INTEREST NOW IN ENGLISH CABINET

Ramsay MacDonald May Be Provided With Safe Seat if He Wants One

Government Majority is Larger Than Even Its Most Enthusiastic Supporters Had Hoped For—Standing Is Now 429 to 171

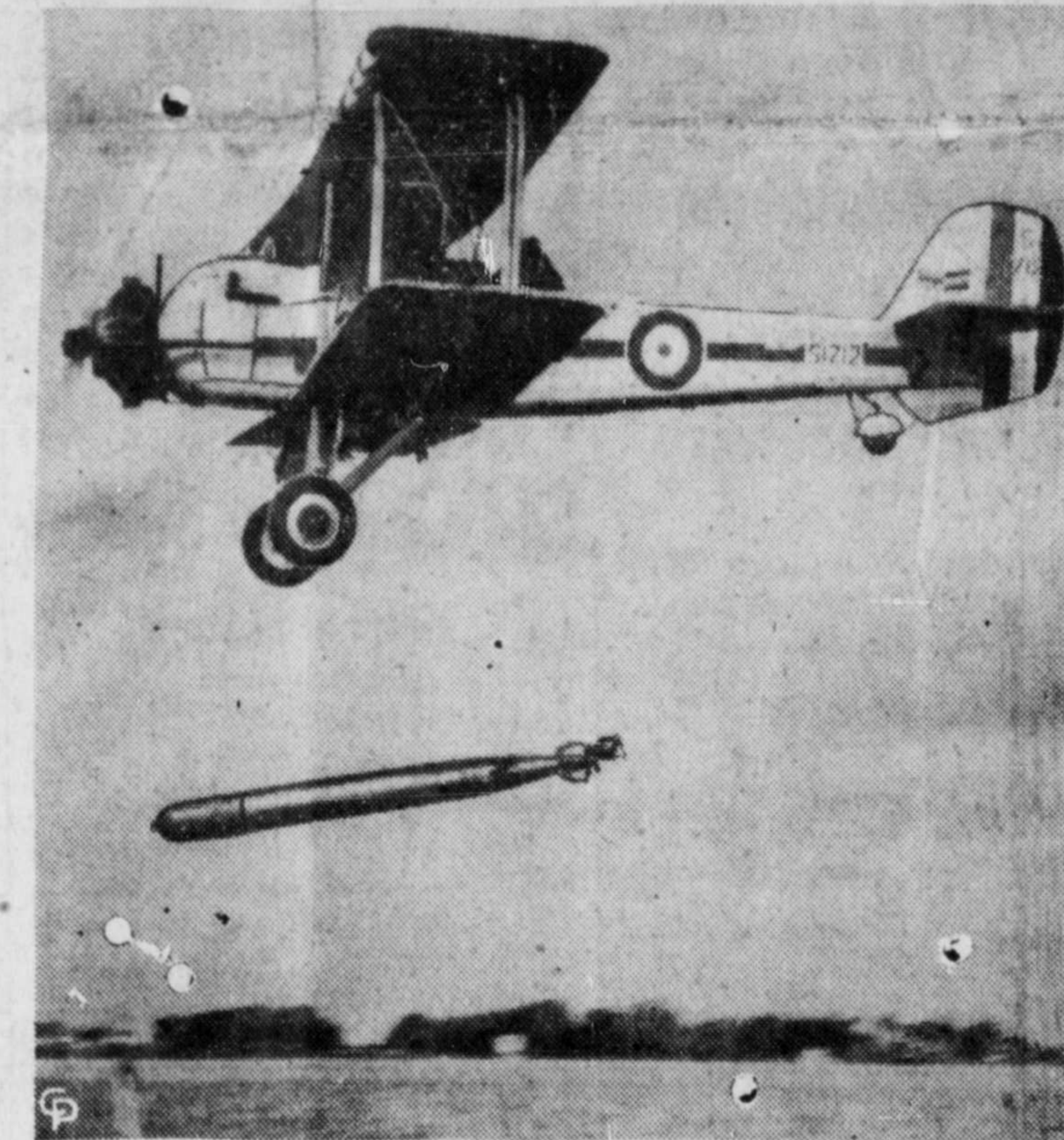
LONDON, Nov. 16: (CP)—Interest shifted today from general election itself to the make-up of the cabinet which Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin will face when it meets November 26. It was believed that every effort would be made to find a seat for former Premier J. Ramsay MacDonald should he desire to re-enter the cabinet. If not, his son, Malcolm, defeated Colonial Secretary, may be found a safe seat. The elder MacDonald, prior to the election, was offered a seat in which his election would have been assured but he chose to contest his old seat of Seaham in the face of almost certain defeat. With only fifteen seats still unreported, the government has been returned to power with a majority larger than even its most optimistic supporters had predicted. Its 429 members as against 171 for the Opposition give it a majority of 258. Conservatives hold the large majority of government seats, being indeed in complete political control of Parliament, with 385. Liberal Nationalists have thirty-two seats and National Laborites have dwindled to six. Others on the government side are four Nationalists, one Independent and one Independent Conservative. In the Opposition Laborites number 149 with twelve Liberals, four Independent Liberals, four Independent Laborites, one Independent and one Communist.

