The mass of the people, however, will see nothing but good in the unrest that surrounds us and by which we are bound to be affected. Troublous times they are, we grant but, withal, joyful times. We are in the throes of a new birth from which will spring a new world, a better world, a more joyous world, a world in which there will be less poverty, less drudgery, less suffering, less degradation. Everything points to it. While the change is going on there will be a certain amount of suffering as in the birth of a new child. In order that life may not seem to be a failure, let us adjust ourselves to the changing conditions, not weep over the changes. It is for the leaders of our day to make the adjustments in such a manner as to bring about the desired results with as little inconvenience and suffering as possible. But above all, we must move forward. Sadness there may be, but only among those who try to stem the tide of progress.


