## INTERNATIONAL OUTLOOK IS MORE MENACING TODAY

### Official Announcement Made at Ottawa of Transfer of Property Here for Pulp Mill Undertaking

FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS IS PAID FOR FLOATING DRY DOCK, SHIPYARDS AND LANDS—ANNUAL SUBSIDY FORFEITED—CONTRACT CALLS FOR OPERATION OF YARD.

OTTAWA, Sept. 20: (Canadian Press)—Sale of the floating dry dock, shipyards and lands at Prince Rupert formerly owned by the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co. to the Mutual Pulp and Paper Mills of Prince Rupert Ltd. has been authorized by the Dominion government, it was announced today.

The pulp company pays \$500,000 for the property and forfeits the subsidy arrangement whereby the government had paid the Grand Trunk Pacific Development Co. \$76,970 annually for operating the dry dock and shipyard. The subsidy had seven years to run.

The pulp company undertakes to continue operation of the dry dock and shipyard and to build a pulp mill.

The sale is from the Canadian National Railways, present owners of the property.

### CANDIDATE IS HEARD

Joseph E. Panter, C. C. F. Aspirant To Ottawa Seat, Makes His First Public Appearance in Prince Rupert

### Criticizes Bennett

Doubts Efficacy of Social Legislation and Questions Liberal Sincerity—Winch Expounds Socialism

Joseph E. Panter of Smithers, candidate of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation for Skeena riding in the forthcoming federal election, made his initial appearance in public here at a well attended meeting last night in the Moose Hall, created a favorable impression with his earnest manner in a brief address and was given a cordial reception. E. E. Winch, M. L. A. for Burnaby, whose first appearance it also was in Prince Rupert, was the speaker of the evening, devoting himself to a lengthy discourse along somewhat academic lines of the capitalistic system, which he claimed must be eliminated for socialism if the common good was to be served. G. W. Rudderham was chairman for the evening.

Mr. Panter took up a minimum of time and confined himself largely to a criticism of the so-called social legislation of the Bennett government. The unemployment insurance measure, he asserted, was entirely inadequate, offering no benefit to those who needed it and being available only to a small minority. It was not open to those engaged in agricultural, railway and fisheries' work. He pointed out that the number on relief in Canada had increased from 300,000 in 1920 to 1,500,000. He also condemned the Franchise Act as disfranchising thousands of Canadians including those in the relief camps, miners in this district and many railwaymen who would not be able to vote as they were not now resident in the divisions where they had been registered. The move to disfranchise all those who had ever been on relief might be more than idle talk. Mr. Panter pointed out that the Central Bank was privately owned and operated and was serving only to further centralize finance under capitalism.

### DRAPER LABOR HEAD

HALIFAX, Sept. 20.—Patrick M. Draper, acting president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada since the retirement of Tom Moore, was elected to the presidency by a vote of 110 to 43 at the annual convention here yesterday.

### Mussolini To Protest To League of Nations At British Warships Massing in Mediterranean Waters

London insists it is merely precautionary measure—Fighting forces being massed at many points—Conservatives to demand further strengthening

ROME, Sept. 20: (CP)—A high authority said today that Premier Benito Mussolini had ordered that a protest be made to the council of the League of Nations against Great Britain's dispatch of warships to the Mediterranean. At London it was claimed that the movements of the fleet were merely precautionary in view of the international situation.

Italy seethed with activity last night as the zero hour neared for the war against Ethiopia or any other nation which may stand in Italy's way. The rejection of the five-power board's peace proposal is regarded as a foregone conclusion.

**Italy Massing in Libya**  
LONDON, Sept. 20: (CP)—Italy is reported to be massing a large number of troops and munitions in Libya, Italian colony on the Mediterranean adjoining Egypt, the movement creating a new focal point of concern for Great Britain. Informed sources say that another emergency session of the cabinet may be called shortly.

Immediate strengthening of the British army, navy and air force to safeguard British territory and trade and to carry out with effect British international obligations is to be demanded at the annual conference of the Conservative party at Bournemouth on October 3.

War fears hit British workers' dinner pails yesterday when bakers announced that the price of bread is to be increased several pence per loaf beginning Monday because of advancing prices of wheat and flour.

