# TAKING UP FREIGHT RATES AGAIN

## OPENING DATE FOR HALIBUT FISHING IN 1935 IS MARCH 1

### Vancouver May Join In Fighting Against Rate Discrimination

Finance Committee Recommends That City Council Get Behind Tom Reid's Appeal to Privy Council

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7: (CP)—The civic finance committee yesterday decided to recommend to the city council that Vancouver join with Tom Reid, M.P. for New Westminster, in an appeal to the Canadian Privy Council for removal of alleged discrimination in freight rates between Vancouver and prairie points. The issue will cover both eastbound and westbound grain and commodity rates between Vancouver and the prairies.

Appropriate Speeches at Public Meeting Last Night in Connection With National Education Week

### Timely Messages

Schools Open to Public Inspection And Many Parents Visit Classrooms


In connection with the observance of National Education Week in Prince Rupert, a public meeting was held last night in the Presbyterian Church Hall under the auspices of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association. The proceedings were featured by addresses appropriate to the occasion by City Commissioner W. J. Alder, Col. J. W. Nicholls, J. S. Wilson and School Inspector T. W. Hall. W. W. C. O'Neill, president of the Teachers' Association, was in the chair.

In his opening remarks, Mr. O'Neill paid tribute to the parents who were the first teachers of the child. The care, influence and training by the parents in the years before school age was reached were of enormous significance and importance, the effect of which was lasting. The teachers also welcomed Mr. O'Neill said, the assistance of all organizations in training and activities outside of school.

The task of the teachers, City Commissioner Alder said, was an arduous one. Fortunately, Prince Rupert had a splendid lot of teachers and the schools here were second to none. Mr. Alder referred to the serious problem of the youths who, after being given a liberal education, were unable to employ it to make a living. The only way out of it he saw was a return to a modified system of apprenticeship in the industries.

Col. Nicholls spoke on "The Value of Education in Industrial Life." Except as a training in mechanics of mental capacity, education was not always essential for success in industrial life. As for the present situation and the prospect for the future of those leaving school, Col. Nicholls thought the monetary system had little to do with it. Things, he believed, were beginning to adjust themselves now, recovery had commenced and, providing they were willing to work, he believed children of today would again have a great opportunity in industrial life and would be in a position to enjoy the good material things in a degree greater than ever before. ### Hundreds Die As Terrific Storms Sweep Continent

### PASSING OF FRED HUME

Death Removes One of Province's Best Known Pioneers at Nelson

NELSON, Feb. 7: (CP)—J. Fred Hume, aged 75, former Provincial Secretary and Minister of Mines, member of the legislature from 1897 to 1900 and pioneer merchant and hotel man of this district, died last night following a lengthy illness. He was born in Jackstown, N.B. Many years ago he established the Hume Hotel, this city's leading hostelry.

### CONSERVATIVE SPLIT, LABORITE WINS SEAT IN BRITISH ELECTION

LIVERPOOL, Feb. 7: (CP)—James Clery, Labor, with 15,611 votes, gained Wavertree from the Conservatives in yesterday's by-election, defeating James Platt, Conservative, who polled 13,711 votes. Randolph Churchill, son of Rt. Hon. Winston Churchill, ran as an Independent Conservative, splitting the votes and getting 10,575. Arthur Morris, Liberal, received only 4,208 votes.

### ILLNESS ON NAAS RIVER

Epidemic Sweeps Through Ranks of Children and Two Are Already Dead

AIYANSH, Feb. 7:—Colds attended by high temperatures have been prevalent among the children here of late, two having died. There being no doctor available locally, the doctor, Rev. Samuel Kinley, has done his best to minister to the sick, calling from house to house in the village, being up both night and day during the past two weeks. The epidemic seems to have passed the peak although many children are still ill.

### Bad Weather Causes Drop In Production

VANCOUVER, Feb. 7: (CP)—Storms and cold weather cut down the Pioneer Mine's production in January to \$230,000 gross with net profit of \$165,000. The mill had been closed down for six days.

