TELLS ABOUT ATLIN VISIT

A. E. Parlow Describes Conditions As He Found Them at Atlin and Other Points North

A very interesting description of a recent visit to Atlin was given at the regular weekly luncheon of the Prince Rupert Rotary Club yesterday by A. E. Parlow, district forester.

Telling of various calls he made on the way north, the speaker said that what struck the casual visitor most in Ketchikan, Juneau and the other Alaskan towns was the large number of liquor stores and the small amount of drunkenness.

Atlin is reached by rail from Skagway across lake to Carcross, across Tagish Lake to Taku, by brief rail run to Atlin Lake and across the lake to the town of Atlin.

At Atlin Mr. Parlow met Bert Mackay, formerly of Prince Rupert. Bert holds all the British Columbia positions available such as government agent, mining recorder and a dozen or two more and, on occasion, he marries or buries people.

While the timber is small in that part of the country, there are several mills operated, cutting lumber and firewood. The camp is active as a result of the high price of gold. It seems that in the early days many millions of dollars was taken from the creek beds but of late they have found that older creek beds contain much gold and the miners sink shafts and drive tunnels on the old beds of the creeks and take out quantities of gold.

Miners in Atlin were paid seven to seven and a half dollars a day and were charged a dollar and a half to two dollars a day for their board.

Gold was left lying around in old pickle bottles and other receptacles and theft was quite unknown until the recent sluice box robbery which had made people there rather uneasy.

Everywhere in the north was found the old time hospitality, every person being accepted at his face value.

Among the visitors at the luncheon were A. R. Mosher, president of the All Canadian Congress of Labor and president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, and T. McGregor of Winnipeg, chairman of the Canadian Brotherhood western region.

Strange Prank of Fate Interrupts Process Of Court in Killing Case

VANCOUVER, Oct. 18.—As a result of a queer prank of fate, the four Indians, Eneas, Joseph, Richardson and Alex George, on trial for their lives for the second time at the Supreme Court Assizes here on the charge of having murdered Dominion Constable F. H. Gisborne and Provincial Constable Percy Carr on the Canford Indian Reservation on May 23, 1934, are all in Vancouver General Hospital suffering from fractures, bruises and more or less serious injuries and the trial is indefinitely adjourned.

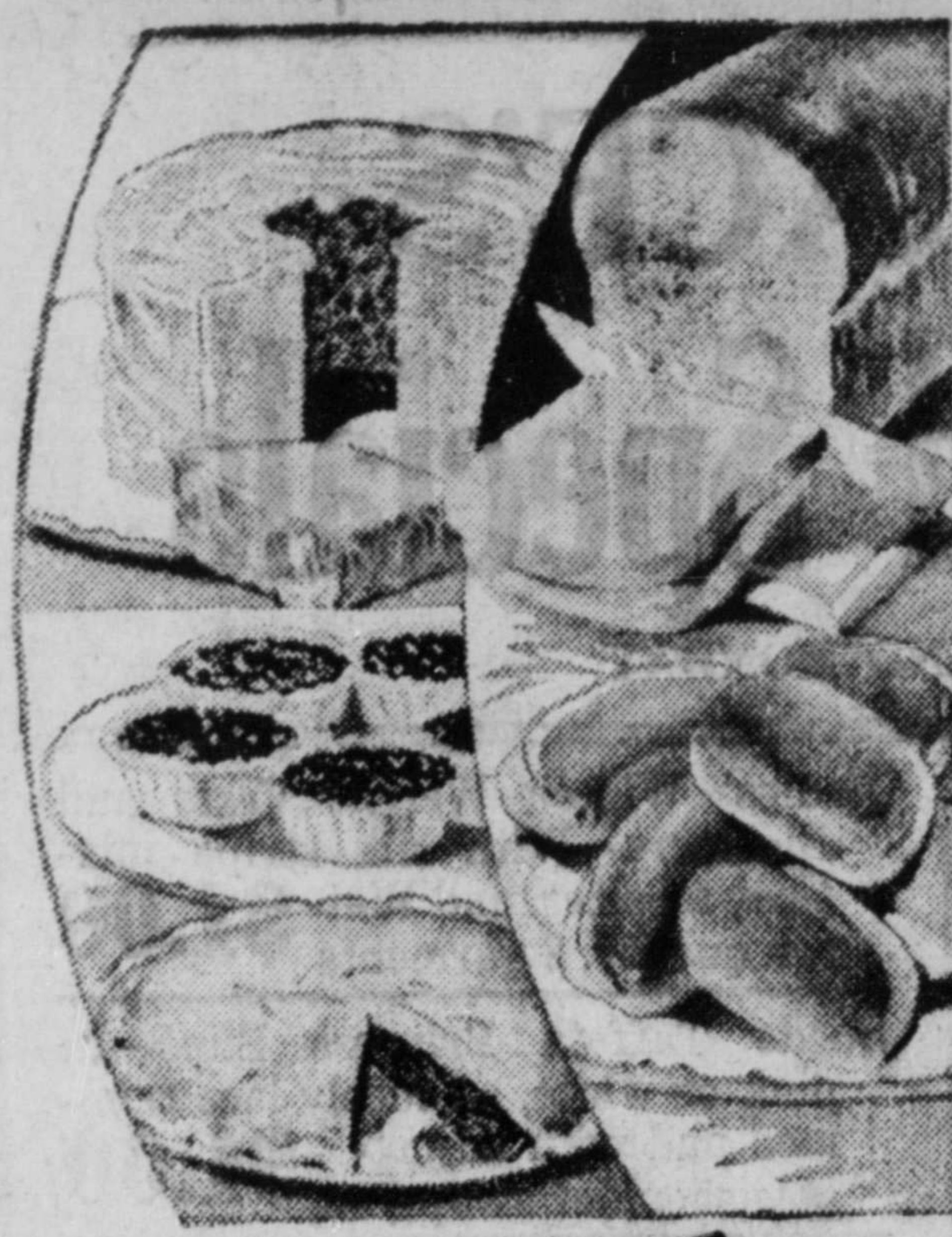

## EARLY DAY TALE HERE

Story of the '50's Comes to Screen  
In "Farmer Takes a Wife"  
With Janet Gaynor

Janet Gaynor, always a favorite with Prince Rupert movie fans, comes to the screen of the Capitol Theatre here this week-end in a story of another time and another era in "The Farmer Takes a Wife." She has as her leading man a newcomer to the screen in the person of Henry Fonda.
