# VANCOUVER SITUATION IS QUIETER

## RAMSAY MACDONALD REGRETFUL OF GERMANY'S ACTION

### Riot Insurance Rates Trebled in Southern City After Outbreak

Permitting of Men to Return to Camps May Ease Situation—General Walk-Out of All Trade Unions Tomorrow is Suggested

VANCOUVER, April 25: (CP)—The relief camp strikers' situation was quiet today as the unemployed remained under cover but fears of further trouble were seen in the action of eighty insurance companies who announced that premiums on riot insurance in Vancouver had been trebled. Civic officials believe that the action of the federal government in offering to permit the strikers to return to the relief camps will ease the situation materially. Meantime representatives of the unemployed are meeting civic and provincial officials late this afternoon to discuss the return of the men to the camps.

Trade unions throughout the city have been invited to stage a one-hour general sympathetic walk-out tomorrow but action has not yet been decided upon.

### VITRIOLIC LABORITE

John Maxam of Glasgow Continues His Attack Upon National Government

LONDON, April 25:—John Maxam, fiery Laborite left from Glasgow continued his attacks upon the National government and Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald in particular in the budget debate in the House of Commons. Criticizing the budget, he drew attention, among other things, that the Chancellor of the Exchequer had not taken into account war debt obligations to the United States in announcing his surplus. Maxam paid his respects to Premier MacDonald by declaring that he had sold out the Labor Party to royalty.

### GIANTS ARE GOING WELL

New Yorkers Assume Commanding Position in National League

NEW YORK, April 25: (CP)—New York Giants defeated Boston Braves at the Polo Grounds yesterday to assume a commanding position in the National League race. The Brooklyn Dodgers continued in stride by defeating the Phillies while the world champion St. Louis Cardinals dropped into third place as a result of a close defeat at the hands of the Chicago Cubs. Pittsburgh Pirates defeated Cincinnati Reds and the two teams are now in a tie for fourth place. The Phillies and Chicago Cubs are tied for sixth place while the Boston Braves, Babe Ruth notwithstanding, are in exclusive possession of the cellar.

CALGARY, April 25:—At a civic reception in his honor Lord Baden-Powell stated that, for the first time in the course of his present world tour, his name had been correctly pronounced by Mayor Andrew Davison.

In Victoria Arena 5000 Boy Scouts participated in a monster jamboree in honor of Lord and Lady Baden-Powell who had arrived from the Pacific Coast.

### Drought Areas In Bad Shape

Situation in Middle West This Spring Even Worse Than It Was a Year Ago

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 25:—The Department of Agriculture announces that conditions in the drought areas of the Middle West are even worse this spring than they were a year ago in spite of winter moisture. An acute shortage of beef and pork is anticipated this year.

### BOOST IS ANNOUNCED

United States Treasury Fixed Price For Silver Raised To 77.57c

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 25: (CP)—Following yesterday's silver quotations on the world's metal markets going slightly above the United States Treasury fixed price of 71.11c per ounce, announcement was made by presidential proclamation last night of a further increase in the fixed Treasury price for newly mined metal to 77.57c. Such action had been anticipated by leading traders.

Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau announced today that the government would continue to buy silver until it reaches \$1.29 per ounce or until treasury stocks equal one-third of the total gold supply.

Yesterday's closing price in New York was 71 1/2c while the London quotation was equivalent to 71.57c. Today a new peak since October 1921 was touched when the price reached 74 1/2c, the advance continuing steadily to close at 77c.

