# FEDERAL RELIEF GRANTS BOOSTED

## Ottawa to Pay Much More to Provinces, Premier King Says

Assistance Will be Increased From \$1,751,250 Monthly To \$3,064,687—Will Help Municipalities

OTTAWA, Dec. 20: (CP)—For the four months of December, January, February and March grants from the federal treasury to the provinces for relief purposes which have been paid at the rate of \$1,751,250 monthly will be increased to \$3,064,687, Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King announced last night. This will enable the provinces to lift from their municipalities in some measure the relief cost burden.

Unanimous agreement by the provinces to submit further relief expenditures to review by a proposed national commission on unemployment, and relief made it possible for the government to take this step, Premier King said. The commission will be appointed early in January.

British Columbia which, up to the present, has received \$150,000 monthly will get \$262,500 per month.

## FISHERY RECOVERS

Halibut on Pacific Coast Showing Satisfactory Comeback, Says Dr. Found

OTTAWA, Dec. 20: (CP)—Marked recuperation of the supply of halibut on the Pacific Coast was reported Thursday by Dr. W. A. Found, deputy minister of fisheries, on his return from his annual trip to the Pacific Coast.

"There has been an increase of one hundred percent in the availability of halibut since regulation of fishing in the industry was started in 1931," Dr. Found said.

## Stock Market Is Still Weak

All Issues Slumped Yesterday With Exception of Bonds Which Showed Slight Gain

NEW YORK, Dec. 20:—The New York Stock Exchange showed continued weakness yesterday with all classes of issues except bonds falling off although trading was light at a total of 1,263,000 shares for the day. Closing averages were: industrials, 138.94, off 1.16; rails, 39.49, off .51; utilities, 28.03, off .17; bonds, 97.99 up .05.

## GENERAL STRIKE OF BRITISH MINERS IS CALLED NEXT MONTH

LONDON, Dec. 20: (CP)—Great Britain's coal miners voted yesterday 478,000 to 28,000 to strike on January 29 as a final effort in their fight to force a general pay increase of two shillings a day. The strike will not be gone through with if the mine owners grant the increase. It might have the effect of paralyzing the country's industries.

## MOLLISON IN LOS ANGELES

Expects to Institute His Trans-Atlantic Air Service Next May

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 20:—Capt James A. Mollison, noted British flier, who is a visitor here, stated yesterday that he expected to have his trans-Atlantic commercial air service in operation by next May. Using machines with a speed of from 130 to 190 miles per hour, Mollison intends to specialize in carrying of news reels, official documents and articles requiring rapid transit. Westbound flights, he expects, will take sixteen hours and eastbound 11 hours. His famous aviatrix wife, Amy Johnson Mollison, will share piloting duties with her husband.

Our funds were low, the winter demand had been heavy, but making the case known to the steamship company arrangements were immediately made for the young man to travel in comfort with every care and attention.

Added to the few dollars we could spare from our funds, an anonymous donor made it possible for the young man to reach his destination with a little ready cash at his disposal.

Army workers in Vancouver, notified of the case, are still following it up and their last report informs us of the gratitude of the parents. The young man also writes and wishes success to the Army of the Helping Hand.

## MORE FARMS FOR ALASKA

Matanuska Organizer Has Plans In Hand For Another Community Along Tanana River

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Dec. 20:—M. D. Snodgrass, who played a prominent part in connection with the establishment of the new agricultural community in the Matanuska Valley, and Otto Olsen, superintendent of the Alaska Railway, have a plan for a new colonization project in the fertile Tanana River Valley. They would place fifty farmers and their families in a community there.

"Alaska needs three thousand more farmers," declares Snodgrass.

## MAY TAKE ABDUCTORS

Philadelphia Authorities Believe They Are on Trail of Milne Kidnappers

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 20:—Authorities last night expressed the belief that before long they would have in custody the kidnappers of Caleb J. Milne IV who was found dazed and trussed in a roadside ditch near Doyleston, Penn., late Wednesday night, suffering from exposure and chafed by ropes with which he had been completely bound and gagged. Narcotics had also been administered to further ensure against his making outcry.

After being sufficiently recovered from the ordeal, Milne was able yesterday to give "G" men a detailed description of his kidnappers and to describe the experiences he had undergone since his abduction in New York on Sunday.

Although Milne's grandfather, Caleb J. Milne II, wealthy textile operator, had made all preparations to pay over ransom \$50,000, the ransom was not actually paid, it is announced.

