DETROIT IN PUCK LEAD

Had Two Easy Victories Over Weekend, Beating Maple Leafs and Rangers

MONTREAL, Dec. 16: (CP)—Piling up four goals in the first period and adding two more in the third, New York Rangers scored an easy 6-2 victory over Montreal Maroons in the National Hockey League Saturday night. The Maroons never had a chance and were clearly outplayed. Both their scores came in the second period, the first from Bob Gracie in six minutes and the second from Gus Marker in fourteen minutes. Boucher, Keeling, Bun Cook and Sievert scored for the Rangers in the first period and Bryson and Billings for Rangers in the third, the last goal coming from a breakaway two minutes and 45 seconds before time.

At Toronto in a close game, the Detroit Red Wings defeated the Maple Leafs four to two, four goals coming in the third period—three for Detroit and one for Toronto.

By winning over the New York Rangers on Detroit ice last night, the Red Wings took over leadership of the American section, displacing the Chicago Black Hawks who were being blanked at Chicago by the New York Americans.

The victory put the Americans into second place in the international section ahead of the Maroons.

Edmonton And Calgary Draw

Eskimos Draw Out of Tie For Cellular With Seattle Sea Hawks

EDMONTON, Dec. 16: (CP)—Edmonton and Calgary played a two-all draw in the Northwestern Hockey League here Saturday night. On Friday Calgary had defeated Edmonton at Calgary three to one. The Eskimos are now in fourth place with a one-point lead over the cellar-dwelling Seattle Sea Hawks.

Somewhat taken aback and possibly embarrassed our friend stammered his regrets at being unable to purchase a copy.

We had already noticed the floor bare of covering but spotlessly clean and the scantily clad kiddies who were looking at us with large wondering eyes and with whom we were trying to make friends. And so it came about we learned that the new baby sister in the hospital with the mother were expected home soon.

"Take the 'Cry' to your wife. Never mind the dime. Someone's quarter will cover this," the officer said as she left to continue the sale of "Crys" but not to forget the picture presented of a man courageously battling with adverse circumstances over which he had no control and a mother whose love for home and children helped her to bear the bitterness of her lot.

The next day the Army obeyed the urge to follow up the case, painfully conscious, it had a sensitive nature to deal with.

Coal found its way to that home before mother returned with the baby so that a fire could be kept burning all night.

Local folk remember only too well the severity of the weather this time last year. A Christmas hamper and clothing was also sent and with a little further assistance during the rest of the winter this grateful family weathered the storm.

During the month of February \$47.80 was spent on shoes and rubbers alone.

RECITAL IS VERY FINE

Prince Rupert Philharmonic Society Never Heard to Better Advantage

Making its first appearance of season in public concert, the Prince Rupert Philharmonic Society, under the direction of Dr. H. N. Brocklesby, last night presented a highly acceptable recital in the Capitol Theatre. The program was largely, although not entirely, of sacred numbers. Since its last appearance in public, the Society has acquired a number of new members. The organization continues to advance in skill and finish and the director and the members are to be congratulated on the progress they are making. Without criticizing the present ones, some additional men's voices could be used to advantage. The women's section is more adequate.

While every number was good, outstanding ones included the choruses "Green Pastures" and "Triumph and Thanksgiving," both of which gave the entire company full scope for harmony and volume.

The recitative solo of John E. Davey, accompanied by the choir and with violin obligato by A. C. Cameron, was something a little different and, as such, proved interesting.

Also entitled to special mention was the ladies' chorus, particularly "The Cradle Song" (Chapman) which was done with fine tonal effect and precision. The well known Brahms' "Lullaby" as a postlude was brief but very much appreciated.

Certainly a piece de resistance was Miss Marie Balagno's piano solo. Miss Balagno has given this number before in public but never so well. At the start she showed a little shy timidity but soon became absorbed in the instrument and it was indeed a distinctive rendition of "Adagio" movement from the famous "Moonlight Sonata," made the more effective by the addition of the "Allegro" movement. Technique was high faultless and interpretation was very fine.

