PIONEER RAILWAYMAN PASSES AWAY GOVERNMENT-MUNICIPALITIES OF PROVINCE HAVE TALK

D'Arcy Tate, Head of Pacific Great Eastern In Construction, Dies

Was Sixty-Eight Years of Age—For Many Years Was Prominent in Development of West—Widely Known in Province

VICTORIA, Feb. 6: (CP)—D'Arcy Tate, aged sixty-eight, vice-president and general manager of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway during its construction, died here this morning. For many years Mr. Tate took a prominent part in the development of the province and the west. He was widely known throughout British Columbia.

MANITOWANING, Ont., Feb. 6: (CP)—Robert Sims, aged 106, veteran of the Crimean War and the British Navy's campaign against slavery in the West Indies, is dead here.

Widespread damage was done to store stock and household furnishings in the worst flood conditions experienced in the history of Victoria. From January 20 to 22 inclusive, six inches of rain fell, inundating many low-lying areas. Above is a picture of a district grocery store in Victoria, partially submerged. Row-boat ferries were established in seven or eight districts as Top photo shows. Railway lines, telephone companies, power plants and bus lines all suffered a heavy toll of damage. Landslides were reported at many points on Vancouver Island, disrupting traffic and endangering lives. Twenty-two people lost their lives throughout the province as result of storms.

KIDNAPPER CONVICTED

Gets 15 Years in Connection With Holding of John Labatt

LONDON, Ont., Feb. 6: (CP)—David Meisner was convicted and sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment this afternoon on three counts of kidnapping, extortion and armed robbery in connection with the abduction of John Labatt, London brewer, last summer.

The jury was out slightly more than an hour and a half. The sentences are to run concurrently.

General Hornby Meets Executive Of Labor Council

Brigadier General M. L. Hornby of Lethbridge met and addressed the executive of the Prince Rupert Trades and Labor Council last night in connection with his land settlement scheme. S. D. Macdonald, president of the council, was in the chair and, with others present, expressed favor for the scheme. It was intimated that a favorable report would be presented to the full council at its next meeting.

Importance of Road in Making Business For Prince Rupert Is Not Appreciated, Says Visitor

"I do not think the people of Prince Rupert are appreciative of the important part which a road from this city to the interior would be bound to play in the development of business of the community," declared Fred M. Wells, veteran mining man of the province, who sailed yesterday afternoon by the Catala for Vancouver after spending a couple of days here following a trip through the interior on mining business. "If they did, they would not rest content until the road had been provided and would continue an unremitting demand for it. Just now, when things are commencing to improve, particularly in the mining industry, would seem to me to be the ideal time to keep up your fight for a highway."

The highway to the interior would bring Prince Rupert into close touch with an important mining industry the trend of which Mr. Wells declared, was surely moving northward into the Omineca and other central interior areas. The road would unquestionably enable Prince Rupert to share in a trade with the mining and other industries which it is not now enjoying. Not only tourist automobiles but the hundreds would come here if there were a good road connection but trucks would come here to load supplies for

Legislation on Money Matters of Cities is Planned This Session

Whole Financial Structure to be Realigned But, Until This Can be Done, Relief and Social Service Burdens Cannot be Lifted, Says Premier

VICTORIA, Feb. 6: (CP)—Proposals to introduce legislation at the coming session of the Legislature which would enable consolidation of sinking funds of municipalities now under commissioners and possibly of other municipalities were explained to the executive of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities by government officials yesterday. Among other things proposed legislation would permit the readjustment of sinking funds on a higher or lower basis and the purchase of securities at a discount when market opportunities offered for retirement with profit at maturity. Provision would also be made whereby mill rates in commissioner areas might be raised for a time above the nominal maxima. Realignment of British Columbia government and municipal finance is in the making but, until it is effected, the province will be unable to relieve municipalities of relief and social service burdens, Premier T. D. Pattullo informed the executive.

HITLER IS TRACTABLE

Ready to Discuss Amendments To Locarno Treaties—British Delegation to Berlin

BERLIN, Feb. 6:—Reich President Adolph Hitler has issued a statement expressing his willingness to consider the amendments to the Locarno treaties as proposed by Great Britain and France and the question of Germany's return to the League of Nations.