## Government Is Endorsed

LONDON, Dec. 20: (CP)—The government won a sweeping victory in the House of Commons Thursday night on its handling of the African peace plan when a Labor motion of censure was defeated 397 to 165 on straight party lines. Earlier in the day the House of Lords had also endorsed the government. It was explained that the much-discussed Hoare-Laval peace plan had been signed without consulting the government. Rome was reported to have been "shocked" at the announcement that the Hoare-Laval plan is "dead."

## Famous Soldier Of Fortune Is Settling Down

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 20:—Capt. Kinney, famous adventurer, former educator and novelist, sailed from here this week, accompanied by his Chinese wife, and child for Tahiti where he intends to make his home.

## SANCTIONS HURT TRADE

PLYMOUTH, Eng., Dec. 20: (CP)—More than 100,000 pilchards (small sea fish allied to herring) were dumped overboard from fishing trawlers in one week, the foreign market being closed by sanctions against Italy.

## ELECTION DATE SET

January 6 Chosen For Contests, If Any, in Prince Edward Island And Saskatchewan

OTTAWA, Dec. 20: (CP)—The by-election in Queen's seat, Prince Edward Island, where J. J. Larabee has resigned in favor of Hon. C. A. Dunning, minister of finance, will be held on January 6, the same date as in Assiniboia where Hon. J. G. Gardiner, minister of agriculture, is running. Conservatives will not oppose Mr. Dunning. Nor is it expected they will oppose Mr. Gardiner.

## IS HONORED AT DINNER

Local Branch of Canadian Fisheries Association Fetes T. H. Johnson

T. H. Johnson, who is about to retire as general manager of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co., was honored with a farewell testimonial dinner by the Prince Rupert branch of the Canadian Fisheries Association in the Commodore Cafe early this week.

John Dybhavn, president of the branch, was in the chair and the feature of the proceedings was the presentation by James L. Lee to Mr. Johnson of a handsome table lamp as a token of high esteem and sincere well wishing for the future. Mr. Johnson spoke suitably in reply.

Others who spoke in the course of the gathering were City Commissioner W. J. Alder, S. E. Parker, L. W. Patmore and Col. J. W. Nicholls. All expressed sentiments suitable to the occasion.

Mr. Johnson, accompanied by his wife, will be leaving Prince Rupert soon after the New Year. They expect to travel extensively before settling down permanently for the future.

## Efforts Being Made to Rally Support in Case Of War Breaking Out

Drive Being Made to Mobilize Other Nations in Case Of Necessity—Russia Ready to Help "Policy Of Peace"

LONDON, Dec. 20: (CP)—A high British source disclosed today that the government, recognizing the imminent danger of war following failure of the Franco-British peace plan, has launched a bold drive to mobilize other members of the League of Nations to meet a possible Italian attack. The nations specifically mentioned as probably involved in the talks are Spain, Greece, Turkey, France and Jugo-Slavia.

The British government is reported to be greatly impressed with France's position of unreadiness to render swift aid in case of attack.

Sir Austen Chamberlain, former Conservative Foreign Secretary, emphasized the government's viewpoint that League members must be prepared not only for collective judgment but for collective execution of it.

**Support of Soviet**  
MOSCOW, Dec. 20: (CP)—Promise of Soviet support in "a firm policy for protection of peace" was held out to Great Britain today in an article by Karl Radek in the government newspaper Izvestia.

**International Force**  
GENEVA, Dec. 20: (CP)—Suggestion was advanced in international circles today that the council of the League of Nations should consider asking League members to contribute fighting units to a League military force, including land, sea and air forces, which might be used for protection of the League covenant. The opinion prevailed in certain quarters, however, that the suggestion would not be followed up.

**They Would Help**  
PARIS, Dec. 20: (CP)—Diplomatic sources asserted today that Turkey, Greece and Jugo-Slavia have indicated their willingness to take military and naval precautions against any attack brought on by application of sanctions against Italy.

## ETHIOPIA IS QUIET

Only Fighting of Desultory Nature Yesterday Following Battle Earlier in Week

ROME, Dec. 20:—Only desultory fighting was reported yesterday from the northern front in Ethiopia following the three-day engagement this week in which the Italians claimed a decisive victory. Upwards of 1000 Ethiopians, according to Italian reports, were killed while the Italians lost 272 men.

