

The canal is now the scene of great activity as Italian troop and supply ships daily pass through it enroute for the Ethiopian front. 

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

At Soochow in the interior the streets were very narrow, sometimes only three feet wide, just as they were thousands of years ago and the only conveyances were rickshaws. Miss Earl saw women grinding wheat between stones just as they did in Bible days.

Peking was the wonder city of China. The visitors spent ten days there and it was all too short a time. Each day there was some new wonder to visit.
