BRITISH PROTEST

London Incensed at Constant Attacks in Italian Press And Friendly Tone Demanded

LONDON, Aug. 9.—It is revealed that Great Britain has dispatched a strongly-worded protest to Italy in recent constant attacks in the Italian press on British policy with respect to Ethiopia. A more friendly attitude on the part of Italian newspapers is demanded.

BUILDING WARSHIPS

United States About to Start Program of New Naval Construction

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 9.—The Navy Department is about to call for bids, it is revealed, for the construction of a gigantic new aircraft carrier, three battle cruisers, eight destroyers and a number of submarines. Construction of the ships is to start within a year with the launching in from two to three years.

MIGHT OF GERMANY

Belgian Statesman Says His Army Superior to France and Belgium Combined

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Aug. 9.—Baron Rene Dedecker told the foreign affairs commission of the Belgian Senate that the German army is from twenty-five to thirty percent superior to the combined armies of France and Belgium and urged that Belgium strengthen her bonds with France.

Baron Dedecker also stressed the danger of another European conflict and declared that Germany is relying on the election of another Labor government in England to further retard British armaments.

Southeast Ohio Has Real Storm

One Life Lost, Many Injured, Rail And Auto Traffic Halted And Land Inundated

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 9.—All rail and auto traffic was halted in southeastern Ohio as a result of torrential rains which followed a vicious electrical storm. At least one life was taken and several were injured. Towns and farm lands were inundated.

Boost in Wages Ends Revolt On Island of Crete

ATHENS, Aug. 9.—A fifteen percent boost in wages has restored at least outward harmony on the island of Crete and four thousand strikers are reported to have returned to their jobs after a brief but fierce revolt.

Lard Exports Of Canada Increase By Huge Margin

OTTAWA, August 9.—Representing a gain of roughly 8,387 percent, lard exports from Canada to British markets in the first six months of 1935 reached a total of \$236,700 pounds as compared with only 74,000 pounds during the corresponding period last year.

SITUATION IN FRANCE IS SERIOUS

Special Session of Cabinet To Consider Widespread Disorders

Several Killed

City of Toulon is Among Many Points Which Had Bloody Demonstrations

PARIS, Aug. 9.—A special session of the cabinet was called to consider a serious situation arising from widespread disorders and demonstrations in various parts of the country in protest at the government's latest economy decrees. From many points come reports of bloody clashes with revolutionary demonstrators. Further trouble is anticipated by the newspapers.

With troops ready, the government today ordered police forces to clean up all agitation centres where strikes and demonstrations have occurred over the government's ten percent pay cut decree.

At Toulon three people were killed yesterday in disorders. Sixty other persons were also seriously injured by revolver shots and sent to hospitals, an undetermined number being slightly injured. The rioting, the gravest since the latest outbreak of violence throughout France, developed suddenly as naval shipyard and arsenal workers ran wild through the town, a mob of three thousand surging through the streets, smashing windows and firing revolvers at police and mobile guards who were continually forced to charge and fire into the demonstrators. Today it was reported that men were returning to work at the government arsenals both at Toulon and Brest.

The city of Paris is under virtual military control after a couple of hectic days in which one man was killed and numerous injured in rioting. Troops assisted the police in putting down disturbances and machine guns were used. At LeHavre the liners Normandie, Champlain and Lafayette are tied up with their crews refusing to work. At Cherbourg as well as LeHavre there was reported to be considerable improvement in the situation today as a result of the French Line agreeing to absorb wage cuts and thus permit the vessels to sail.

BOGOTA, Colombia, Aug. 9.—The severe earthquake this week in Narior Province in Western Columbia has resulted in renewed activity of Galeras volcano in the vicinity of Pasto, the village which is famous throughout the world for its manufacture of Panama hats.

