



#### MAY WELL BE SUSPICIOUS

Hon. H. H. Stevens says he is suspicious of a move for national government and he may well be. People of this province will remember the strenuous efforts made by the Tolmie Government at the time when it felt itself doomed. It was bound to form a union government with Dr. Tolmie at the head and a majority of Tolmie supporters in it. So today Premier Bennett knows his days are numbered and he would like what he would call a "national government."

If Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King is chosen by a majority of the electors, his will be a national government for it will represent the national sentiment. It will be as much national as any government could be. Only the election returns will let us know to what extent it is national.

Undoubtedly people in Northern and Central British Columbia are strongly for a national railway and will look with grave suspicion on any group or party or person who suggests selling out this national asset to any group of financial magnates.

#### THE PEOPLE MUST PAY

It must be remembered that in any plan for the reorganization or the revival of our railways the people have to pay the cost, either in higher fares or freight or else in lessened service or in more unemployment. There is no magic about saving money on a huge railway system. If money is saved, the money comes from the pockets of the employees or the rest of the people. If expenditures are reduced, it means many people are out of employment. If income is increased, it comes from the people who travel or who ship goods. In any case the people pay.

## WHIFFLETS From the Waterfront

Bird Hunting Season Announced—  
Prince Robert Makes Final Cruise  
—Steamship Movements.

The hunting season for geese, ducks and coots in the western district, which includes Prince Rupert, will open this year on October 19 and continue until January 31, it is officially announced. The possession of migratory game birds killed during the open season is allowed in British Columbia for 14 days after the close of the open season. The bag limit for ducks will be twenty during the period between October 19 to November 30 and during the remainder of the open season not more than 15, the season's aggregate limit being 150. The limit for geese is 10 in one day and fifty for the season.

Making the last of four Alaska summer cruises, C. N. R. steamer Prince Robert, Capt. H. E. Neden, was in port from 9 o'clock yesterday morning to 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The vessel had on board 303 passengers of whom three disembarked here while one went south aboard her from this port. The Prince Robert will be leaving Vancouver this Friday on a special four-day cruise as far as the coast as Douglas Channel and Gardner Canal in the course of which it is reported, although not officially confirmed, that she may call here. According to local tales, the Prince Robert is to run a series of special cruises to San Diego this fall but nothing in the way of an official announcement of such a plan has yet been made.

Coming in earlier than she has done for months, Union steamer

Catala, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived in port at 6:30 last evening from the south and sailed at 8:30 p.m. for Anyox. Stewart and other northern points whence she is scheduled to return here tomorrow morning and sail at 1:30 p.m. for Vancouver and waypoints. The Catala, this trip south, will be taking a party of some forty Anyox people to Vancouver. She will also call at Claxton and Inverness cannery in the Skeena tomorrow to load canned salmon for Vancouver.

Armen Salvage Co.'s general service boat Daly, Capt. John Desmilles, which is on a packing charter to the B. C. Packers out of Namu cannery, was in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver with a large list of passengers, consisting mostly of round trip tourists, and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here on Saturday afternoon southbound.

There was a capacity list of 226 passengers aboard the steamer Princess Louise which was in port Saturday afternoon southbound from Skagway to Vancouver. Six persons disembarked from the vessel here, two going south from this port with only limited accommodation available.

All available accommodation was filled aboard the steamer Prince George, Capt. Edward Mabbott, when she sailed from here at 7 o'clock Saturday evening for Vancouver, having arrived at 4:45 from Anyox and Stewart. Among the passengers were forty people from Anyox, where the Granby Co. is closing down, and a number of tourists from the afternoon train as well as local travellers.

Considerable interest of passers-by along the waterfront was attracted to the snagboat Essington, which was in port at the weekend, on account of the vessel having on board a six-month old black bear cub which Capt. J. D. Watson recently obtained from an Indian at

Making her final voyage of the season on the Alaska tourist service, C. P. R. steamer Princess Alice, Capt. Clifford Fenton, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver with a large list of passengers, consisting mostly of round trip tourists, and sailed a couple of hours later for Skagway and other northern points whence she will return here on Saturday afternoon southbound.

There were in all 172 passengers aboard. Four disembarked here while one went north from this port.

With a good sized list of passengers, including numerous tourists returning south after making the round trip to Alaska, C. N. R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. Neil McLean, arrived in port at 10 o'clock this morning from Skagway and other northern points and sailed at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Vancouver via Ocean Falls and Powell River. The vessel brought 152 passengers from the north, seven disembarking here.

The American halibut schooner Foremost arrived in port Saturday afternoon from the banks with a catch of 40,000 pounds. She was too late for the day's session on the Fish Exchange and continued to Seattle.

Local halibut boats leaving for the banks today will include the Edward Lipsett, Gony, Viking, Al-

ken, Gulvik, Tramp and Morris H. Tomorrow the Toodie, Borgund, Good Hope, Cape Spencer, Johanna, Mother II and Southend will be leaving and on Wednesday the Kalen, Capella, Margalice, Atli, Margaret I and Gem

Pilot Jack MacConnachie arrived at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon from Anyox with his Eastman flying boat, bringing the ship in for annual inspection by R. Carter Guest, inspector of civil aviation for British Columbia and the Yukon, who was aboard the steamer Princess Louise Saturday afternoon on his way back to Vancouver after a trip to the Yukon on official duties. Pilot MacConnachie, who brought his wife and daughter with him, hopped off yesterday afternoon on his return to Anyox.

The Massett fish packer Chief Weah, Capt. Matthew Yeomans, arrived in port this morning from North Island trolling grounds with a load of 9,000 pounds of spring salmon and 9,000 pounds of cohoes for the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Co. The fish is being discharged this afternoon and the Chief Weah will leave tomorrow on her return to the Islands.

## Timely Recipes

### STRING BEANS

String beans are now plentiful and come on the market fresh and crisp. They should, however, be properly cooked to retain full flavor and color and thus appeal to the appetite and give complete food value.

String beans of either green or wax varieties are a delight to the palate when well cooked. The method recommended by the fruit branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture is as follows:

Wash, remove strings and ends, and either leave whole or cut in one inch lengths. Allow a very small amount of salted water and cook beans in a closely covered saucepan for thirty minutes. Place over a low fire at first until some juice is extracted, then raise the temperature. All liquid should be absorbed when beans are cooked. The use of different sauces makes for variety.

### Beans With Tomato Sauce

Three cups beans, 2 tablespoons butter, 1 cup tomato juice, 2 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper.

Cook beans in a little water so that practically all liquid is absorbed when they are tender. Then add butter, and when melted and well mixed through the beans, sprinkle the flour over, and stir over the fire. Then slowly add tomato juice, stirring well. Cook five minutes.
