

LONDON, Dec. 24: (CP)-Final detailed Canadian Press standing House of Commons shows the Government has a majority of 250, excluding the vacancy caused by the death of A. Noel Skelton since his election as a Conservative in Scottish Combined Universities.

The Government total is 432

and that of the Opposition 182. In the Government ranks are 386 Conservatives, 34 Liberal-Nationals and eight National-Labor members. In addition, there are three elected as Nationalists and one Independent. The Nationalists are Arthur Hopkinson, in Lancashire Mossley; Hon. Ivor Guest, in Brecon and Radnor and Sir E. Granam-Little in London University. he Independent is A. P. Herbert, n Oxford University.

Labor led the Opposition with 153 members elected. There are 16 Liberals and four Independent (Lloyd George) Liberals. Four nembers of the Independent Labor Party were elected and one Communist, Two National Abstentionists elected in Northern Ireland will not take their seats. Two Independents in the Opposition classification are Rt. Hon. J. Wedgwood, who received an acclamain Newcastle-under-Lyme; and formerly ran as a Labor candidate for Labor, and Miss Eleanor Rathbone, in English Combined Universities. If Mr. Wedgwood were classed under his former party affiliation, the total "regular" Labor vote would be 154.

Mr. Herbert, who ran as an Inpependent, "took the government whip" along with R. H. Bernays. re-elected Liberal-Nationalist in Bristol North. By so doing they are placed on the whip's list for circulars or other information, indicating they will take voting and speaking orders from the government whip.