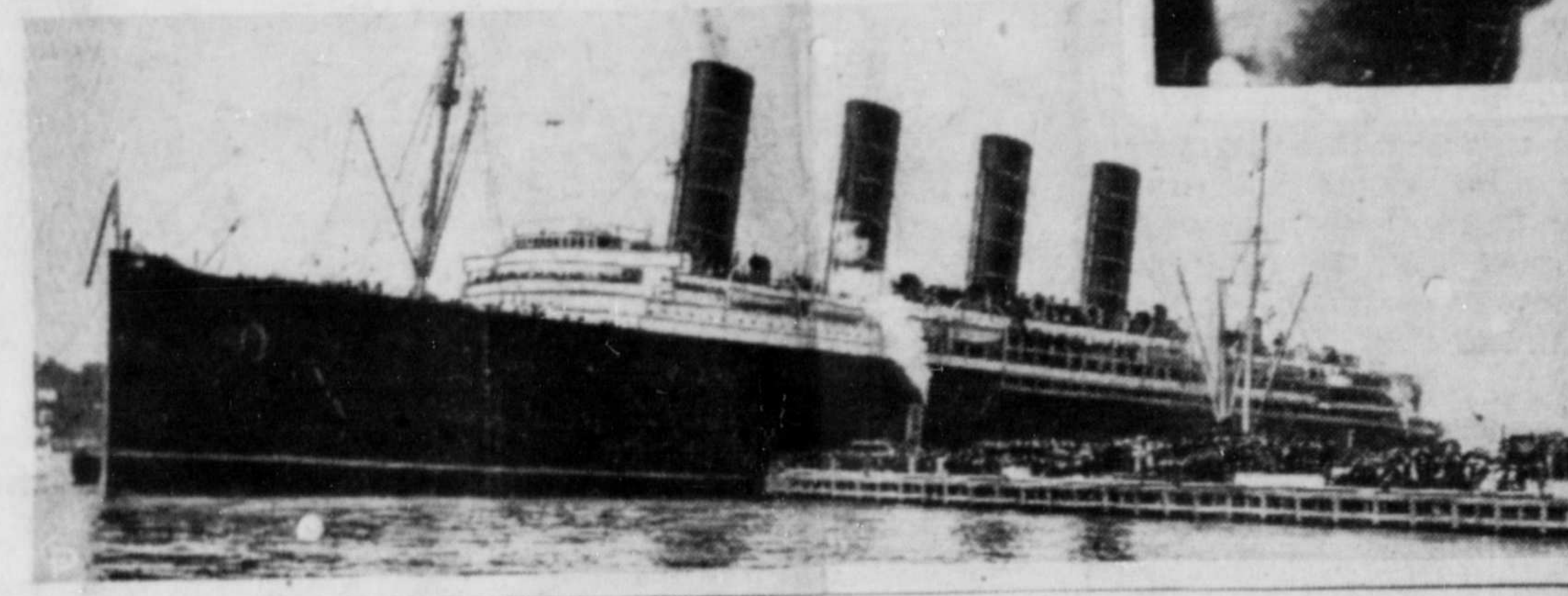
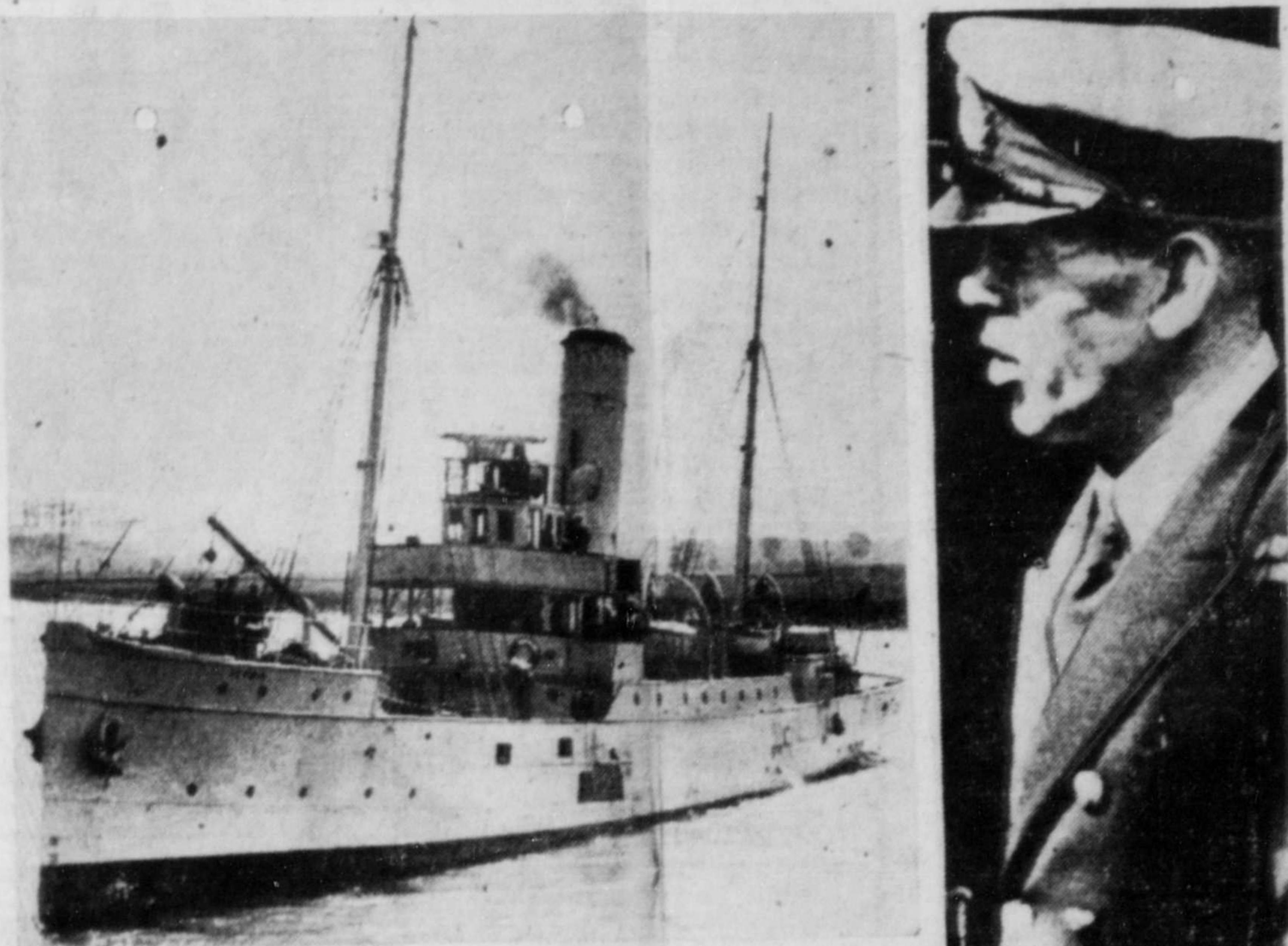
Ban Decreed by Nazi Government Of Germany—To be Effective As From Tomorrow