MUSSOLINI CALLS HIS COUNCIL TOGETHER

McGeer Is Victorious In Recount

VANCOUVER, Nov. 16: (CP)—Mayor G. G. McGeer was last night declared elected Member of Parliament for Vancouver-Burrard by a majority of six votes over Arnold Webster, C. C. F. candidate, who had been originally declared elected, following completion of the recount by Judge J. N. Ellis in County Court. Judge Ellis' jurisdiction in connection with the recount has now been questioned in quo warranto proceedings which will be heard on November 18 in Supreme Court.

Fascist Leaders Meet Tonight to Decide On Sanctions Resistance

Canada Provides Drastic Penalties For Contravention Of Her Economic Stand Against Italy Which Becomes Effective Next Monday

ROME, Nov. 16: (CP)—The Fascist Grand Council has been summoned by Premier Benito Mussolini to meet at midnight tonight to review Italy's course and take precautions for resisting League of Nations economic penalties for being the aggressor in the invasion of Ethiopia. The penalties are scheduled to go into force on Monday.

Canada Backs Sanctions OTTAWA, Nov. 16: (CP)—Drastic penalties for contravention of the Canadian government's order-in-council providing for imposition of sanctions against Italy have been provided, it was announced today prior to the application of the sanctions on Monday.

Warning Issued By Secretary of State

Reminds United States Industrialists of Ban Placed on Exports To Belligerents

WASHINGTON D.C. Nov. 16:—Sharp warning was issued yesterday by Secretary of State Cordell Hull against export of oil and such commodities to war belligerents. This was against the policy of the government, Secretary Hull reminded.

Germany's Stand BERLIN, Nov. 16:—The Nazi government yesterday reiterated its intention of placing an embargo upon the shipment of any war materials to Italy.

Mrs. Helen Starr Of Essington Dies

Many Attended Funeral of Well Known Native Resident Of Skeena River Village

The funeral of the late Mrs. Helen Starr, one of Port Essington's best known native women, whose death occurred a few days ago, took place from the United Church at the Skeena River village this week with Rev. Frank Bushfield officiating. There was a large attendance at the rites and many beautiful floral offerings testified to the esteem in which deceased was held and the sorrow which was felt at her passing.

Jury in Dakota Fails to Agree

BISMARCK, N. D., Nov. 16:—The jury in the case of Former Governor Langer, charged with conspiracy, last night was dismissed after it had reported itself to be hopelessly deadlocked. It is Langer's second trial. He was convicted in the first but, on appeal was granted a new trial.

Zealand Ocean Aviatrix Had Been Forced Down In Salt Swamp In Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Nov. 16: (CP)—New Zealand aviatrix who had been missing on a flight from Natal to Rio de Janeiro following her successful span of the South Atlantic earlier in the week, arrived safely at Rio yesterday after being forced down in a salt swamp from which she was rescued by a Brazilian Army plane. The aviatrix was forced down on account of a leaky fuel tank and spent the night with a fever and his family.

MAY KNOW ON MONDAY

Publication Of Details Of Reciprocity Pact Withheld—Protests Still Pouring In

WASHINGTON D.C., Nov. 16: (CP)—Possibly on Monday next details of the Canadian-American trade treaty, which was signed in Washington yesterday afternoon by Premier W. L. Mackenzie King, on behalf of Canada, and Secretary of State Cordell Hull of United States, will be made public. The tariff reductions and other concessions which it contains will become operative before the end of the year. The signing of the pact, which took place in President Roosevelt's office, marked a new record for dispatch of diplomatic negotiation. The treaty runs into fifteen thousand words. Meantime the Pacific Northwest States are in an uproar of protest in the fear that the government has sold them out. Lumber, agricultural and mining leaders as well as workers have united in pouring in protests. The International Longshoremen's Association and the International Teamster's Union of the Pacific Coast are reported to be considering refusal to handle Canadian lumber because it would be unfair cargo.

BRITISH ELECTIONS

The victory of the Conservatives in the British elections came as no surprise to people who were familiar with the situation. It was expected that the government majority would be reduced but, as it is, it will have a good working majority of between two and three hundred. The old majority of 405 was too overwhelming for good government.

It may be taken for granted that, under ordinary conditions, the British National government would have found it difficult to secure sufficient support to enable it to carry on. With something of an international crisis, it became necessary to impress Italy and other countries that the people of Britain were behind their administration in imposing sanctions through the League of Nations. In fact, support of the League was a potent factor in inducing many who might normally have been labor supporters to vote for the government.

