CITY IS IN BAD SHAPE

Mayor McGeer Appears Before Private Bills Committee in Regard to Charter Amendments

VICTORIA, Feb. 27: (CP)-Mayor G. G. McGeer of Vancouver, M. L. A. for Vancouver-Burrard, told the private bills committee of the Legislature yesterday that, unless the city of Vancouver obtained early financial relief, the provincial government would have to take over the financing of the city.

Mayor McGeer was speaking on proposed charter amendments which would include the cutting of the interest rate on the city's bonded indebtedness to three percent and the suspension of sinking fund payments for a period of five years.

Mayor McGeer also proposed that the Vancouver charter should be amended to provide that the provincial government could appoint a commissioner in the event of the bondholders suing for non-payment of interest. At the present time-Vancouver does not come under the general provisions of the Municipal Act and, should the bondholders apply to the courts in the event of interest not being paid, it would mean putting in the sheriff who could exact a tax levy to pay the interest, the mayor said.