Much credit also devolved in connection with the concert upon Charles P. Balagno for his discriminatory and completely effective work as piano accompanist.

Dr. R. G. Large, president of the Prince Rupert Philharmonic Society, spoke briefly at the opening of the recital, acknowledging the work of assisting artists and thanking the Northern B. C. Power, Co. for loaning electrical fixtures for the lighting effects, the management of the Capitol Theatre for courtesy and, all others who had assisted.

DECEMBER IS RAINY MONTH

Bids Fair to be Wettest of Year If Excessive Precipitation Continues

Unless there is an immediate cessation of the excessively rainy weather conditions which have been prevailing for the past several weeks, December bids fair to set up a record for the present year as far as precipitation is concerned. Up to yesterday, slightly over ten inches of rain had fallen since the beginning of the month, the Digby Island meteorological station announced. So far October and November have been the wettest months in 1935, both having had over twelve inches of rain.

Reduction Of Large Navies Asked by Japs

LONDON, Dec. 16:—Following rejection by the other member nations of the five-power naval conference of its demand for naval equality with Great Britain and the United States, Japan stated that it saw no reason to change its demand but requested a large reduction in the greater navies. The conference may drag on but general agreement now appears improbable.

The conference may become further complicated with a demand by France to also be given equality in the event of Japan's demand for equal naval strength with United States and Great Britain being acceded to.

DOUBLE KILLING

Murder-Suicide Seen in Tragedy At Vancouver at End of Week

VANCOUVER, Dec. 16: (CP)—Police followed a murder-suicide theory Sunday night as they investigated the discovery of the bodies of Mrs. C. Biggar, middle-aged departmental store saleswoman, and Charles A. Wookey, 50-year old retired contractor, in widely separated parts of the city Saturday. The deaths are linked up by the fact that the woman's body was found in Wookey's car, parked in a secluded wooded area near Marine Drive and Holland Street, with a 25-calibre bullet wound in the head while Wookey's body was found in a desolate part of Kitsilano Beach with a 25-calibre bullet wound in the forehead and a gun lying underneath.

AIR FORCE IN AFRICA

Southern Dominion To Have 250 Planes And Train Thousands Of Pilots And Mechanics

CAPETOWN, South Africa, Dec. 16:—The government of the Union of South Africa is planning to build up during the next five years an air force equal to that of any second-class nation. One thousand pilots and 3000 mechanics will be trained, about twenty-five percent of whom will be on active service with the remainder on the reserve list. There will be 250 airplanes.

TERRACE, Dec. 16:—Some anxiety is felt locally in regard to Jack Molloy, who has been missing since December 5. He was 62 years of age and had been unemployed for some time, having come here from the United States. When last seen he was dressed in work clothes. He was five feet, eight inches in height, weighed 175 pounds, was partly bald and had blue eyes. He lived at Philbert Hotel and his room had not been occupied on the night he dropped out of sight. He left his belongings in the room. Molloy had followed the work of a logger and teamster.

CONFERENCE OF PREMIERS

Evidently the conference of premiers last week was the most successful ever held. No one expected there would be definite announcements in regard to all the matters laid before it. Some of the problems require further discussions with the departments interested and others have to be compromised. There seemed, however, to have been a spirit of give and take and of a desire to work out solutions for the problems outstanding. There was a lot of heart to heart discussion, much of which has not been reported in the press, and the eastern representatives of the government are now in a much better position to understand the position of the west.

It seems that there was no attempt on the part of the Prime Minister to dominate the conference but every person there was free to express himself and receive courteous attention.

British Columbia undoubtedly stands to gain from the presentation of views. Not only did the minister of labor express the British Columbia view on unemployment and relief but Premier Pattullo and Finance Minister Hart set out clearly and fully the financial aspect of affairs in the province.

The real test will come when it is found what matters are dealt with at the first session of Parliament. The rapidly at which the unemployed are absorbed will also be a test as to the value of the work done by the western delegates. It must also be remembered that Premier King is pledged to end unemployment within a reasonable time.