It was intimated from the British embassy that a British delegation would visit Germany in the near future to open discussions on the proposed new agreements involving German re-arming and re-entry of this country to the League of Nations.

ROYALTY ATTACKED

James McGovern Ruled Out Of Order While Speaking in British House of Commons Yesterday

LONDON, Feb. 6: (CP)—James McGovern, fiery Glasgow Laborite, launched an attack in the House of Commons yesterday on the King and members of the Royal Family but was ruled out of order.

He wound up with the charge: "This government is a gang of national crooks."

During debate on the complex unemployment relief system, McGovern protested at the monies being paid to the King and members of the Royal Family.

PASSING OF STORE HEAD

Hugh Campbell, Manager of Mercantile Department at Ocean Falls, Dies of Pneumonia

Word was brought to the city by the steamer Prince George this morning of the death in the Ocean Falls Hospital yesterday morning, following an attack of pneumonia, of Hugh W. Campbell, for many years manager of the Pacific Mills general store at the paper town. He was quite well known in Prince Rupert and news of his demise will be received with regret by local friends.

Mr. Campbell was a native of Ontario and about fifty years of age. He is survived by a widow and son, Ronald, who is a student at the University of British Columbia.

**THE HORNBY SCHEME**

Brigadier General Hornby has worked out a scheme of land settlement which seems to be the best settlement plan yet produced for the placing of British families on the land in this country. It has a number of points in its favor. It plans to give the new settler that training on the ground that could be secured in no other way. It protects the country against having the settlers desert the land by providing that, if not satisfied, they shall be returned to their native land after giving the plan a trial. It does away with that isolation which is often so hard for the new settler to bear. It provides for adequate supervision during the early days of settlement and the proposed settlements are all in the neighborhood of markets at which the produce can be sold. No former plan has provided for these features. The plan provides for continuous operation, new settlers taking the place of the old on the training farms as often as they are vacated.

The success or failure of the plan will depend on the type of men appointed to have charge of it and the faithful carrying out of the duties without too much overhead cost for general supervision. It certainly seems worth a trial.

**BRAVERY OF LOCAL LADY**

The bravery of Mrs. W. E. Burrill, who went to her death two days ago when the West Vancouver ferry was run down by a passing steamship, is worthy of more than passing comment. The lady was well known to a great many Prince Rupert people to whom she was neighbor for many years. It was a tragic end but it was beatified by the unselfishness of the victim who urged the captain of the boat to save himself rather than continue his efforts to rescue her. The thought of her wonderful self-possession and composure under such trying circumstances will be an inspiration and a happy memory.

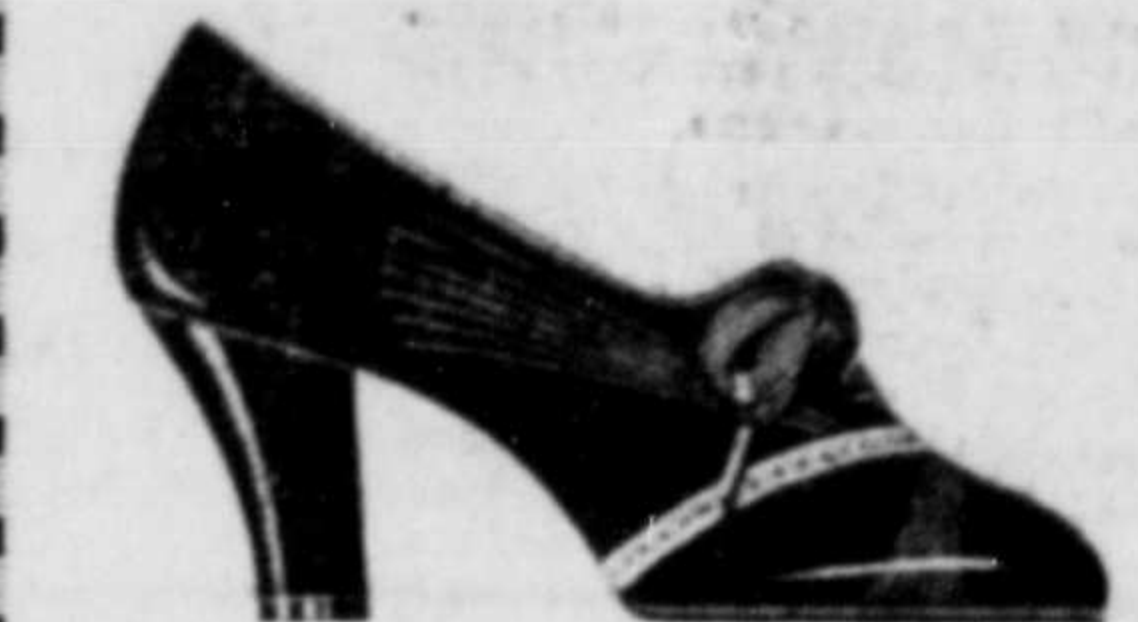
**Ladder Maker Was Left-Handed And Rough Carpenter**