Alaska Skipper Dies on Vessel

Capt. Jeremiah Flynn of Redondo Passes Away Suddenly On Ship Near Ketchikan

SEATTLE, Aug. 9. (CP)—Capt. Jeremiah Flynn, aged 65, master of the Alaska Steamship Co.'s freighter Redondo, died suddenly yesterday aboard the ship as it was nearing Ketchikan. The chief officer assumed command.

SETTLING OF STRIKE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—Demands for immediate action by the government to end the Pacific Coast shipping troubles was made today to Assistant Secretary of Labor Edward J. MacGrady by B. Reed Funston, president of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce. A telegram was sent to Washington as three additional ships were blockaded by the strike and new obstacles to settlement of the dispute were erected by delays in referendum votes to release strike bound ships.

'Frisco Stevedores Will Vote on Plan To Release Ships

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 9.—Members of the International Longshoremen's Association and the Maritime Workers' Union will vote at once on a request of the Department of Labor at Washington that ships which have been tied up here as being "unfair" be released. The proposal is that privileges between the striking longshoremen and the employers be then taken up again through the Department of Labor.

TOLL WAS ENORMOUS

Death List in Chinese Floods Is Officially Placed at 100,000—Millions Homeless

NANKING, Aug. 9. (CP)—The Chinese government announced today that more than 100,000 persons lost their lives in the disastrous floods in Central China recently.

Fourteen million persons are homeless and property damage of more than \$150,000,000 was done.