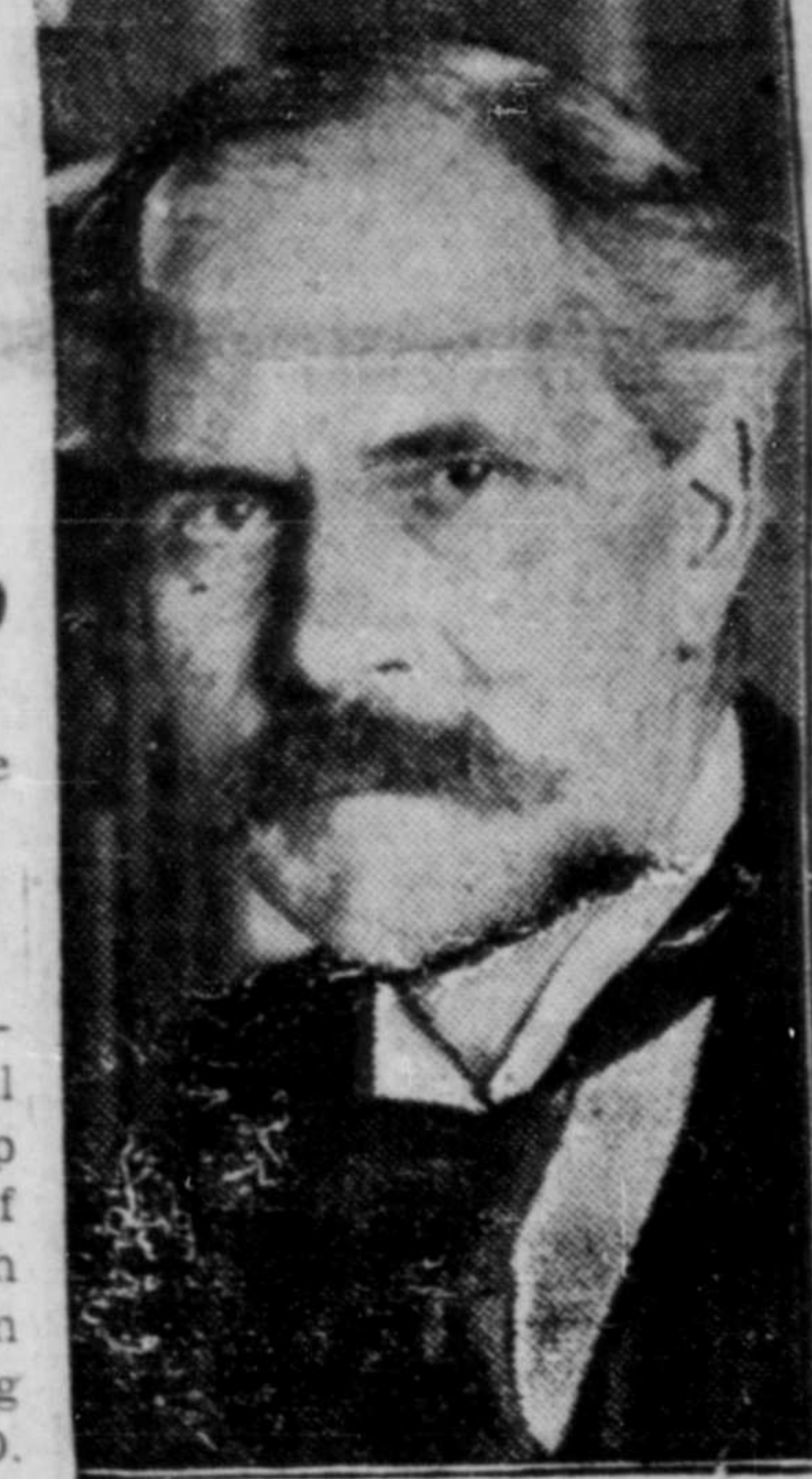
### Road to Peace Broken Up and is Beset With Terrors, Premier Says

Keen Disappointment Expressed by British Prime Minister at Recent Turn of Events in Europe Following Hitler's Abrogation

LONDON, April 25: (CP)—Prime Minister J. Ramsay MacDonald, in an article written for the "News Letter," official organ of his party (Nationalist Government), bluntly declares today that "Germany has broken up the road to peace and has beset it with terrors." The Premier indicates keen disappointment at the recent turn of events in Europe following abrogation by Germany of the military clauses of the Versailles Treaty.

MEXICO CITY, April 25:—Mrs. Amelia Earhart Putnam arrived here a few days ago in her snub-nosed monoplane from Burbank, Cal. She had hoped to establish a new speed record for the 1758-mile flight but failed in the non-stop attempt when she was forced down not far north of here. Later she took to the air again and completed the trip.