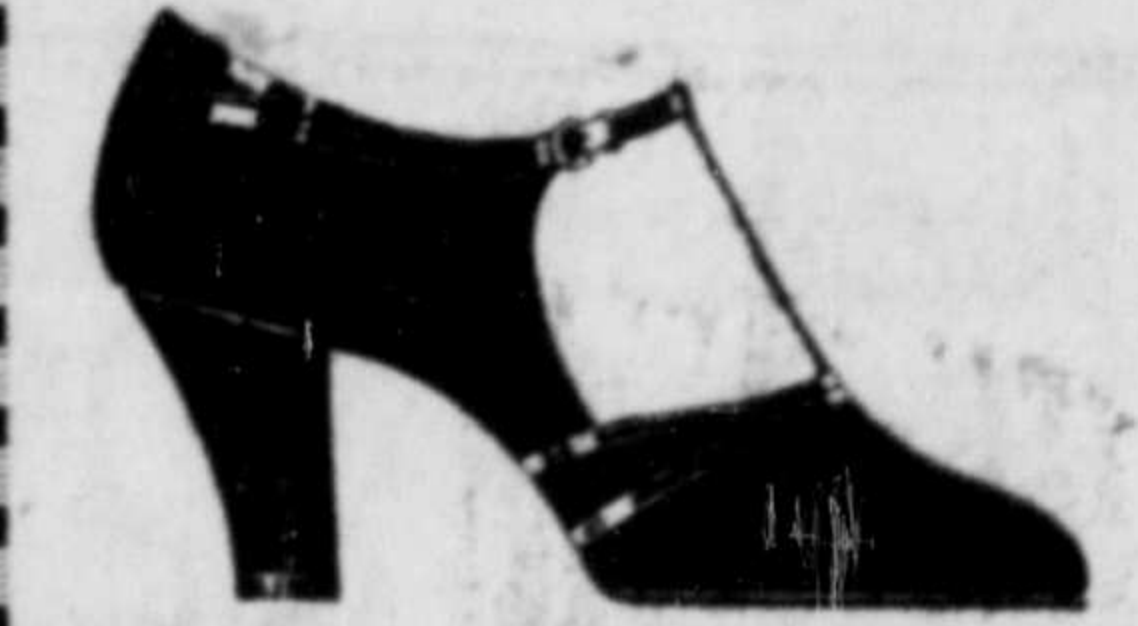