TWO IMPORTANT PARTIES LEFT

There are only two important parties left in the United Kingdom today—Conservative and Labor. Gradually the Liberals are being eliminated until less than a dozen remain in the opposition. It is very doubtful if the party will ever come back unless there should be a break in labor ranks that might throw the more conservative labor supporters with the Liberals.

RAMSAY MACDONALD AND OTHERS

Most people will regret the defeat of the fine old political warrior, Right Hon. J. Ramsay MacDonald. One cannot but admire his courage in deserting the Labor Party when he considered it his duty to do so and leading the National Government through difficult times. Evidently, he did not expect the defeat but it was a likely thing to happen. People do not usually like a turncoat and he is bound to be accused of turning in order to secure the high office for which he was chosen.

Lloyd George is in a different class. He was at one time more radical than ever Ramsay MacDonald was. He headed a war government and gradually has been eliminated from the councils of the nation but his people in Wales continue to elect him. He is still an outstanding personality and is an ornament to Parliament.

Those who like to see a man in the House who has no reverence for anyone or anything will be glad to see McGovern of Glasgow re-elected. Possibly the day will yet come when McGovern will come to realize that there is in the world something to revere and admire besides blatant bad manners.

WATERFRONT WHIFFS

American Halibut Coming in Again—Chris Henriksen Off to California—Skipper Delap to Ireland For Winter—Halibut Fishing Closes Dec. 26

With a resumption of traffic on the line of the Canadian National Railways after a tie-up of two weeks owing to high water trouble, American halibut boats started again to bring their catches into Prince Rupert during the past week for shipment to the eastern markets. Landings for the week were, however, rather light at a total of but 154,000 pounds of which 35,000 was from Canadian vessels and 119,000 pounds from American. This brought the season's total up to 11,004,650 pounds of which 5,109,350 pounds was from Canadian boats and 5,895,300 pounds from American vessels. The boats which landed catches during the week were: Canadian—Pair of Jacks, 14,000 pounds; R. W., 5,000; Signal, 16,000. American—Fremont, 12,500; Norland, 12,500; Oceanic, 8,000; Electra, 40,000; Viking, 9,000; Wizard, 35,000. Prices were from 6.9c and 6c to 7.3c and 6c for Canadian fish and from 8c and 6c to 8.3c and 6c for American.

On two days during the week—Saturday and yesterday—there were no boats in with catches. The freighter Danwood, which it was announced by the Daily News yesterday would be coming here on or about November 30 to load a cargo of aspen and hemlock logs for the Orient, is no stranger to this port. She is a Norwegian motorship and was last here two or three years ago to load a cargo of grain.

Capt. Chris Henriksen, one of Prince Rupert's best known halibut fishermen, accompanied by Mrs. Henriksen, left today aboard his boat Gibson for Vancouver. From there they will motor to California to spend the winter.

Rev. Capt. W. A. Delap, missionary skipper of the Anglican mission boat Northern Cross and Mrs. Delap sailed last night on the Princess Adelaide for Vancouver whence they will proceed to Montreal to embark on the Duchess of Athol for Ireland to spend the winter. After an active season, the Northern Cross has now been tied up for the winter.

John W. Allen, superintendent engineer for Dominion Fisheries, arrived in the city on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon from Vancouver, being here on official business.

Closing of Season
The International Fisheries Commission announces that Areas No. 3 and 4 will be closed to fishing on December 26 at midnight by which time it is estimated the quota for the year will have been reached. This will close all areas on the Pacific Coast to halibut fishing.

Armour Salvage Co.'s service boat Algie, Capt. Oscar Haveroy, returned this afternoon from a trip to Sedgewick Bay, Queen Charlotte Islands, having delivered a scowload of lumber to the J. R. Morgan Logging Co.'s camp there from the Billmor sawmill.

The trolling boat Coolie, with Mr. and Mrs. James Macdonald on board, for which the provincial

police had been requested to make a search, arrived safely in Prince Rupert yesterday. The vessel had left North Island a month ago supposedly for Vancouver via Butedale and Klemtu and, when it failed to reach Vancouver, some anxiety was felt. All the while Mr. and Mrs. Macdonald had been visiting leisurely at Massett unaware that concern was being felt for their safety. They intend to return from here to Massett.

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Repairs to Pipe Line Completed

Permanent repairs to the main pipe line between Woodworth and Shawatlans Lake, some ninety feet of which was washed out in the big rainstorm of some three weeks ago, were completed today and a crew of eleven men who have been carrying out the work have returned to the city. The break occurred about 1200 feet above the Shawatlans Lake power house.

In order to restore the city water supply as well as water for the power plant, it was necessary to use cribbing to hold up the replaced section of the pipe line temporarily. Then followed the permanent work which involved the putting in of five concrete piers from ten to fourteen feet in height.