Honan, Hupei and Hunan provinces suffered the most.

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Blanche Dunkel and Evelyn Smith Jung, torso slayers of Ervin Lang, were given life sentences here yesterday in the penitentiary for the crime. Judge Harrington, who found the women guilty after a juryless trial, passed sentence. The judge's technical sentence ordered the women imprisoned for one hundred and eighty years.

EXTORTION IS ALLEGED

Norman Abbott Charged With Attempting to Extract \$10,000 From Westminster Man

NEW WESTMINSTER, Aug. 9. (CP)—Charged with demanding \$10,000 from James G. Robson, president of the Timberland Lumber Co., in an alleged extortion plot, Norman Abbott, aged 28, of New Westminster, was remanded until August 12 in police court this morning in order to permit Abbott to serve out a month's sentence for driving an automobile while intoxicated.

Robson received two letters demanding that the money be placed beneath the sidewalk at Royal Avenue and Tenth Street on July 16.

"If we lose out, we are going to make you pay through the nose as well as your family," the alleged note read.

MINISTER IS KILLED

Member of Italian Cabinet And Famous Explorer Dies in Airplane Crash

ROME, Aug. 9.—Luigi Razza, Italy's minister of public works, and Baron Franchetti, noted explorer, were among others who were killed yesterday in the crash of an Italian government airplane in Egypt. The plane was bound for Italian Somaliland and the crash occurred near Cairo, seven in all being killed.

SPAIN HAS BIG STORM

Two Million Dollars Damage Done As Rain and Hail Follow Intense Heat

MADRID, Spain, Aug. 9.—Two million dollars damage is estimated as the toll of torrential rain and hail storms which ended one of the warmest weather spells in recent years in Spain. Homes were blown down, bridges washed out, roads inundated, farms flooded and traffic and communications disrupted.

FIRE IS MYSTERY

Sabotage Suspected in Blaze On Board U. S. S. Quincy Off Atlantic Coast

QUINCY, Mass., Aug. 9.—Fire of mysterious origin, which it is rumored might have been due to sabotage, broke out on the new \$10,000,000 battle cruiser Quincy off Quincy, Mass., Wednesday. The vessel was being outfitted with a view to soon being placed in commission. The circumstances of the fire are being thoroughly investigated by the Department of the Navy.

Samuel Insull Gets Pension

Twenty-One Thousand Per Year All He Has Been Able to Save Out of Utilities Empire

CHICAGO, Aug. 9.—Pension of \$21,000 per year, the last of the wreckage of his once great utilities empire, is to be restored to Samuel Insull sr. In addition he will receive \$33,000 in back payments covering the time he spent in Greece and elsewhere in Europe while a fugitive from justice.

New Wheat Board For Canada Will Be Named Shortly

OTTAWA, August 9.—Appointment of a Canadian wheat board to handle the new crop and the carry-over is receiving the personal attention of Premier R. B. Bennett and its personnel, it is expected, will be announced shortly.

Great Flying Boat Leaving For Wake Id.

ALAMEDA, Cal., Aug. 9.—The great flying boat Pan American Clipper is expected to hop off today on another flight across the Pacific Ocean. This time the ship is to go as far as Wake Island, a distance of approximately 5500 miles, with stops enroute at Honolulu and Midway Island.

Louis' share in the bout on Wednesday night here in which he knocked out King Levinsky in the first round was \$27,000. Mike Jacobs is promoting the Louis-Baer fight.

CHICAGO, Aug. 9: (CP)—Chicago Cubs, by defeating Pittsburgh Pirates here yesterday, crept up to within two games of the National League leading New York Giants who were losing two games to the Phillies at Philadelphia. As a result of the double victory, the Phillies advanced from seventh place to the leadership of the second division ahead of Brooklyn Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds.

WHIFFLETS

From the Waterfront

Loading aboard a scow of goods salvaged from the Alaska Steamship Co.'s freighter Denali, wrecked a couple of months ago on Zayas Island, is being completed from the ocean dock and Armour Salvage Co.'s dock today. It will be taken to Vancouver for disposal. About seventy-five tons of goods is to be sent south and it is expected it will start out under tow tomorrow.

