ARMISTICE DAY HERE

Many Citizens Gather at Cenotaph For Impressive Remembrance Day Rites

A timely burst of sunshine favored Prince Rupert's annual observance of Remembrance Day at the cenotaph yesterday morning, hundreds of citizens joining with ex-service men, members of the naval and military services and other bodies in the parade and service at the cenotaph which marked the seventeenth anniversary of the closing of the Great War. The parade, as usual, was from the corner of Third Avenue and Third Street to the Court House grounds by way of Sixth Street and Second Avenue. Very Rev. James B. Gibson, dean of St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral, acted as padre in charge.

The service was along the customary lines, opening with the singing of "O Canada" after which "Cease Fire" was sounded by Bugler William Rance followed by two minutes' silence in honor of the memory of the war dead. "The Last Post" was then sounded after which there was prayer by the Dean. The hymn "O God Our Help in Ages Past" followed and then was the address by Dean Gibson. The proceedings closed with the placing of wreaths and flowers on the cenotaph, sounding of "The Reveille" by Bugler Rance and the singing of "God Save the King." The Prince Rupert Boys' Band accompanied the singing.

Memorial Address

In his memorial address, Dean Gibson urged that that spirit of fellowship which had prevailed during the Great War be recovered and instilled into the commercial and national life of today. Results of the last war, he felt, had so far been disappointing. There was a spirit of disillusionment in the world today. In remembrance of the war dead, he urged that people today get back to God and bring in His Kingdom on earth. There was nothing more necessary than this today.

The guard of honor for the stone consisted of Company Quartermaster Sergeant S. P. Woodside, Private James Watt, Corp. J. A. Teng and Chief Petty Officer John Gibson (Royal Navy).

Church Parade

About 50 veterans and ten ladies took part in the church parade Sunday morning which was marshalled by President Jack Preece, the Prince Rupert Boys' Band, under Bandmaster Robert Greenfield, also taking part.

Dean J. B. Gibson conducted the service. The Scripture lesson was read by Major C. V. Ewitt. There was an anthem by the choir. Peter Lien presided at the organ.

FIVE DEAD IN ASYLUM

Montreal Mental Hospital Partially Destroyed by Fire on Sunday

MONTREAL, Nov. 12:—Five insane patients were burned to death Saturday night when fire destroyed one wing of the Roman Catholic Church-operated St. Jean de Dieu asylum here. Hundreds of patients were rescued, four of those who perished rushing back into the flaming portion after having been safely removed by their keepers. Another died later of heart failure. A patient is believed to have been responsible for the starting of the fire which caused damage to an estimated amount of \$100,000.

Fire Occurs In St. James Palace

Minor Damage Done as Result Of Explosion of Lamp in Servants' Quarters

LONDON, Nov. 12: (CP)—Explosion of a paraffin lamp in the servants' quarters of St. James Palace, residence of the Prince of Wales, caused a general fire alarm yesterday but the blaze was extinguished with minor damage. The prince was absent in Edinburgh on an Armistice Day service.

Don Juan And His Bride In Chicago City

CHICAGO, Nov. 12:—Don Juan, heir-presumptive to the Spanish throne, and his bride, Princess Maria, spent the week-end in Chicago in the course of their honeymoon tour. They displayed particular interest in the stockyards.

MUSSOLINI TO QUIT GENEVA SOON

WELSH MINERS EMERGE FROM DEPTHS



Despite the fact that they had engaged in a five-day stay-down strike deep in the pits, in which much hand-to-hand fighting took place, these miners of Glamorganshire, Wales, resume their debonair attitude upon coming to the surface. Police are escorting them home. They came from the Taf Merthyr pit in which men of the South Wales Miners' Federation came to blows with the members of the South Wales Miners' Industrial Union. Over 8,000 men are on strike against the employment of non-union labor. Headway has been made for a settlement.

