WITH THEM

How Longshoremen Got Out When Freighter Caught Fire

VANCOUVER, Oct. 29: (CP)—The longshoremen, who had a narrow escape yesterday morning when the freighter Frederika Larsen took fire, had left the hold a few minutes before when the lights failed. Fire had been smoldering in reserve bunkers for several days but it was thought the blaze was under control.

Belching black smoke and gases rolled through the hold. Firemen donned gas masks before the fire was brought under control. The bunkers are still smoldering.

There is no estimate of the damage.

Remains of Adult Person Found At Depth of Two Feet—Identity Impossible

During digging on the Port Simpson townsite in connection with the putting down of a new water system there, the skeleton of an adult person was encountered at a depth of about two feet. It may have been there, it is believed, for possibly one hundred years. It was impossible to establish any identity. The grim find was interred in the village cemetery.

CLIPPER IS BACK AGAIN

Great Flying Boat Safely Completes Third Successful Trans-Pacific Flight

ALAMEDA, Cal., Oct. 29:—Following its third successful trans-Pacific flight, a three-weeks' trip as far out as Guam, the great flying boat Pan American Clipper landed here from Honolulu with her commander, R. O. D. Sullivan, and crew of seven on board. The hop from Honolulu took seventeen hours.

It is expected the Pan American Clipper will essay a fourth flight across the Pacific about November 15 with Manila as its destination.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 29: (CP)—Charles Bocking, president and managing director of the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting & Power Co., yesterday confirmed the sale of the company's entire plant and property at Anyox to the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. which will take possession immediately. No mention was made of price nor did Mr. Bocking know what use Consolidated intended to make of the plant. From Toronto also came confirmation of the deal by J. J. Warren, president of Consolidated, who said the company would not operate the mine but that the smelting plant would be used to supplement other plants of Consolidated.

The condition in Vancouver during the election was in marked contrast to that in the Skeena Riding. The type of men chosen for poll clerks and deputy returning officers must have been very poor there or else the returning officer did not properly instruct them. At any rate the election was badly muddled and the returning officer, who is the responsible head, is the man to blame.

In Skeena the returning officer is to be complimented on the excellent arrangements made under great difficulties. Although inexperienced in the work he managed to get all the boxes to their destinations and had plans made for the respective officers to handle the work expeditiously and well, according to all the accounts received. We know that at Prince Rupert everything went off without a hitch.

TAKING NO CHANCES

Great Britain is taking no chances in connection with the present disturbed condition of Europe. While she evidently does not plan to resort to hostilities if it can be avoided she has learned that leadership in disarmament may be construed as weakness.