## JURY FOR EXECUTION

Leo Hall Convicted of Murder in Washington Trial—Woman Co-Defendant Acquitted

PORT ORCHARD, Wash., Dec. 20: (CP)—Erlands Point "Mass Murder" trial jury of eight men and four women, after deliberating seventeen hours, yesterday convicted Leo Hall, aged 33, of first degree murder in connection with the deaths of six persons and recommended the death penalty. Peggy Peterson Paulos, co-defendant, was acquitted. Hall will be formally sentenced in a few days to die on the gallows at Walla Walla state penitentiary. There will be an appeal to the State Supreme Court, it is announced.

#### PREMIER KING'S PLANS

In the very near future it is evident that Prime Minister Mackenzie King plans to give lower preferential tariffs to Empire countries for the purpose of encouraging more trade with Britain, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and other Empire countries. Arrangements have already been made with Japan and trade with Russia is to be encouraged if possible. All this looks good for British Columbia which depends upon favorable commercial relations for the disposal of her products.

#### MAKE OTHERS HAPPY

No one would really enjoy Christmas if they thought the family next door was unable to enjoy the festive season too. We are all so constituted that much of our enjoyment is collective. The difficulty is that so many do not realize that there are homes in the city where they are unable to secure the things that help to make Christmas a happy time, especially for the youngsters. The Salvation Army is trying to bring joy to every home where Santa Claus is likely not to visit. Let's all help a little to enable the Salvation Army to search out the underprivileged and make them as happy as possible.

#### ITALIAN ATTITUDE

According to a Vancouver businessman who has been in Italy recently, there is no spirit of hate shown to England, as reported by so many correspondents. The people are annoyed with Canada because they evidently thought Canada would be neutral. While English is not spoken for the time being, orders have been issued that the persons of English people are to be considered sacred. Evidently they look forward to the time not far distant when England will be again one of Italy's best customers and they will again welcome English tourists.

This is as it should be. There is no ill-feeling against Italians in Canada. The Canadian people are not against Italy but against war and the only way they know to show their opposition to war is through the sanctions.

#### UNUSUAL SCENE

There was an unusual scene in the British House of Commons yesterday. The members heard the Prime Minister confess that he was at fault in connection with the recent attempt to settle the Italo-Ethiopian war in not keeping in closer touch with the foreign minister. He did not blame the former foreign minister but it seems from the dispatches that either Sir Samuel Hoare did not keep the Prime Minister informed of the varied steps in the negotiations or his messages were delayed. In any event the Prime Minister took the blame, the foreign minister resigned and the incident seems closed.

# HOSPITAL SERVICES

Montreal Plan of Care For Women And Children Draws Attention

MONTREAL, Dec. 20: (CP)—A new and revolutionary plan for group hospitalization being offered to Montreal women has attracted the interest of medical authorities throughout the country.

"This plan is very interesting because, as far as I know, it is the only one of this continent where the appeal is entirely to women and children subscribers," was the comment of Dr. Harvey Agnew of Toronto, secretary of the Canadian Medical Association Hospital Department and of the Canadian Hospital Council.

The newly-formed Women's Hospital Service Association, headed by Miss Guinevere Smith, who has been for many years prominently identified with the activities of the Women's General Hospital here, offers hospital service at a fixed annual or other periodic fee to groups or women numbering not less than 12. Benefits which may be obtained for the sum of \$1.00 membership fee and 75 cents a month include a semi-private room for 21 days each year if required, with type of meals prescribed by the physician; complete operating room service; anaesthetic fee; general nursing care; ordinary medicines, surgical dressings and routine laboratory work.

The plan is a strictly non-profit-making venture and any surplus will be held for the benefit of subscribers in succeeding years.

Dr. Agnew stated that the idea of group hospitalization is not entirely new but has received tremendous impetus of late. Twenty-five or more plans are in operation in Canada, while similar plans have operated in the United States for the past 30 years. The largest Canadian venture is in Edmonton where four general hospitals are co-operating.