Dijibuti-Addis Ababa Railway Is Menaced by Invaders

Rome Protests

Against League of Nations Sanctions—Ethiopia Ready to Make Stand

ROME, Nov. 12: (CP)—Meeting with little opposition at the hands of the Abyssinian defenders, Italian forces are continuing their advance into Ethiopia from two directions—out of Eritrea on the north and Italian Somaliland on the south. Emperor Haile Selassie is reported to be gravely concerned over the prospect of the Italians interfering with the Dijibuti-Addis Ababa rail line, Ethiopia's outlet to the Red Sea. This would cut off the Ethiopian source of supply of arms and general supplies and would be a body blow. The Italians advanced over the week-end perilously close to the railway line. This is evidently the principal Italian objective at this time.

The Standard Oil Co. of United States is now looked to by Italy as its principal source of oil supply instead of British companies following Standard Oil Co.'s announcement that it does not intend to follow the United States government's suggestion regarding refusal to supply war goods to belligerent nations.

Implicitly threatening her withdrawal from the League today, Italy lodged an official protest with the League of Nations at Geneva against its aggressor in the Ethiopian campaign, pointing out that sanctions had not been imposed against Japan in 1932 on account of its campaign in China nor had they been imposed in connection with the Gran Chaco war between Paraguay and Bolivia. Notes protesting at the sanctions, which become effective next Monday, were sent all countries adhering to the sanctions.

Will Have No Effect

LONDON, Nov. 12: (CP)—Authoritative British sources said today it was inconceivable that Italian protests would have any effect on application of sanctions.

Ethiopians Ready

ADDIS ABABA, Nov. 12:—One hundred thousand native warriors of Ethiopia are ready to defend the mountains south of Makale against further invasion by the Italians, it was declared here last night. An official Ethiopian report said that so far 600 Italians had been killed and 150 Abyssinians.

IS STILL YAWNING

VICTORIA, Nov. 12:—Mrs. P. E. Wakelin is still yawning after five weeks' all efforts of medical men to prevent it having so far proved unavailing. A Toronto nerve specialist arrived at the end of the week to take charge of the case.

SEATTLE, Nov. 12:—As forecast Saturday, a satisfactory settlement was reached over the week-end of the strike of ferry boat employees and service in Puget Sound has been restored to normal with the regular crews.

Export of Silver From Hong Kong Entirely Banned

HONG KONG, China, Nov. 12: (CP)—The Hong Kong government Saturday ordered a ban on export of all silver coins or bullion in one of a series of measures in the attempt to relieve the currency crisis.

HOPE NOW GIVEN UP SINGAPORE, Nov. 12: (CP)—Officers of the British Royal Air Force at Singapore have virtually given up all hope for Sir Charles Kingsford-Smith and his co-pilot, Tom Pethybridge, missing since last Friday on the Allahabad-Singapore hop of a long-distance flight from England to Australia.

DIED THIS MORNING William Smith, aged 68 and a native of Quebec, passed away this morning in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where he had been an invalid patient for a couple of years. Deceased, who had been employed in district canneries, is survived by a brother here.

NEW STRATOSPHERE RECORD IS MADE

RAPID CITY, South Dakota, Nov. 12:—A new stratosphere ascent record of 74,200 feet was set yesterday by the United States Army balloon Explorer II, Captains Albert W. Stevens and Orville Anderson landing in a field near White Lake. The former record of 61,237 feet had been made a couple of years ago in Russia.

Missing Flier Now in Dawson

Pilot Jack Herman And One Of His Passengers Come Over Trail From Cassiar Roadhouse

DAWSON, Nov. 12:—Pilot Jack Herman and O. Ogran, one of his passengers in the plane which was forced down at Cassiar roadhouse on the Yukon River thirty-five miles south of here a week last Saturday and for the safety of which some fears had been entertained, arrived here at the week-end over the trail in search of help. Herman explained that he had been forced down by engine trouble and made a safe landing.

Herman had some bad luck when, in taking off with another Bellanca plane to go back and pick up remaining members of the party, the plane went through the thin ice on the Yukon River and was put out of commission.

