WAR DECLARED UPON BOND HOUSES ONE HUNDRED DIE WHEN EXPLOSIVE FACTORY BLOWS UP

Ontario Premier to Take Other Steps in Selling Securities

Provincial Bank Interest Rate to be Raised From Two To Two and a Half Percent and New Branches Opened; Bonds Will be Sold Direct to Public

TORONTO, June 13: (CP)—Declaring war on the investment houses which refused to buy up a government of Ontario bond issue, Premier Mitchell Hepburn announced today that interest rates of provincial banks would be increased from two to two and a half percent and thirty new branches would be opened at the earliest possible date.

Other matters under discussion at yesterday's meeting included objective finances, playground improvement work, etc.

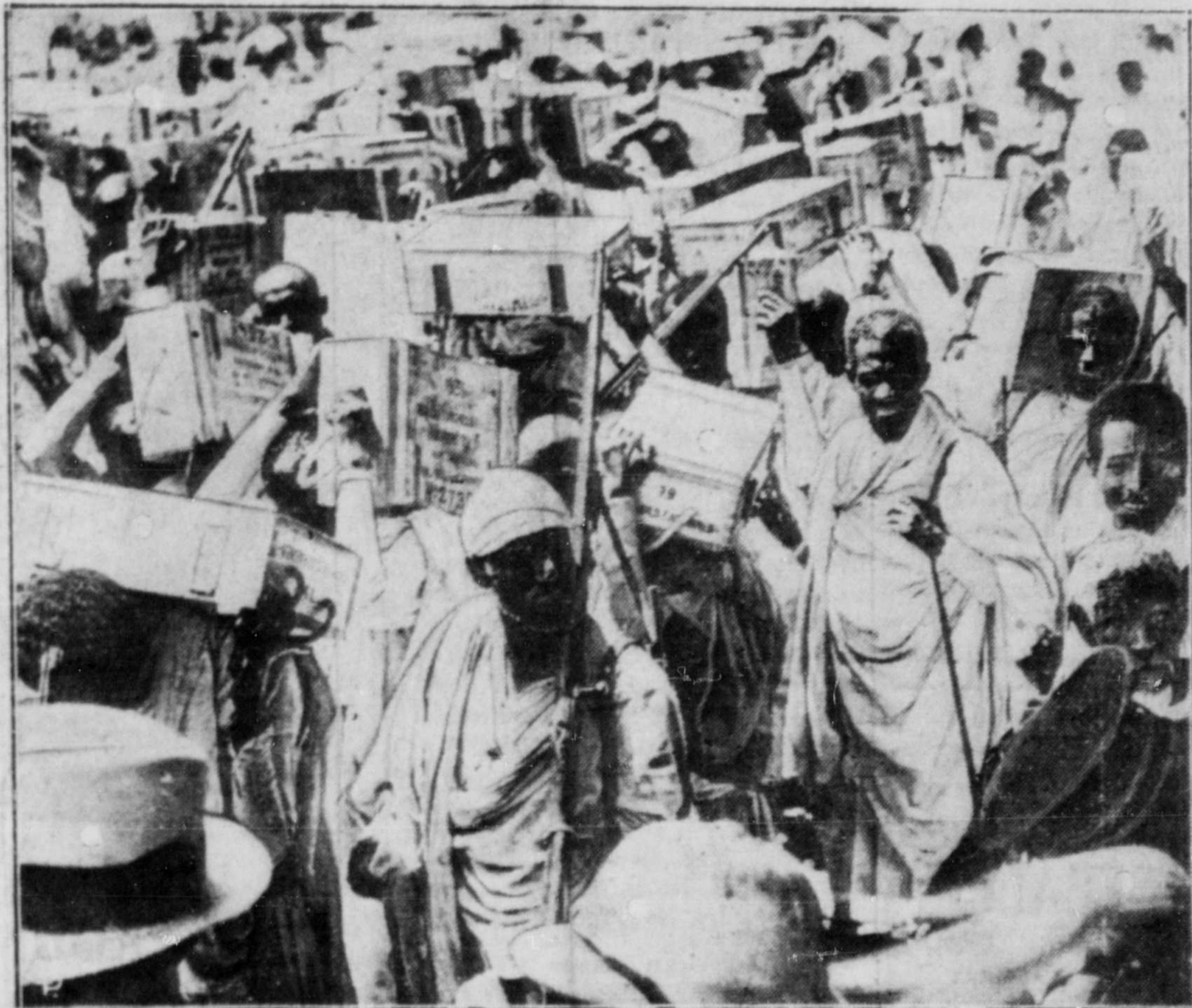
A final report on the recent hoedown dance showed net proceeds of some \$140 for the playground fund.