Delayed by having had heavy freights to discharge at Powell River and Ocean Falls, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 11:30 this morning from Vancouver and sails at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart where she will return here tomorrow evening on her way south. The vessel will again be taking out quite a large group of people from Anyox where the Granby Co. is closing down.

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Boeing and son of Seattle arrived at Ketchikan from Prince Rupert this Wednesday with their yacht Taconite in the course of an Alaskan cruise. They will be joined in a day or so at Ketchikan by their big flying boat, piloted by Clayton L. Scott, which is at present at Prince Rupert.

One trip of salmon sold on the Ketchikan board Wednesday, 3,000 pounds being coho and 200 pounds miscellaneous, 19c, 84c and 4.5c being paid by New England. The co-operative received 2,700 pounds during the same day at Ketchikan.

So much salmon was in Ketchikan Wednesday that canneries there were having a hard time handling the supply. With bins chuck full, some of the boats had to wait for several hours to be emptied.

C. P. R. steamer Princess Adelaide, Capt. Anderson, is due in port at 4:45 this afternoon from the south and will sail at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Harla and last evening the district governor had a dinner business session with the executive and committee chairman of the local club. A visit to the plant of the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. and drive out the Skeena River Highway is planned today and Mr. Long will sail by the Princess Alice tomorrow afternoon on his return south.

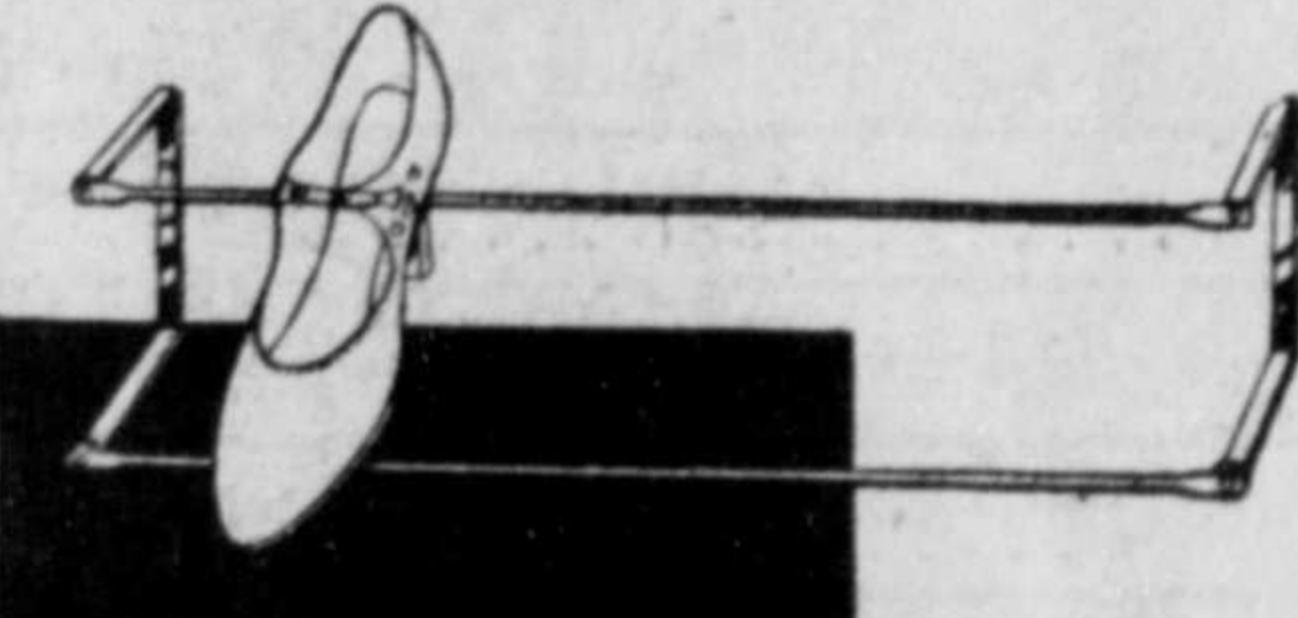