Trains Running Normally Again

Heavy Snowfall in Lower Skeena Forces Ploughs Into Action

Following the repair of flood damage in the lower Skeena Valley three weeks ago, traffic has been restored to normal on the local line of the Canadian National Railways. The first regular passenger train to arrive from the east since October 23 came in at 4 o'clock Sunday morning, about five and a half hours late, and was followed by a wayfreight at 1 o'clock yesterday morning. Last night's train for the east left on time at 6 o'clock and the next train is due tonight at 10:20 but will probably be four or five hours late. There is quite an accumulation of railway business following the tie-up. On Sunday there was a heavy snowfall in the lower Skeena Valley and snow ploughs have had to be put into operation along the railway line.

She is scheduled to make the first trans-Pacific mail flight from Alameda to Manila on November 22. 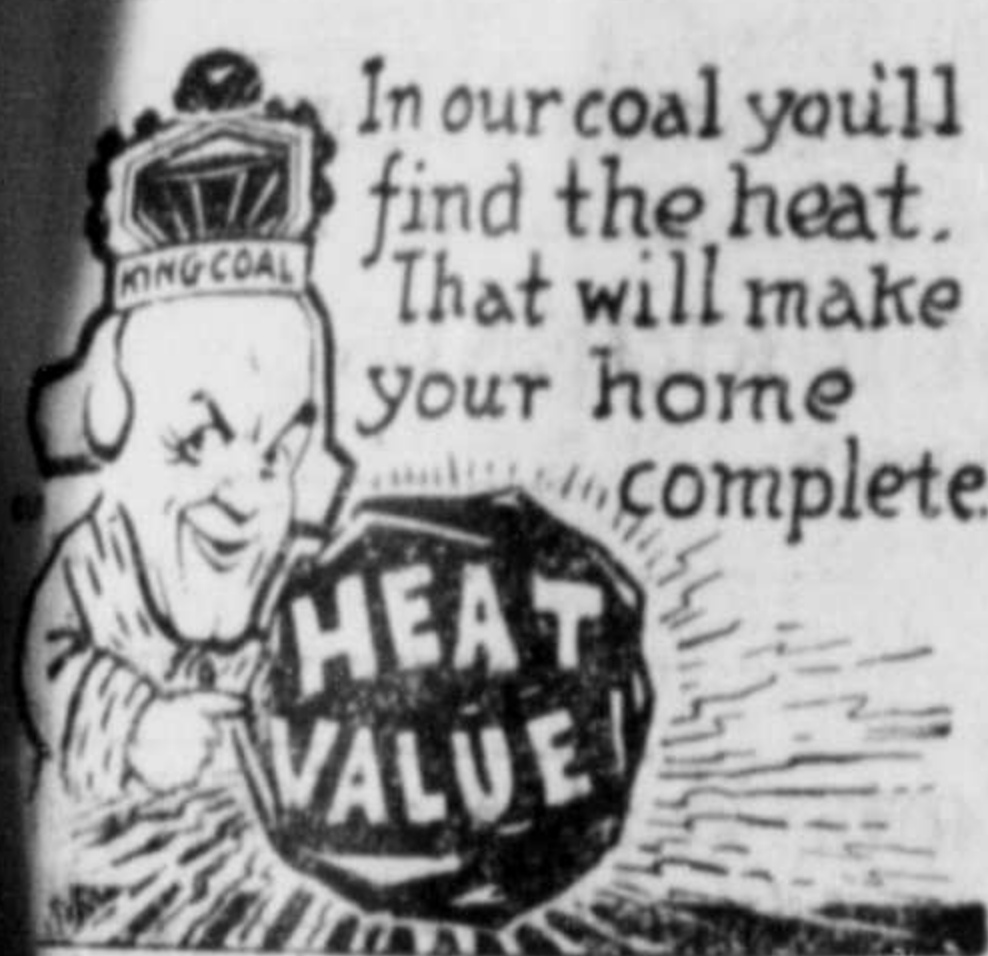

