HELENA BADLY SHAKEN ONCE MORE

Destruction of Capital City of Montana Nearly Completed on Thursday

Two Men Killed and Half a Score of Persons Seriously Injured—Population Terror-Stricken as Great Buildings Collapse and Four Hundred Residences Are Demolished—East Also Has Tremor

HELENA, Montana, Nov. 1:—Shortly before noon yesterday this city was visited by another violent earthquake shock which was even more severe than that of October 18 and which rendered more complete the destruction and desolation caused by the previous disturbance. Two men, Vincent Kennedy and Ed. O'Brien, were killed when they were buried under an avalanche of bricks from the collapse of a brewery chimney which they were engaged in repairing.

TRANSFERS IN POLICE

Sergeant Bowen of Smithers Promoted to Local Post—Sperry Cline Returning North

Sergeant R. W. Bowen, who has been sergeant in charge of the Smithers district detachment of the provincial police for the past year, has been promoted to take command of the Prince Rupert district detachment in succession to Sergeant Alex McNeill, resigned. It was announced at divisional headquarters here today. Sergeant Bowen is the senior sergeant of the force. The transfer involves promotion for Sergeant Bowen to the rank of staff sergeant.

SACRIFICE IS DENIED

Canadian Wheat Committee Does Not Intend to Force Grain On Market Regardless of Price

OTTAWA, Nov. 1: (CP)—Denial of rumors that the government intended to force Canadian wheat onto the market even at sacrifice prices followed the first meeting yesterday of the cabinet wheat committee consisting of Hon. W. D. Blair, minister of trade and commerce, Hon. C. A. Dunning, minister of finance, and Hon. J. G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture.

BAR SILVER NEW YORK, Nov. 1: (CP)—Bar silver was unchanged at 65 1/2c per ounce on the local metal market today.

SALTRY OPERATOR AT RIVERS INLET FINED; POSSESSED NO LICENCE

VICTORIA, Nov. 1: (CP)—A Japanese dry saltery operator at Moses Inlet off Rivers Inlet was fined \$500 and costs, with option of six months' imprisonment, for operating without a licence as the government began a drive to put the industry on a stabilized basis by market control.

FERGUSON RESIGNS AND MASSEY IS NAMED NEW LONDON COMMISSIONER

OTTAWA, Nov. 1: (CP)—The resignation of G. Howard Ferguson as Canadian High Commissioner to the United Kingdom at London was accepted by the government yesterday and it was announced that he would be succeeded by Hon. Vincent Massey, former minister to Washington, effective November 8.

COLD WAVE CONTINUES

No Amelioration in Early Winter—Pacific Northwest Suffers

SEATTLE, Nov. 1:—Snow and bitter cold continued throughout the Northwest and Middle West yesterday with an icy gale lashing the Washington and Oregon coast and extending as far south as California. In the mountains ice and snow sheathed the roads and in some parts of Oregon there was now to a depth of eighteen inches. Heavy damage has been done to apple crops in the Okanagan.

From the prairie states come reports of zero weather and snow blizzards in the earliest cold snap that has been known for years.

