Fisherman Loses Life When Explosion Took Place at Coal Harbor Last Night

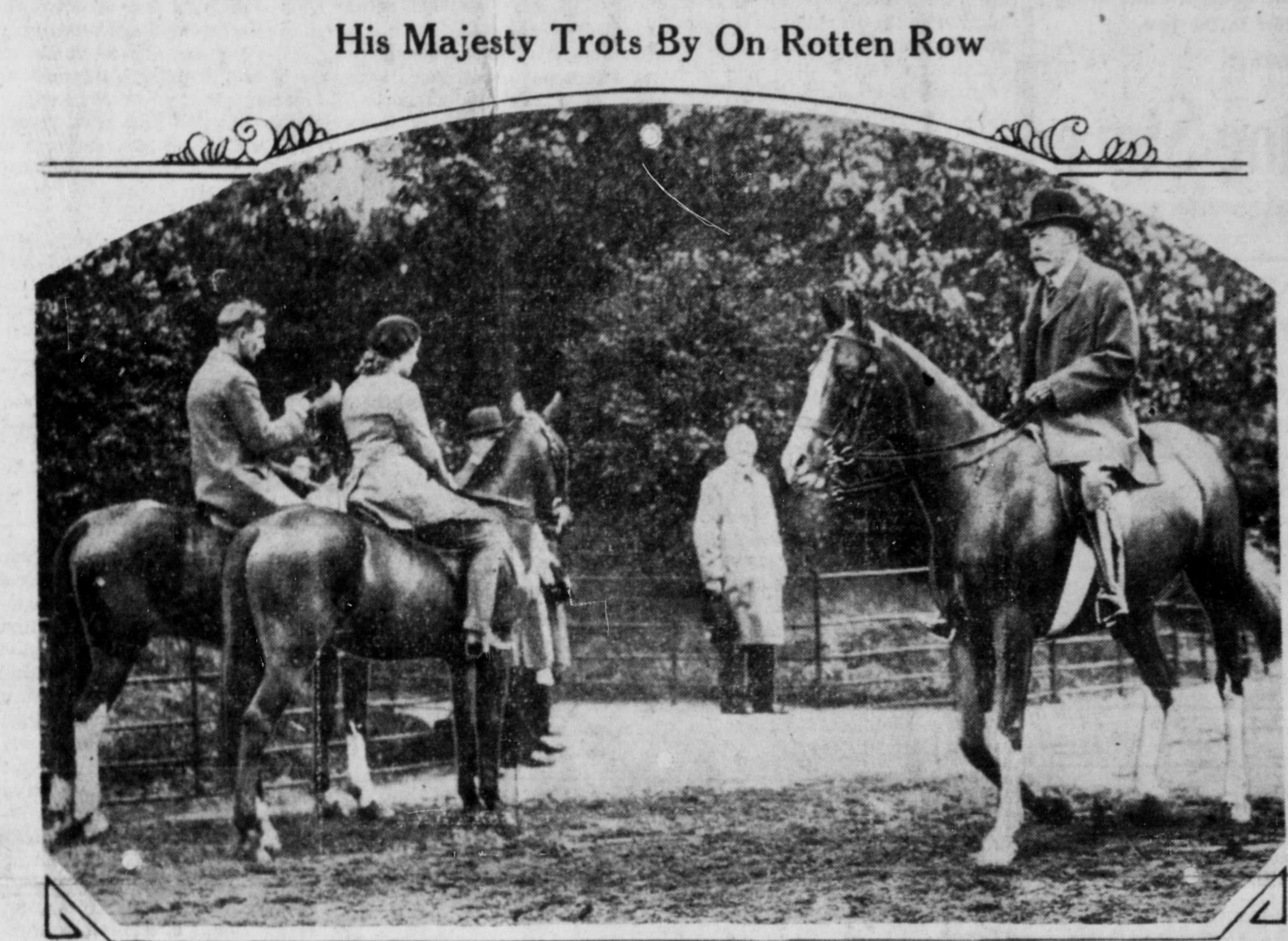

STIFF UPPER LIP

We suggest that Prince Rupert people keep a stiff upper lip and try not to broadcast statements or suggestions of what may or may not happen. We are all hoping for a better condition and it does no good to complain of business conditions or to try to make our neighbors feel downhearted.

Many of us have waited a long time for something to happen and of course we are apt to feel that we cannot continue to be hopeful always. The next few months should prove whether things are to be really better or not. Let us wait hopefully and if there is anything we can say to keep up the morale of the city, let us do it.

A WISE POLICY

If the government of British Columbia had issued bonds to private money lenders for its new road and works program of \$2,000,000, even at a high interest rate, there would have been little or no complaint from the government's critics, says the Victoria Times. Now, because the government is issuing bonds and buying them itself, with the earnings—not the capital—of its sinking funds, it is accused in some quarters of practising dangerous finance. Yet the result is precisely the same so far as the province's debt position and the security of its creditors are concerned. It is \$2,000,000 further in debt. How it could borrow \$2,000,000 for roads and municipal works and not go \$2,000,000 further into debt we do not know.

