GOVERNMENT PUTS THUMBS DOWN ON PUBLIC BUILDING

Bill Providing For Employment of Young Men is Brought Down

Carpentry, Joinery and Benchwork, Painting and Decorating, Plastering, Sheet Metal Work, Plumbing, Steamfitting and Electrical Work Specified

VICTORIA, March 1: (CP)-British Columbia will aunch a system of state-regulated apprenticeships under. a bill sponsored in the Legislature yesterday by Hon. George S. Pearson, minister of labor. The initial measure is designed to cover six trades: carpentry and joinery and benchwork; painting and decorating; plastering; sheet hetal work; plumbing and steam-x

trades may be added from time to FAVORABLE

The measure is designed especially to cover boys from sixteen to eighteen years of age.

Employers in the trades covered are prohibited from employing boys of this age more than three months except on apprenticeship contracts. Employment of boys under sixteen n the specified trades is prohibited.




