





Most of what happens depends upon the individual states. On employers of eight or more persons, the government is imposing, first a one percent payroll tax, boosting lit to two percent in 1937 and to three percent in 1938. The states are supposed to set up unemployment reserve systems and if they do the scheme will figure out unemployment benefits of \$15 weekly for a maximum period of 16 weeks.

Other clauses of the bill provide grants to take care of crippled and dependent children and the needy blind.