In reality the only difference between the usual method and the method followed by the government, because the money markets were closed to it, is that it saves brokers' commissions.

British Columbia's sinking fund position has always been better than that of any province in Canada, and still is, even though it has been impossible in the last few years always to maintain the annual installments.

It is only in the last year that the government has balanced its current budget. We are still going behind on unemployment relief account, borrowing for what can not by any stretch of the imagination be considered a capital expenditure, but no government in North America, so far as we know, is handling relief expenditures in any other way. This is an unsound arrangement, certainly, but British Columbia, its own sources of revenue seized by the federal government, its commerce strangled by a lop-sided tariff, can not start the required reform, which will have to come from the top.

Meanwhile, it is part of a sound financial policy to protect our capital assets. If we allow our road system to fall into the complete disrepair which threatens it, we shall be like a man who allows his house to be ruined by his failure to mend his roof. The improvements which the government will make to our roads this year will increase the revenues of the province in tourist trade, in the mining industry and in the increased travel of our own people.

This is a wise and essential expenditure. Those who criticize the government for using the earnings of its sinking fund to pay the cost have yet to explain how the money could be secured in any other way when the federal authorities and the financial markets have joined in refusing to help us.

Swim Hopfuls Looking Ahead For Big Games

Canada's Water Stars Stroking Up For Events in Olympic Contests in Berlin Next Year
(By Elmer Dulmage)

Canadians will doubtless do better in the water than on land at the 1936 Olympic Games in Germany. The tip-off came at the last British Empire Games in London and last month at the Canadian swimming championships in Winnipeg. Our swimmers are better able to look after themselves in international competition than, for instance, our track and field hopfuls.

Since Percy Williams' dinky leg gave way in 1930 and Alex Wilson took a professional coaching job after the 1932 Olympics, Canada has found herself with a select few high-grade tracksters—Phil Edwards, Scotty Rankine, Dave Komonen, Harold Webster, Sammy Richardson and not many others. Meanwhile the swimmers have made amazing strides—or strokes.

There is Phyllis Dewar, who may or may not make the Olympic grade but who stands a better chance than any other Canadian swimmer in history. Toronto's Bob Pirie will be a grown-up boy in time for the 1936 games. George Burleigh of Toronto needs to improve only a little to become a distinct sprint threat, and George Larson of Hamilton is at least as good as Burleigh.

When Burleigh, Pirie, Larson and Ben Gazzell of Toronto teamed at Winnipeg they set a new world record for the 800 yards relay. Granted that the United States or Japan could send out a team any day and beat the 8:28.2 mark, it still was a smashing performance, particularly since Gazzell specializes at backstroking and not sprint swimming.

Larson fooled no one when he beat Pirie and Burleigh in the 100 yards free style in 54.8 seconds. They knew he was good enough to do it. A determined youth Larson was beaten by inches by Burleigh in the 100 yards at the 1934 Empire Games in London. Burleigh's time was 54.8. When the games were over Larson stayed over and won every British championship he tried for from 100 yards to a mile.

DOMINION DAY CELEBRATION

Plans Advanced For Big Event To Take Place on July 1

The second meeting of the Dominion Day celebration committee was held last night in the Canadian Legion Rooms in preparation for the big event on July 1. Reports from the various committees showed that splendid progress was being made.

The committee decided to approach the Baseball Association with a view to staging a game on the afternoon's program, thereby including all the major sports in Prince Rupert on that day. It was felt that this popular pastime would prove a big attraction and fully complete what appears to be one of the most ambitious sport programs ever put on in one day here.

J. S. Wilson was present, representing the Junior Football Association and stated that the game this year would be one of the best the juniors have ever played if past performances of the Junior League this season were any criterion.

P. Edgumbe reported that considerable interest is being shown in the Bulger Cup relay race and it is possible that there may be as many as half a dozen evenly matched teams competing.

Commissioner Alder has kindly given his permission for the use of the grounds which will be put into as good shape as possible. The sale of tickets for the free trip to Vancouver is going over in a big way. The dance committee report plans already being laid for a big day.





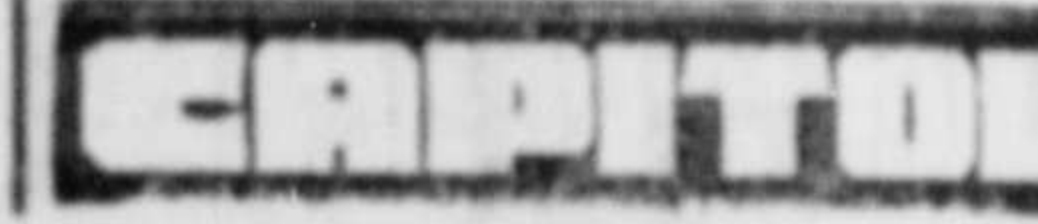