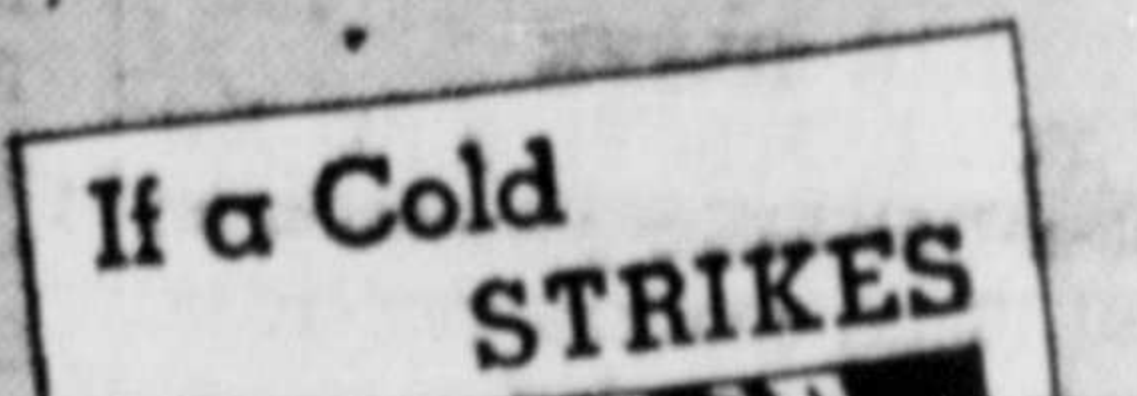

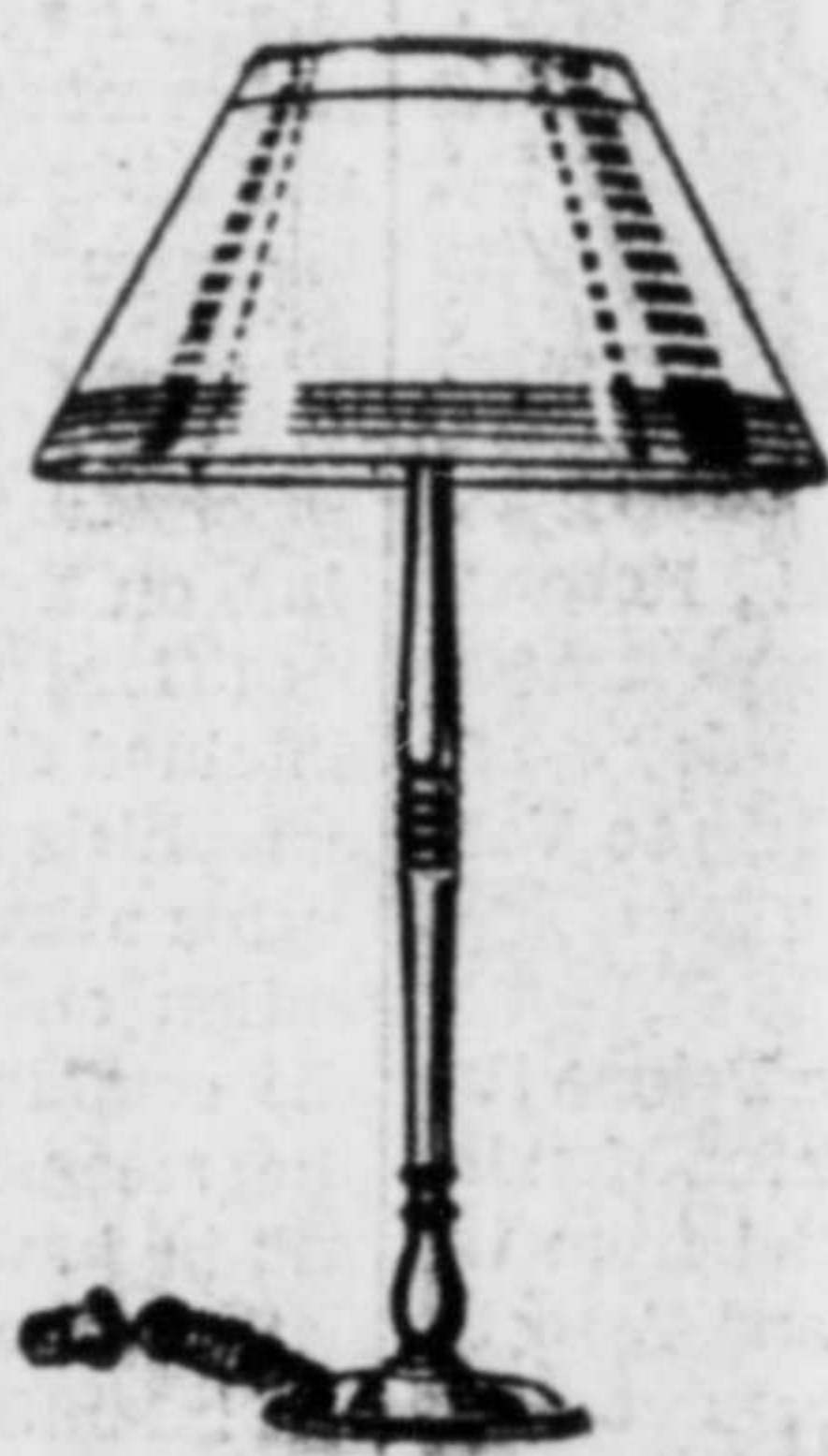
