Widespread damage was done to store stock and household furnishings in the worst flood conditions experienced in the history of Victoria. From January 20 to 22 inclusive, six inches of rain fell, inundating many low-lying areas. Above is a picture of a district grocery store in Victoria, partially submerged. Row-boat ferries were established in seven or eight districts as Top photo shows. Railway lines, telephone companies, power plants and bus lines all suffered a heavy toll of damage. Landslides were reported at many points on Vancouver Island, disrupting traffic and endangering lives. Twenty-two people lost their lives throughout the province as result of storms.

No former plan has provided for these features. Th plan provides for continuous operation, new settlers tal ing the place of the old on the training farms as often a they are vacated.