All fishing on Bristol Bay will be closed from June 25 to August 3. Complete regulations governing the halibut fishing for the 1935 season are going forward. ### Annual Meeting of Organization At Massett Held Recently

MASSETT, Feb. 7:—The twenty-third annual meeting of the Graham Island Farmers' Institute was held recently in the Massett schoolhouse with President Charles A. Smith in the chair over a good attendance of members.

The directors submitted to the members a report of the affairs and condition of the institute, duly outlining the work and policy for the coming year, drawing the attention of the members to the fact that the institute has in the past rendered invaluable service to the community and pointing out that it can only continue to do so if given the whole-hearted support of all the members. The directors expressed appreciation to the members for their past support.

Receipts of the institute for the year totalled \$8256.62 and expenditures, \$7562.11. During the year the institute handled feed and supplies to the value of \$7,216.30.

### PIONEER OF NAAS

William Stewart, Who Settled in Valley 23 Years Ago, Dies at Age of Eighty-Three

AIYANSH, Feb. 7:—One of the veteran settlers of the Naas Valley, William Stewart, succumbed to a heart attack recently, dropping off his bed and expiring. On January 12, Mr. Stewart's cabin on his ranch had burned. All alone, and having lost all his effects, the eighty-three year old man had to turn out in the intense cold and trudge a distance of five miles to the Indian village where he was taken care of by the doctor, Rev. Samuel Kinley. The shock of the fire is believed, however, to have hastened death.

The funeral was held here with Rev. Mr. Kinley officiating. The procession was headed by the Aiyansh Silver Band and interment was made in the village cemetery. Mr. Stewart had resided in the valley for twenty-three years.

Miss Jabour cited as advantages of the larger high schools the wider scope of courses and curricula and the greater facilities, the varied environment, the more able teaching and the extra activities apart from straight learning.

Miss Wood argued that closer contact of teachers and pupils made for better understanding and teaching. The need of personal initiative and perseverance was, if anything, an advantage for the smaller school.

Joe Landry stressed the better equipment and superior conditions for learning in the larger school.

Bob Elkins interjected considerable humor into his arguments and quoted the Welk-Patnam report that results in rural schools were better than those of the urban.

A vote of thanks was tendered the debaters on motion of Dr. R. G. Large, seconded by C. W. Dawson.

The debate was staged in connection with the observance of National Education Week. President S. J. Jabour was in the chair and there was an almost perfect attendance of members with A. B. Cumming and Harold Brown, of Vancouver and G. A. Woodland of Prince Rupert present as guests.

#### Objects of Education

Mr. Wilson discussed some of the objects of modern education. It was necessary to keep up to date with education progress. The standards and methods employed in education a few decades ago were not suitable to the requirements of today. He differentiated between education, which went on from cradle to the grave, and straight schooling. Essential factors which education must provide for included good health, worthy home membership, mastery of the tools of education, vocational and economic effectiveness, faithful citizenship, the wise use of leisure and ethical values.

Mr. Hall, eloquent as usual, referred to the value of the practical aspects in educational administration. He alluded to heredity and environment. Little could be done in regard to the former but much in respect to the latter. He crystallized as the object of education "to try and uphold the honorable traditions of those people who had made this great country it is." There was more than an economic aspect to the problems of today, he felt. Of great importance, he thought, was the religious side. Fortunately, there appeared today to be a greater disposition for return of the public conscience and the realization by man that he was his brother's keeper.

The proceedings opened with the singing of "O Canada" and closed with the National Anthem. Miss E. A. Mercer, principal of Booth Memorial School, presided at the piano. In addition to the chairman

and the speakers, those on the platform were Arthur Sutton, Mrs. Neal Carter and Mrs. H. B. Rochester.

#### Schools Visited

As a part of the observance of Education Week, the schools were open to public inspection yesterday and there were numerous visitors during the afternoon to the various classrooms in King Edward High, Booth Memorial and Borden Street Schools, parents displaying a keen interest in the carrying on of the educational work.