Wives now in Great Britain of army officers stationed in India have been advised by their husbands on government instructions to postpone any contemplated visits to India. It is assumed that the officer-husbands may be transferred elsewhere shortly.

The route of the Peninsular and Oriental Steamship Co.'s new liner Strathmore, on her maiden voyage, has been changed to eliminate stops at Italian ports on the Mediterranean.

### Refortifying Mauritius

PARIS, Sept. 20:—Disquieting reports continue to be received here of warlike preparations in the Mediterranean and Red Seas. Great Britain is definitely reported to be refortifying the Island of Mauritius in the Indian Ocean for use as a naval base in the Red Sea where a strong naval force could blockade Italy's East African forces in the event of an Anglo-Italian conflict.

### Preparing at Gibraltar

GIBRALTAR, Sept. 20:—An official gazette announces that in certain emergencies Gibraltar may be suddenly plunged into sudden darkness and citizens have been advised to lay in supplies of candles.

### Greek and Italian Warships

ATHENS, Sept. 20:—The Greek cabinet last night decided that henceforth Greek warships will accompany Italian warships while in Greek waters. The action is due to complaint of other powers of the tolerance by Greece of repeated

### DISASTER INDICATED

Four Empty Oil Drums But No Other Trace of Southseaman

The provincial police power cruiser P. M. L. 9 reported to divisional headquarters here last night the finding afloat not far from St. John Harbor, Bardwell Islands, Milbank Sound, of four oil drums which were aboard the Vancouver fish packer Southseaman which has not been reported since it left St. John Harbor a week ago today with a heavy load of salmon for Butedale Cannery. This tends to support the belief that the Southseaman may have come to grief soon after leaving St. John Harbor. No other trace has been found of the vessel which had Capt. Gerald B. Hamilton and crew of two on board. The search is continuing.

Constable Victor Bond on the P. M. L. 8 also reports finding a large patch of oil on the water at St. John Harbor.

### ASSAULTER FINED

Found guilty on a charge of common assault, Somato Suzuki, Japanese, who is alleged to have drawn a knife on Charlie Ki, Chinese, in an altercation on Third Avenue the night before last, was fined \$25, with option of fourteen days' imprisonment in city police court this morning.

### More Broken Pledges of the Great Promiser

**OLD AGE PENSIONS**  
Mr. Bennett at Chatham, New Brunswick, on July 11th, 1930: "I say to you if the Conservative party is returned to power we will provide for the payment of all old age pensions from the federal exchequer so that the provinces will not be called upon to contribute a cent and so that the provinces who now find the burden too great will be able to benefit equally with all the provinces of the Dominion." Of course he has not done so. The provinces of Quebec and New Brunswick still have no old age pensions at all, and the other provinces are still paying 25% of the cost, although they are financially little able to do so.

### PROTECTION FOR THE CONSUMER

Mr. Bennett at Moncton, New Brunswick, July 10th, 1930: "I promise the consumers that as they support our producers they will find us ever on the alert to forbid this exploitation, for no manufacturer must be permitted to take unfair advantage of the consumer." What about the price we pay for automobiles in Canada? If you buy a car in British Columbia you must pay at least \$250.00 more than if you bought the same car in Seattle. The manufacturer pockets this excess profit. It is so great that we could save a large sum of money by importing cars free of duty and at the same time pay the wages of the whole industry in Canada to remain idle. Is this the way to protect the consumer? If you want Bennett to continue then vote for Orme who is supporting him.

**TAKE NO CHANCES**

The electors at a time like this cannot afford to take chances. They have had an experience of the Bennett administration during the past few years and everyone knows how useless it has been toward aiding recovery in this part of the province. They have had no experience of the C. C. F. which only has a program, very similar to that of the Liberals up to a certain point, but beyond that point vague and unproven. This party does not expect to form a government but simply to try to harass whatever administration is in charge of affairs. Why then waste a vote on the C. C. F.? The party may mean well but that is as far as it goes.