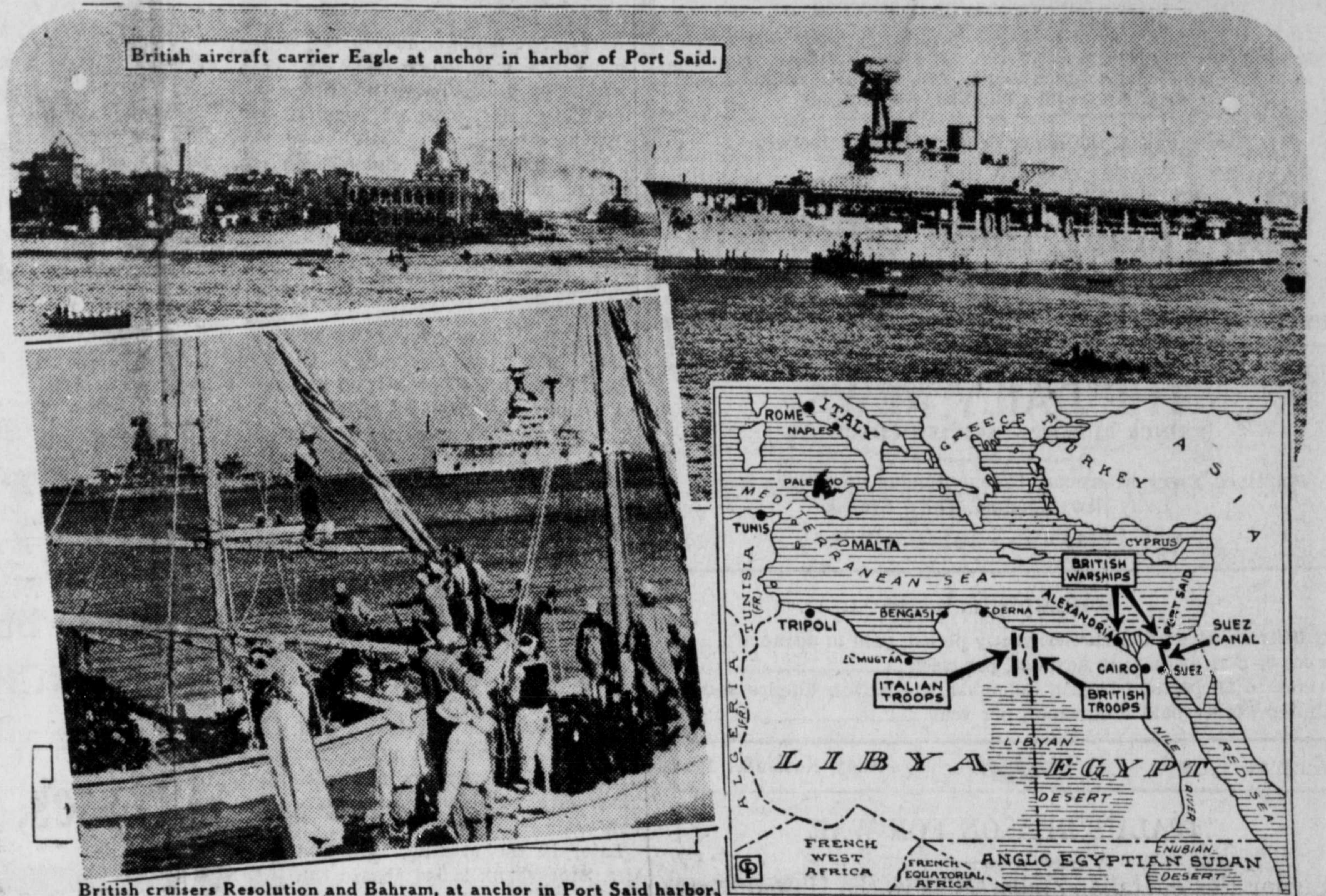

Tide of Battle Now Swinging Against Italy; Pope Declares Himself as Favoring Mandate

BIG PUSH FALTERS

Offensive of Invaders in Ethiopia Reported to Be Collapsing — Unable to Withstand Guerrilla Warfare.

Lose Many Men

Intensely Hot Weather Favours Ethiopians — Rome Claims Advance in North With Makale Captured.

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 1:—Italy's big push into Ethiopia with a view to closing on the capital city was definitely faltering yesterday. Indications were that the offensive of the invaders was collapsing. Reports here were to the effect that the Ethiopians had made definite advances, particularly on the southern front, inflicting heavy casualties on the confused Italians as they abandoned their stands to retreat in the direction of Italian Somaliland. The Abyssinians were ambushing the Italians with marked success, the surprised invaders being unable to effectively meet their style of guerrilla war-

Italy is Ready to Sue For Peace; Suggests Exchange Of Port For Interior Land

GENEVA, Nov. 1: (CP)—Italy returned to the League of Nations battlefront today willing, according to a spokesman, to quit the battlefronts of Ethiopia on conditions acceptable to the Fascist nation.

"That means military security in Ethiopian provinces bordering on our colonies and actual territory so desperately needed for the expansion of our people," said the spokesman. "Ethiopia would cede part of Ogaden Province to Italy and would receive in return a port on the Red Sea."

PIUS BACKS MUSSOLINI

Control by Rome, He Claims, Only Means of Avoiding More Serious Conflagration.

Geneva Amazed

Arrangements For Imposition of Penalties Being Completed—Britain Unchanged.

ROME, Nov. 1:—Pope Pius came out flatly last night as being in favor of an Italian mandate over Ethiopia as the only means of avoiding a "more serious conflagration." Imposition of sanctions by League nations against Italy would make no difference to the Roman Catholic Church, the Pontiff added, and would have no effect on the relations of the Vatican with other Catholic countries.

It was intimated in government quarters that Italy was still open to negotiate a settlement of the East African conflict but that it would not yield with less than a mandate. In a typical fighting address last night before a Fascist assemblage, Premier Mussolini declared that

### ITALY'S REASON FOR WAR

Signor Rosso, Italian ambassador to the United States, in an address at Boston, placed before the people of the United States the case for Italy in connection with the war against Ethiopia. He denied that Italy was engaging in war for war's sake or for lust of power or military glory. The young Italian soldiers were sent to Africa because Italy had there a problem of life and security which must be solved. All other methods having failed, no other solution presented itself. The whole Italian nation felt that the vital interests of the country needed the defence of Italy's rights in Northeastern Africa.