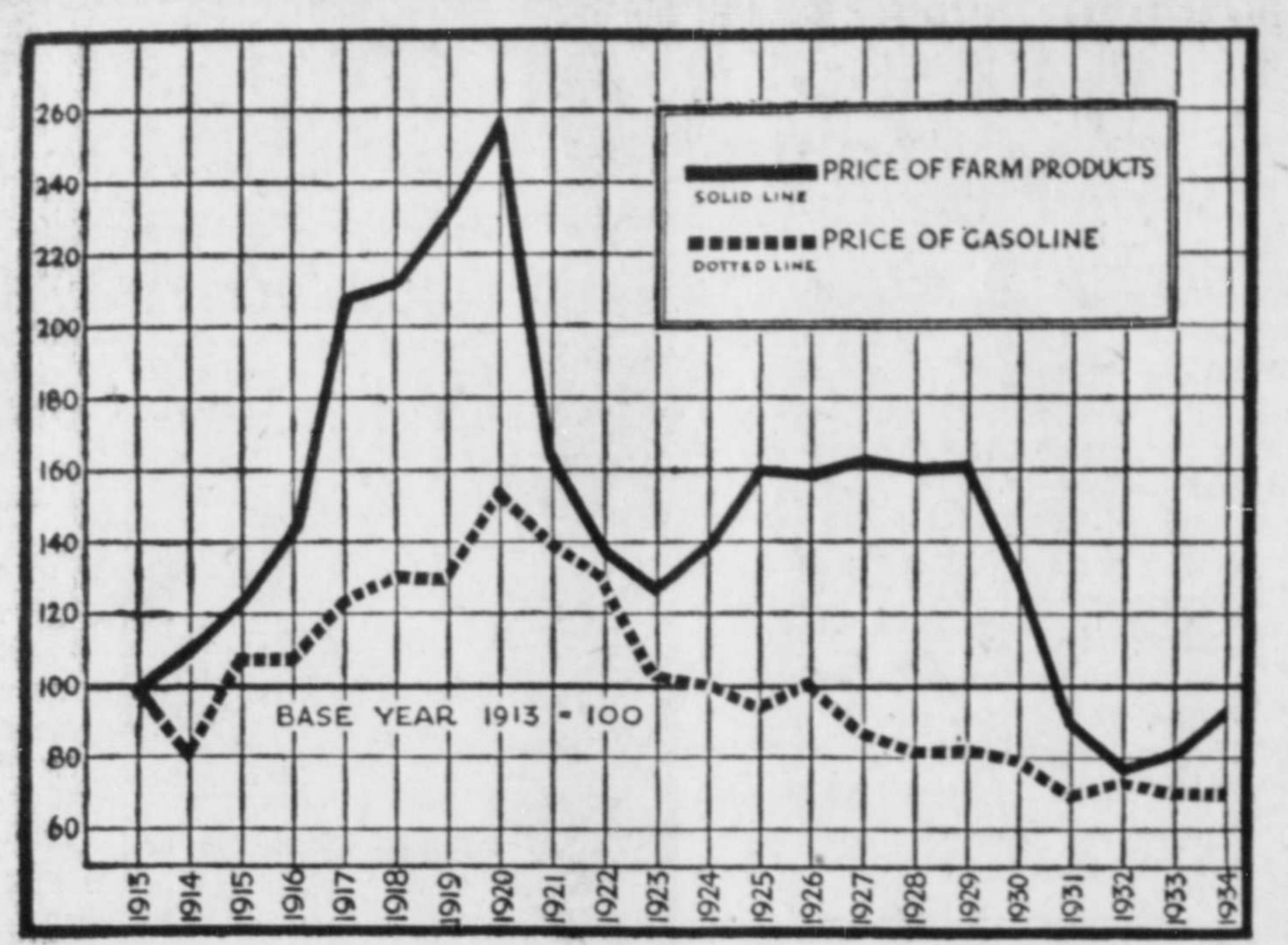