### Resident Of Port Clements Died Saturday

F. L. T. Dunroe Passed Away at Age Of 83 and Was Buried on Monday

Word was received this morning from Port Clements of the death on Saturday last of F. L. T. Dunroe, 82 years of age, a pioneer British Columbia school teacher. He was buried on Monday at Port Clements, his son reading the Roman Catholic service. Requiem mass will be said at the Catholic Church here.

Mr. Dunroe left four sons and six daughters, three of the sons being now at Port Clements.

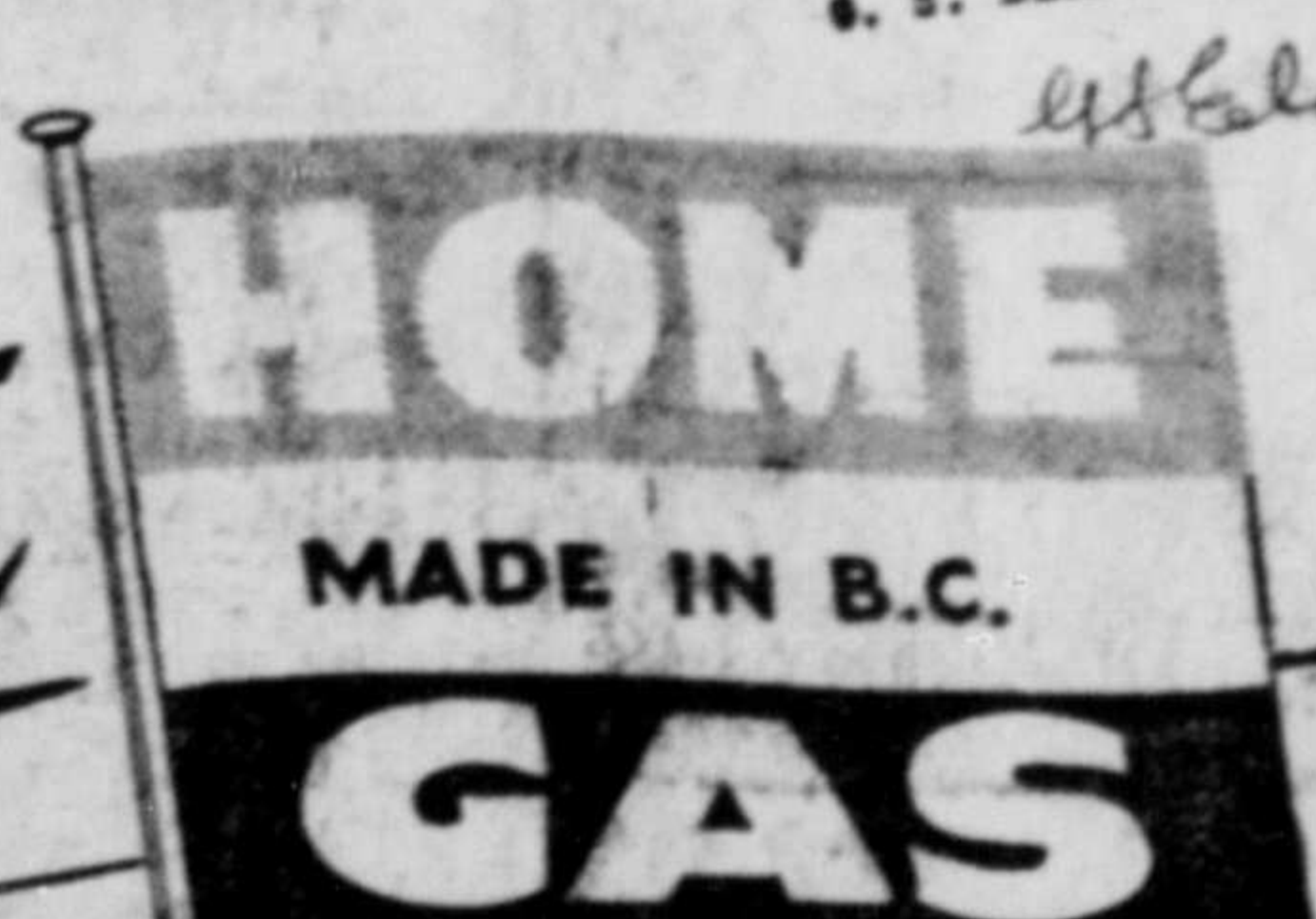