The speaker declared that Ethiopia was admitted to the League of Nations only after she had pledged to satisfy certain conditions which were deemed essential to any member of a family of civilized nations. That was twelve years ago and yet the conditions had never been fulfilled. The country was still under feudal law and the central government did not control or administer most of the territory but the League of Nations evidently was more concerned with preventing war than with removing the cause.

Italy, the ambassador said, tried her utmost to pursue a policy of friendly relations with Abyssinia but Ethiopia increased her armaments and carried out a series of acts of violence against Italian people that ended in the bloody clash of Ualual in December of last year. This clash was not of Italy's making. She did not start the row. The despatch of troops to Africa was necessary to afford a measure of protection and security against a constant and nearby source of danger.

Italy was unable to accept the proposals of the League of Nations because it was considered they would only have aggravated the difficulties and perpetuated the troubles which have existed for the past forty years.

On October 3 Ethiopia ordered a general mobilization which was really the start of the war.

Signor Rosso went on to tell of the Italian need of expansion. The country had a population of forty-four millions compressed within a territory less than half the size of the state of Texas. Expansion was not an invention of Mussolini but an actual need and a need that Mussolini was trying to satisfy in order to prevent the restless forces of anarchy and Bolshevism exploiting the hardships of an economic life which only the sound discipline of Fascism had been able to make endurable. Almost all doors were closed against Italian immigration and commercial policies were so militant in nature that they closed a substantial proportion of the outlets in both hemispheres to the products of Italian labor. The need for markets had in the past driven countries to press forward with programs of colonial expansion, seeking spheres of influence and creating eventually virtual protectorates.

Concluding, the ambassador said: "We tried for more than forty years to get along with Ethiopia. In order that the Ethiopian hinterland and our coastal colonies might prosper together, we wanted to build roads which would provide avenues of commerce and communication; to eradicate tropical diseases; to cultivate fields which now lie idle; to unearth for human use the riches of the under-soil that lie buried. In all that time we have met only enmity and distrust. Without making any attempt to understand our aims and collective purposes, Ethiopia has refused again and again to co-operate for the common good."

Parkin of this city, became the bride of William Rupert Brooksbank, younger son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Brooksbank.

VICTORIA, Nov. 1: (CP)—The British Columbia Liberal caucus, during the next session of the Legislature, will be asked by the government to consider a system of local option in regard to the sale of beer and light wines in restaurants and standard hotels with meals, it was intimated yesterday in government circles following the refusal of the government to permit the dispensing of beverages in such a manner at this time.

### PIUS BACKS MUSSOLINI

(Continued from page one)

Italy was unable to regard the present activities of the British fleet in the Mediterranean as a defensive measure. While he did not go so far as to term them aggressive, he did assert that they were inexplicable and definitely anti-Italian.

Il Duce, whose speech followed another conference earlier in the day with Sir Eric Drummond, British ambassador, said that the economic sanctions which were being imposed against Italy were the "most despicable in history." They would meet with every resistance on the part of Italy and with this country's "supreme contempt."

#### Geneva Amazed

GENEVA, Nov. 1:—Amazement was expressed in League of Nations quarters last night at the pronouncement of Pope Pius as being in accord with an Italian mandate for Ethiopia. It was considered hardly in line with previously expressed views of the Pontiff in regard to the conflict.

Meantime, the League sanctions committee, at a two-hour session, completed arrangements for the imposition of sanction penalties against Italy and the date on which these shall go into effect will probably be set today. Forty-nine nations have agreed upon an arms embargo against Italy in addition to the United States which will not supply arms to either Italy or Ethiopia. Forty-seven nations are ready to impose financial sanctions and forty-six economic sanctions.

#### British Attitude

LONDON, Nov. 1:—The position of the British government towards the Italo-Ethiopian crisis will remain unchanged in spite of the stand taken by the Pope in favor of an Italian mandate for Ethiopia. It was reported here, however, that the British government might consider reducing the present naval concentration in the Mediterranean if Italy would cease its press attacks against Great Britain and its generally anti-British attitude.

Lloyds odds on a European conflict involving Great Britain have fallen from 11 to 7 to 11 to 1 and business is slack. The premium on Mediterranean shipping has been reduced from 15 percent to 10 percent.

Furniture was moved and dishes broken in Pittsburg. No very extensive damage was reported from any point. The quake was also felt in Ohio, Pennsylvania and New England states.

Severe in Eastern Canada TORONTO, Nov. 1: (CP)—An earthquake shock, described as the heaviest ever experienced over such a large part of the country and so severe that it caused damage to geograph instruments in the Dominion Observatory at Ottawa, rumbled across Canada from Fort William to the Bay of Fundy early today, causing little material damage, however. Tall buildings and homes alike were shaken by the tremor which lasted for less than a minute. Thousands of persons in large centres fled from their homes. In Toronto a well known citizen said this morning that he thought his young son had crashed a new automobile through the garage and was actually relieved to find that the rumble was "only an earthquake."