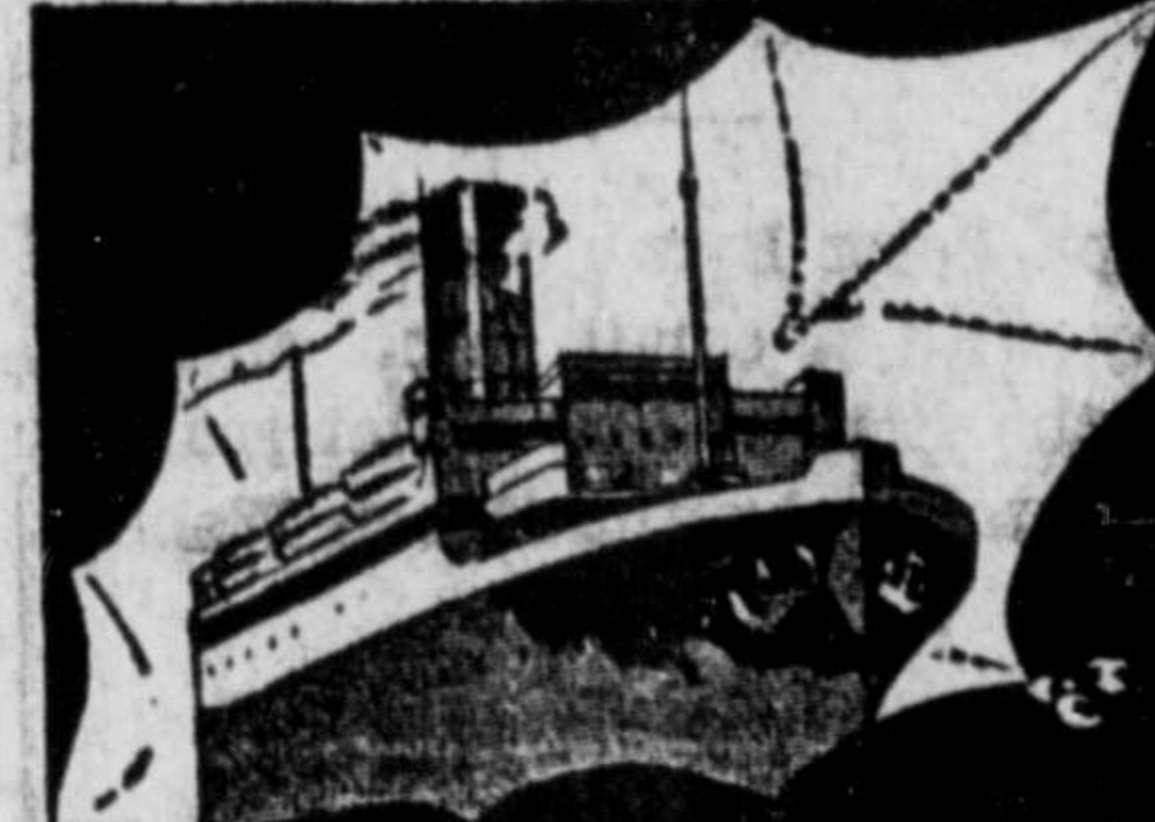

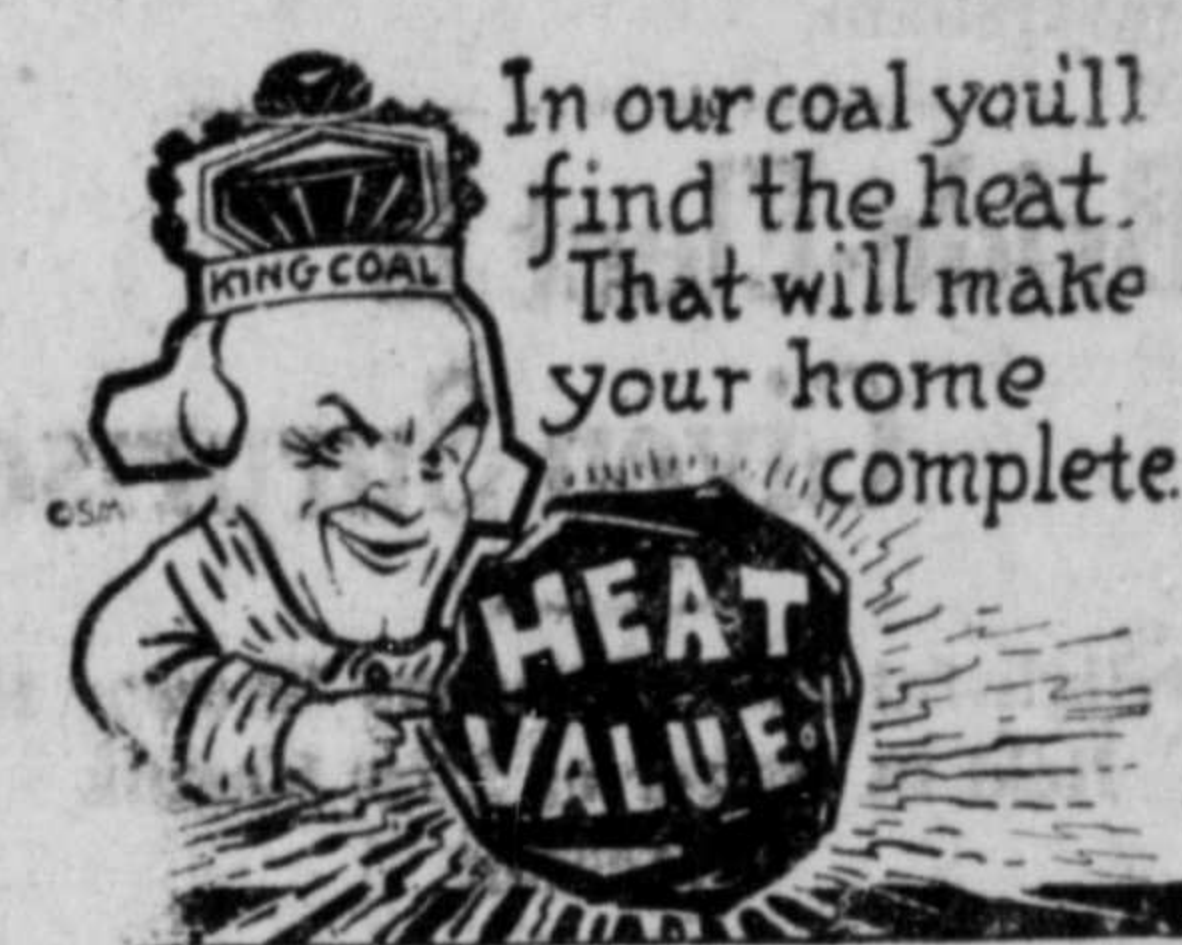
ROYAL CITY PUMPKIN PIE

1 cup Royal City Pumpkin, 1 cup milk, 2 eggs, beaten, 1/2 cup sugar, 1 teaspoon ginger, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon mace, 1/2 teaspoon salt.
Line pie plate with pastry. To ensure smoothness, beat pumpkin and milk separately, remove from stove and combine. Stir in the beaten eggs, then the sugar in which the spices have been thoroughly mixed. Pour mixture into pie shell and bake in hot oven (400 d. F.) for 15 minutes, then decrease heat to moderate (350 d. F.) for 30 minutes, or until custard is set. Cool, and serve with whipped cream if desired.