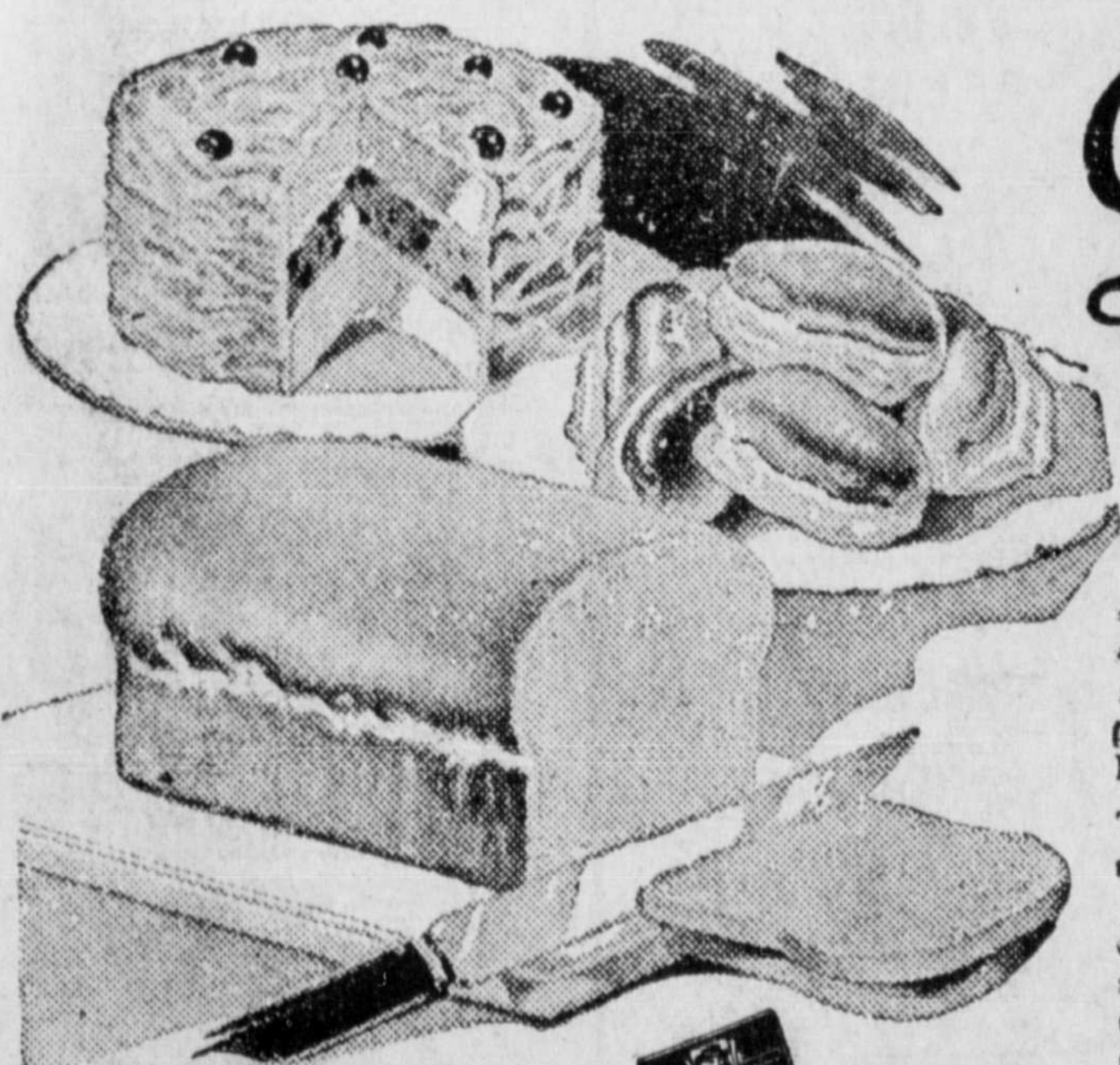

Spanish Centenarian Shows Young Folk How to Grow Old With Grace

MADRID, Dec. 20: (CP)—At 100 years Dona Gertrudis Peregrino dances intricate "sevillanas" and "fandangillos," sews without glasses, and insists on high-heeled shoes.

She sleeps but five hours out of the 24, does her own housework, and takes care of her garden. She says she eats everything that pleases her taste, and relishes wine with her meals.

This hardy centenarian of La

Linea, in Andalusia, where instances of extreme longevity frequently are reported, says she has "no reason to believe she will not live at least another ten years."

She married at 32, had her first child, a girl, at 36 and her second, a boy, at 50. The first died young, the second is now a grandfather. Her husband died in 1896.

Dona Gertrudis had all her teeth until she was 74. She was never, even during childbirth, under medical care until she was 80. A physician then prescribed for a severe cold. He has never had to be called again.

Having lived through many wars, Dona Gertrudis has come to fear and hate war. Her main concern now is that a fresh European conflict may force her two grandsons into service.