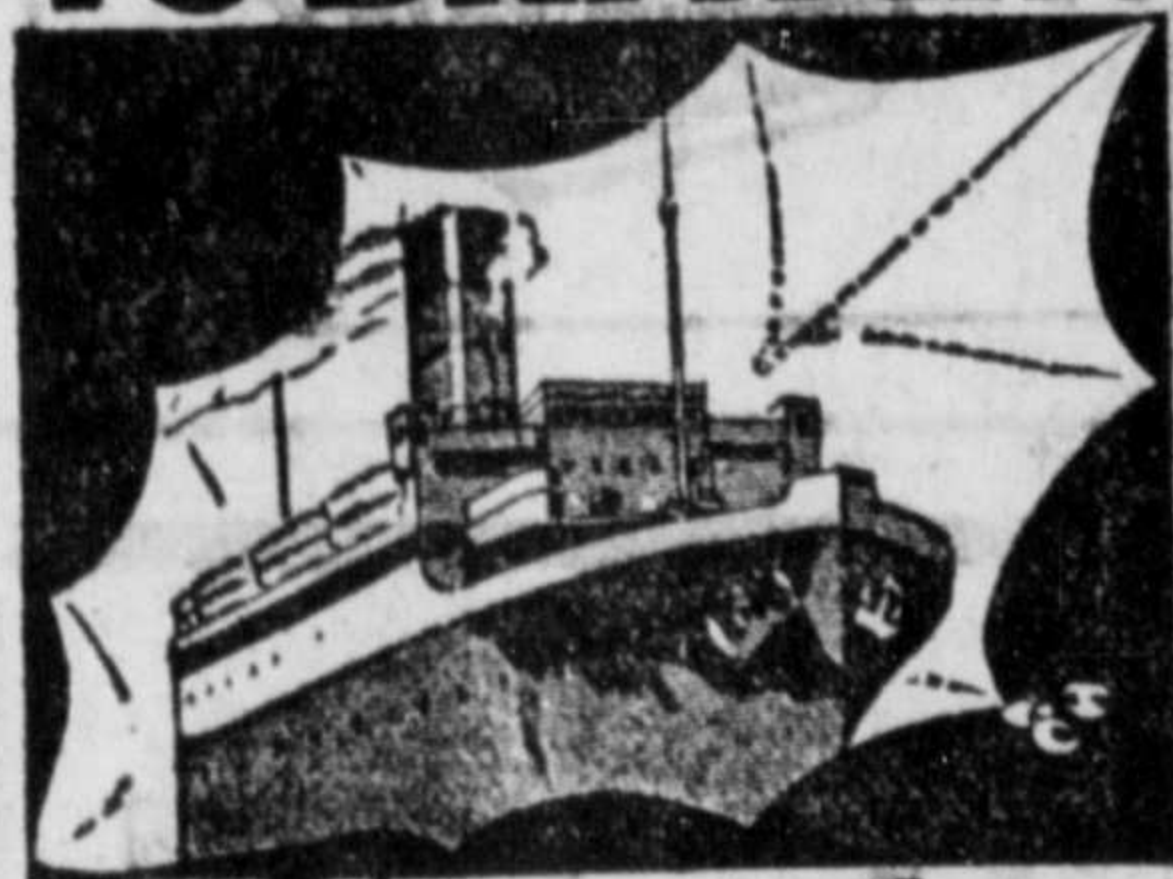

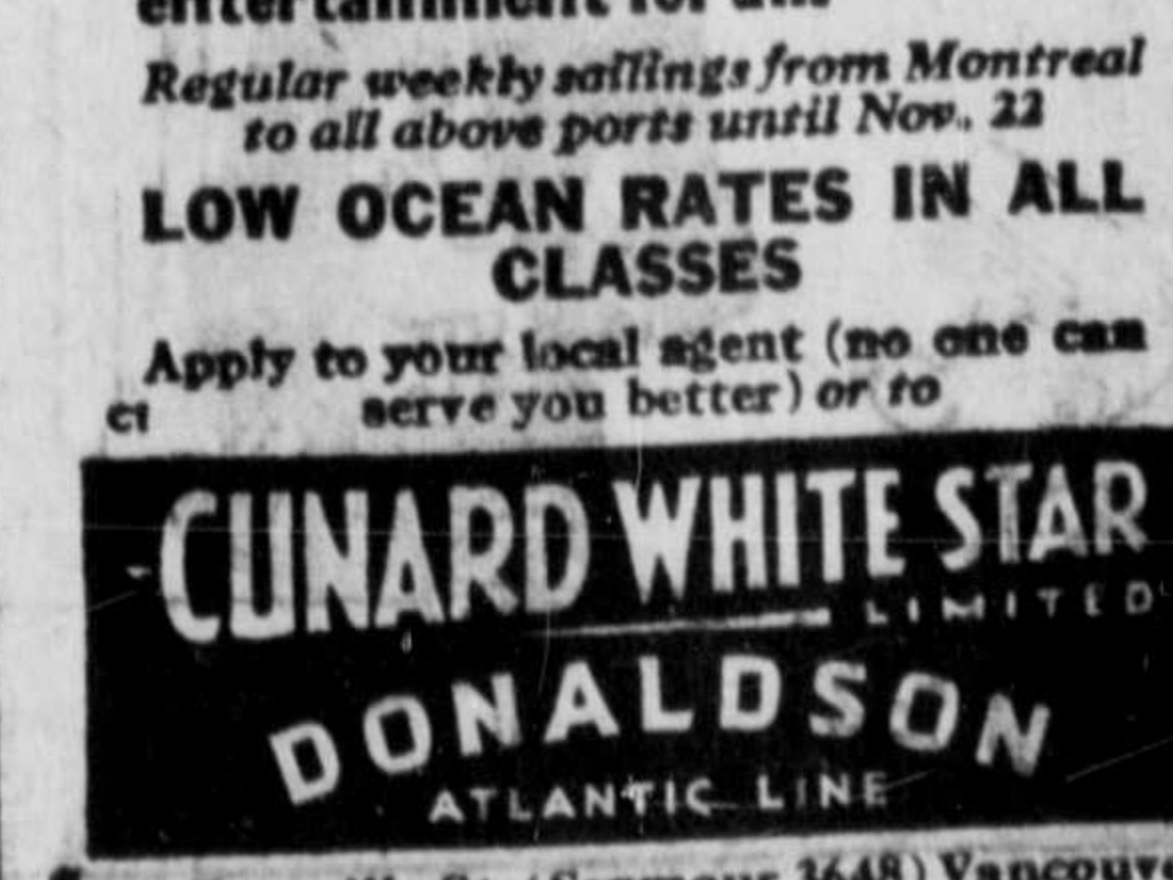

## WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

Fishermen's Harbor at Seven-Mile Point Again Asked—May Restrict Herring Fishing—Hunting Parties Had Good Week-End.

John F. Murray of Jap Inlet, Porcher Island, renews, on behalf of North Island fishermen, the request for the making of a harbor at Wiah (Seven Mile) Point, Graham Island, for the benefit of the trollers and to provide many fishermen in that vicinity with protection from frequent westerly storms. This might well be included by the new federal government in any public works program, Mr. Murray believes.

The Union Oil Co.'s tank scow, which was stationed at North Island during the past summer, has been moved to Winter Harbor on the West Coast of Vancouver Island where it will remain until next spring when it will be brought back to North Island.

The Department of Fisheries announces its intention of reserving Jap Inlet and Butler Cove in this district for herring fishing for half-bait and food purposes only. It is contended that at these two points conditions are particularly suitable for the distribution of live herring for bait to the halibut fleet owing to their position, particularly as regards the requirements of the small Canadian halibut fleet. This would, of course, eliminate herring fishing at these points for purposes of reduction.

With a fair sized list of passengers, Union steamer Catala, Capt. James Findlay, arrived in port at 7:30 Sunday night and sailed a couple of hours later for Stewart, Anyox and other northern points whence she returned here this afternoon and sailed at 2 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints.