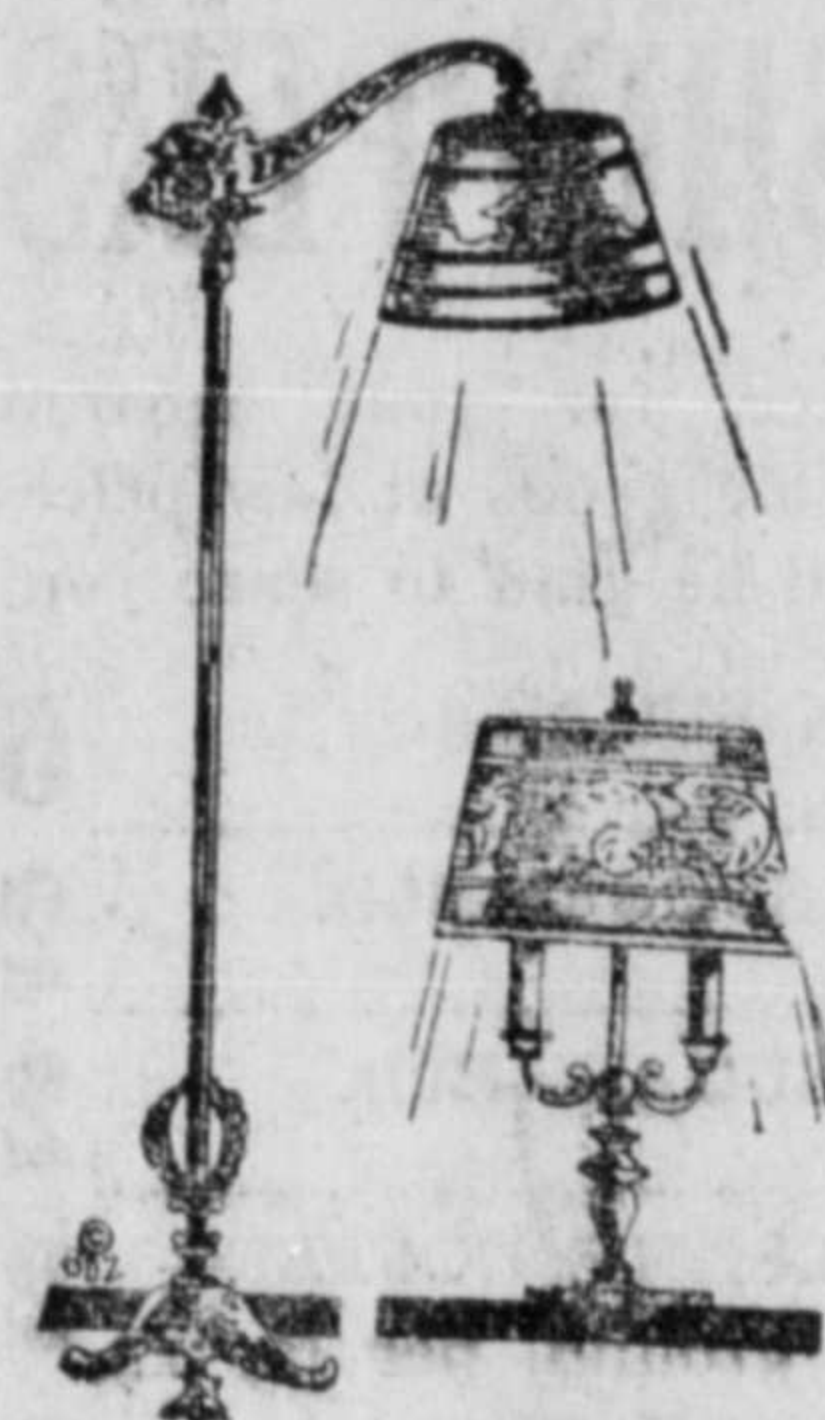