CALGARY, Dec. 20: (CP)—First application for the Social Credit basic dividend promised by Alberta's new government was made at Calgary city hall.

"I want my Social Credit, \$18, please," a man told the city clerk.

Considerable questioning by officials revealed the man had been informed by a fellow eater at the provincial soup kitchen that registration at the city hall would bring him the \$18 dividend.

WHEAT SALE IS REMEDY

Economics Professor Says Surplus Should be Disposed of Now

OTTAWA, Dec. 20:—In order to keep the price from advancing unduly and unsettling the market, the Dominion Wheat Board is selling wheat freely and Canada's surplus is continuing to move out nicely under the influence of the strengthened market.

MONTREAL, Dec. 20: (CP)—Wheat sales—impetus to wheels of Canadian industry—hold the solution to Canada's economic problems, says John T. Culliton, assistant professor of economics at McGill University here.

Immediate sale of the western wheat surplus, even at a loss, was the sole remedy to the pressing problems facing the Canadian people, Prof. Culliton told a meeting of the General Accountants' Association.

Mr. Culliton said the immense importance of wheat was seen in the fact that the average value of the annual crop was \$400,000,000. It was the country's greatest single export and paid for numerous imports such as tea, coffee, cocoa, sugar, oranges and bananas.

With the United States out of the export market and the crops of Australia and the Argentine below normal, the time had come for Canada to dispose of her surplus, Mr. Culliton said.

Mr. Culliton expressed the opinion that, as Europe was producing all it could ever produce, the Dominion could look forward to a reduction in wheat tariffs. The international market must be recognized as a competitive market and demands for reduction in wheat acreage as a solution would prove useless. It should be handled as a private enterprise, he said.

Many obstacles had been overcome in making Canada's system of grading the standard of the world. Canada's wheat was marketed with less cost and more effectively than that of any of its competitors.

MORE MEN TEACHERS

Commissioner Alder Defends Recent Appointment and Urges Athletics to Save Boys

"There has been a hue and cry of late about my appointment of teachers in the schools. All things being equal, any local job should go to a local man or woman, but when I want a man teacher, a girl will not fill the bill," declared W. J. Alder, city commissioner, at the weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club in the Commodore Cafe yesterday in the course of an address on civic affairs.

"The facts are that our schools are all doing excellent work in the classrooms. I have no adverse criticism to make in that particular but the time has come when more men in the higher grades of the elementary schools are a necessity. Of three appointments to the high school this year, two were men and the one lady was for home economics.

"We have in this city a number of underprivileged boys whose homes have broken down," continued the commissioner. "Seven are now in the industrial school for two years, at a cost of \$24 each per month, and the police have a long list of delinquents on their books.

"In the appointment of these men teachers, athletics are stressed and aside from the matter of discipline, I think that the playing field is a wonderful place to build character. I have in mind the necessity for enough men teachers in the schools so that every boy can eventually be drawn into the games."

## DRY SPELL NEAR END

Western Canada May Expect Floods  
In 1938 Says Meteorological  
Expert

WINNIPEG, Dec. 20: (CP)—Western Canada is definitely moving out of the dry cycle of weather which brought ravaging drought in recent years, according to expert opinion. In fact, as far as can be judged, there may be floods in 1938.

A leading authority on weather conditions, T. C. Main, who has just completed an exhaustive study of the drought problem, believes the dry cycle is ended. He found the rise and fall of water in the Red River drainage basin an excellent indicator of moisture conditions.

The volume of water in the Red River increases on the approach of the period of maximum sun spots. Flood conditions in that area are, therefore, expected in 1938. The same conditions prevailed in 1927, one year before the sun spot peak in 1928, Mr. Main explained.

High temperatures, Mr. Main believes, have a great deal to do with creation of drought conditions, due to evaporation. Since 1875, when regular meteorological observations began to be recorded at Winnipeg, the "mean" temperature showed a general increase until 1930. Since 1931 there has been a steady decline in the "mean" and it is still going down.

In the early days of settlement the Carberry Hills of Manitoba were forested with coniferous trees which were cut off by the settlers. A recent attempt to reforest the area met with little success. The water line, which has been attracted by the roots of the trees had sunk so low it was not within reach of the roots of growing seedlings.

An effort will be made to raise the water line to its old level by planting native trees, resistant to drought.

