

In all that time we have met only enmity and distrust. Without making any attempt to understand our aims and collective purposes, Ethiopia has refused again and again to co-operate for the common good."

LONDON, Nov. 1:-The position of the British government towards the Italo-Ethiopian crisis will remain unchanged in spite of the stand taken by the Pepe in favor of an Italian mandate for Ethiopia. It was reported here, however, that the British government might consider reducing the present naval concentration in the Mediterranean if Italy would cease its press attacks against Great Britain and its generally anti-British attitude.

Tall buildings and homes alike were shaken by the tremor which lasted for less than a minute. Thousands of persons in large centres fled from their homes.