It is probable that the Liberal party will be in charge of the affairs of the Dominion for the next four or five years. While we know many people have been dissatisfied with the party, thinking that it does not advance rapidly enough to keep pace with modern trends, there are among them today many men who are determined the party must make progress. These will be among the leaders. Our best bet is to trust to these leaders and show our trust by voting for the local representative, Olof Hanson.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. Ernest Georgeson, is due in port tomorrow morning from the south and will sail soon thereafter on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

Motorship Bellingham is due in port this afternoon from Ketchikan with four carloads of mild cured salmon for trans-shipment east over Canadian National Railways.

necessary, to invoke the Elections Act to force the discontinuance of publication of certain type of campaign propaganda and put those responsible for it in jail. Mr. Panter was referring to "The Political Corner" which both he and the chairman noted had made its initial appearance.

The issue of the election, as Mr. Panter saw it, was between capitalism, with starvation amid plenty, or socialism, with an abundance available for use not profit.

**Mr. Winch**

Mr. Winch has a lucid style and put the audience in good humor at the outset with a bright opening. His address was, however, considerably longer than Prince Rupert audiences are used to and would possibly have been more effective had it been more concise. However, except for one apparent inebriate who was assisted to make his exit, there was little disturbance.

Mr. Winch dealt briefly at the start with the provincial legislature and its work. He charged the legislature and its members with incapacity and waste of time. During the first four weeks of the session little legislation was dealt with, important business being deferred until near the close when it was rushed through without time for adequate discussion. He criticized the members of the old political parties for holding all their meetings before elections and failing to give an account of their stewardship to the electors during their term of office. C. C. F. members, he pointed out, devoted all their time to public affairs, considering it their duty to do so.

Referring briefly to "mud-slinging," Mr. Winch declared that such tactics were merely an attempt to divert the attention of the people from the real questions to side issues, misrepresenting principles which all knew to be impregnable. People who would be misled by such tactics were of no use to the C. C. F. anyway.

As Mr. Winch saw it all people desired real economic security, to be assured of an opportunity to

earn a livelihood. This was something that capitalism could not and would not give. Under capitalism people would continue to live in degradation with no chance of getting out of it. Under socialism there would be co-operation for the common good. The fruits of the age of plenty would be available to all. One would not profit at the expense of the other. However, the task would not be complete until capitalism was wiped out not only in British Columbia and in Canada but from the entire face of the earth.

Mr. Winch traced the development of capitalism up to the present time. Machinery had made it possible for a maximum of goods to be produced with a minimum of effort. Today people lived amid plenty but were starving to death due to private ownership of industry erecting artificial barriers to keep apart the unemployed and the mass of goods for which there was no market either at home or abroad. Under socialism this would all be changed. Here Mr. Winch entered upon a somewhat lengthy discussion along technocratic lines of the displacement of man power by machinery and the result of unemployment on the one hand and the production of a mass of indispensible goods on the other. The only opening that capitalism offered was "the relief camps for the boys and the street for the girls." Penal and mental institutions were becoming overcrowded with youths and the health of children and young people was being undermined. There were no jobs, no openings and a situation had arisen which demanded the serious consideration of all people, if not for themselves for their children.

A pulp mill at Prince Rupert might mean more jobs in this locality but it would most certainly be at the expense of jobs of people elsewhere.

The cheapest thing on earth today was an unemployed member of the working class.

**Preparing For War**

The major industry in the world today, due to the predatory capitalist system, Mr. Winch declared, was preparation for war. Own-

ers of factories saw in war an opportunity for the disposal of goods which could not be sold in any other way. "Out of the last war came the Russian revolution," declared the speaker. "Out of the next war may come a worldwide social revolution and the end of capitalism." However, the working classes were becoming educated and, armed with weapons, they might not, at the order of the ruling class, again consent to blindly slaughter their fellowmen without apparent reason.

The C. C. F., the speaker pointed out, had no antagonism against the capitalistically-minded individuals. Their fight was entirely against the system. Socialism offered economic security to all who had the intelligence to grasp it.

If a government could obtain \$5,000,000 to build a bridge, surely it could obtain money to provide better conditions for the people, work and wages, proper facilities for insurance of health and physical well being.

Mr. Winch urged his listeners to investigate and analyze the principles of the C. C. F. If they found them practical, sound and logical, he asked the support of the voters at the polls. As for himself he considered the C. C. F. the finest crusade in history on behalf of humanity, one the ideal of which was to enable all people not only to