## Rebuild Edifice Twice Destroyed

Montreal's First Cathedral to Rise  
Again Around Its Steeple

MONTREAL, Dec. 20: (CP)—Plans have been completed for the rebuilding of Montreal's first cathedral for the second time since its erection 112 years ago. The towering 312-foot spire is all that remains of the building, destroyed by fire in 1852 and again in 1933.

In 1852 St. Jacques le Mineur Cathedral at St. Catherine and St. Denis Streets, its original site, was partially destroyed when Montreal's east-end was ravaged by fire. 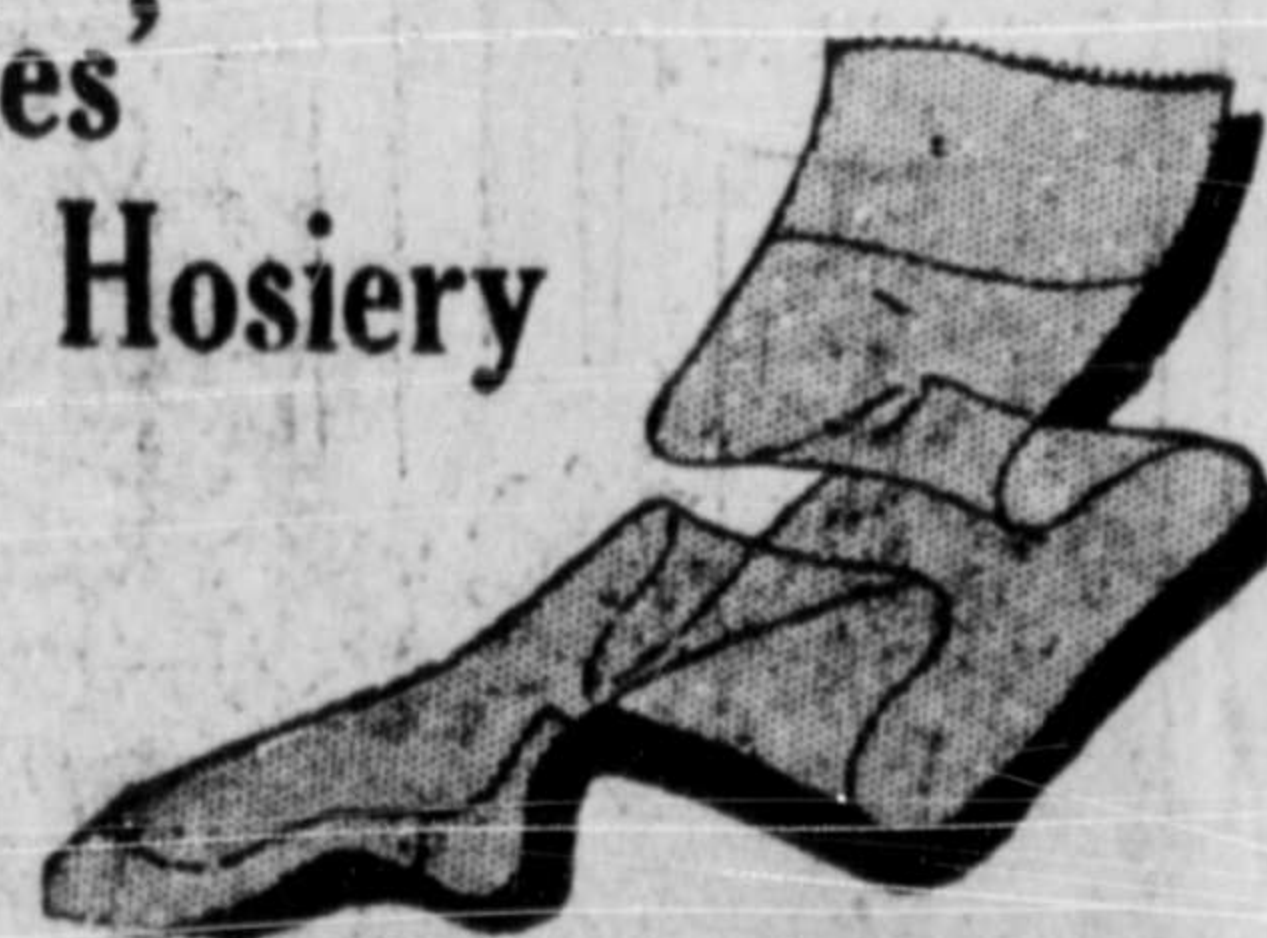
